The Secretary's Page

At the end of the fiscal year, July 31, 1970, Pi Kappa Delta had a total of 258 active chapters, 4 alumni chapters and a membership of 44,305. We added 1014 new members in the past year.

LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE OREGON



The team finished the season with a firstplace sweepstakes victory at the Province of the Northeast tournament. All of Clarion's debaters contributed to the victory, earning points in both debate and individual events. Clarion won seven trophies at the tournament.
