LEWIS AND CLARK COLLEGE Reporter: Dr. Steven B. Hunt



SOUTHERN CONNECTICUT STATE COLLEGE

SCSC had a remarkably successful forensic season in 1973-74, winning an unprecendented 144 trophies in individual events and debate. Among the more

notable performances:

For a season opener, SCSC took 1st place sweepstakes at Plattsburgh. The next week at Niagra saw a 5-1 debate record and two individual events finalists. Then things got moving: 2nd place and 14 trophies at Newark, 2nd place and seven trophies at SCSS, a quarter-final debate slot at Pace, a 4-0 novice team and best 4-man unit at Massachusetts, 2nd place and nine trophies at Oswego, and 3rd place and five trophies at Delaware.

Second semester began with a poor start: only one finalist at Monmouth, but the next week, SCSC took 1st at Middlesex with 27 trophies. At Middlesex, SCSC has 179 sweepstakes points. SCSC was the only school to place four finalist slots at Old

Dominion. At Mansfield, SCSC entered two complete individual events teams: one was 3rd, and the other was 6th, only one point out of a fourth-place tie.

SCSC was 2nd with 12 trophies at their spring home tournament, including 2nd and 3rd place teams in off-topic debate. The squad then took 3rd at George Mason with seven trophies, and 2nd at Hunter with nine.

In nine days at the end of March and beginning of April, SCSC took 32 awards in three tournaments with no more than six contestants in any of the tournaments. With only three students, SCSC was fifth of 23 schools at PKD Provincials, and then came home to win the state championships the next Wednesday. Then it was off to Trenton, and third with 14 trophies but only four students.

At Individual Events Nationals, SCSC placed 13th out of 101 schools, with David Bradford reaching finals in prose interp and thereby finishing 4th in the nation out

of 184.

Sixteen different students reached finals in individual events last year, with Joe Leary, Greg Denaro, Kip Hartz, Guy Ortoleva, Dave Bradford, Betty Giulietti, and Robin Deimel averaging between two and five trophies per tournament. Ed Marcarelli, Tom Quinn, Jim Carriero and Karen Hyfantis accounted for SCSC's awards in national-topic debate.

Home tournaments were large as usual, with the fall tournament's 444 contestants putting it on Jack Howe's Ten Largest in the Nation list. Plattsburgh took sweepstakes at both SCSC tournaments last year.
