

BRAVES TO FACE LOOP LEADERS

**McPHERSON HAS LOST ONLY
ONE GAME.**

**But Ottawa Won That, So Tilt
Here Thursday Night May
Be a Thriller.**

At the top of the Kansas conference standings is McPherson College, having won four games and lost only one. That lone setback was handed the Bulldogs by no other team than the Ottawa University Braves in the first game of the season played at the home of the western school.

Thursday night the Bulldogs come to Ottawa to prove that the same thing cannot happen twice. The Braves, however, will walk into the junior high school court at 7:30 with the intention of repeating their previous success. No less than the greatest game of the season ought to be the result. The Braves will have a chance to win a high place in the standings should they score a victory.

The Bulldogs play a fire-wagon type of ball, working on the theory that the best offense is to grab, throw and shoot. They do plenty of that, and when they are hot, the score mounts up as it did against Pittsburg Teachers Saturday night, the Bulldogs winning 59 to 53.

Chief cog in the McPherson play is Chet Johnson, slight forward, who handles the ball with remarkable agility and is not a poor shot. He has a bad knee injury, but seemingly that makes little difference to him.

Another power is the veteran Tony Myer who is as tall as Omer Brenton and is effective especially on defense, although he is frequently top scorer. Tony was ineligible the first semester and unable to play against Ottawa in the first game. His playing might have made a difference. As it was the Ottawans were forced to stage a terrific rally in the last three minutes to pull out a 43 to 35 victory.

The Braves are considerably cheered because they feel they are again hitting a stride after being slightly off. Ad Miller, veteran forward, for the first time this year showed the old power and ability to score against Bethany last week. In that game he drove hard, played heads-up ball and plunked in five baskets.

Coach Dick Godlove said that he will probably start the regulars against the Bulldogs, but the freshmen will be on hand to do their stuff now and then when needed.

There will be no reserved seats but it is suggested that fans buy their tickets at the North American coffee shop or Davis-Wassmer clothing store in order to avoid the rush at the box office.

CRUCIAL GAME IN LOOP RACE

**O. U. HOPES TO TRIM Mc-
PHERSON AGAIN.**

**Smarting From Only Loss, Bull-
dogs Will Be Out To Win
Here Thursday Night.**

With the Kansas conference basketball race becoming increasingly like a scene shifters' picnic, McPherson College, now leading the campaign by the narrowest of margins, will risk that lead here Thursday night by meeting Ottawa University Braves in junior high gym at 7:30.

In the first conference game of the season the Ottawans turned the fire hose on the fire-wagon offense of the Bulldogs and, after a fierce struggle, stopped the mad scramble of the hot-shots out west. And that, fans, is the only defeat administered to the Bulldogs this season in conference play. So, can the Braves do it again? That is the big question among the fans.

While the regulars will start the game tomorrow night at least half a dozen other Braves will see

plenty of action, for the torrid pace is more than one quintet can stand. Eugene Harding, who has been a bit off his best game, will be used quite often and will be left in, if he is hitting. As for that, so will any of the boys who happen to be going in good shape.

Jack Ramsey, freshman strippling who has been used at the forward post frequently in recent games, will undoubtedly get the call to enter the game before many minutes have been played. Not sure of himself yet in every spot, Ramsey handles himself with good leg action as anyone on the squad. So far he has not been able to hit the hoop, but may turn that trick most any time.

The Braves are not only fighting to beat the Bulldogs, they still believe they have a chance to finish in the top spot of the conference even though they have lost three games. A defeat would virtually consign them to a middle spot in the final standings, so they intend to have none of that, if there is a way out.

**CRUCIAL CONFERENCE GAME
HERE TONIGHT.**

**Rock Expected To Make Supreme
Effort—Braves Hope To
Avenge Previous Defeat.**

Another chapter in the muddled story of the Kansas conference basketball race will be written tonight on the junior high school court when College of Emporia and Ottawa University meet to decide which will stay in the championship campaign.

Cliff Rock, the most talked of player in the circuit, reported to have a bid from the Wichita Gridleys, will be the spearhead of the Emporia attack. This will be his last basketball game against Ottawa and he probably will see no reason for spoiling a long record of successful assaults on the Braves' basket. In an earlier game played on the Emporia court, he needed help to gain the victory and Heider, playing his first, but not last, varsity game came through with 10 points to give the Emporians a 47 to 37 advantage. Maze is also a boy who did quite a bit of damage in that game and the Ottawans will have to keep him covered like a swearing parrot.

In this last home game of the year, Ottawa will probably see in action the same five boys who have been so successful in the last three conference games, Lyman Morgan, Adrian Miller, Omer Brenton, Lyle Swetnam and Don Meek. They will start, but Coach Dick Godlove will draw heavily on the supply of reserves, if necessary. Among these is Eugene Harding. In a momentary slump recently, this stocky guard gave definite promises of making a comeback in the Wesleyan game. As a matter of fact, he did come back, for it was his insertion in the second half which sounded off the winning Ottawa counter-attack. Still erratic in shooting, his general defensive play was highly commendable.

There will be no change in tactics as far as the Ottawans are concerned. C. of E. will use the old familiar offensive organized around the rightly famed Rock. As these two capable offenses clash, a brand of basketball highly acceptable to the fans will be displayed. At times the play will be fast and furious, but there will be breathing spells when both teams will settle down to set plays in an effort to work the ball into the basket.

There is no dope on the game as far as picking a winner is concerned, except that Emporia has a 47 to 37 victory over the Braves. The team which is hitting the loop tonight will probably take the game, and with it the opportunity of staying in the conference championship race.

Tickets for the game are on sale at the Davis-Wassmer clothing store and North American coffee shop. It has been suggested that fans will avoid waiting in line at the entrance, if they will purchase tickets early.

On Southern Debate Trip . . . These four Ottawa University debaters and their coach Dr. Evan A. Reiff, will leave Saturday to take on a dozen or fourteen debate teams of colleges and universities in Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas.

O. U. DEBATERS ON TRIP SOUTH

WILL MEET TEAMS IN FOUR STATES.

Leaving Saturday, Accompanied by Dr. Reiff, Coach, Against Dozen Colleges.

Four members of the Ottawa University debate squad and their coach, Dr. Evan A. Reiff, will leave Saturday morning for an 11-day trip through several southern states during which time they will meet forensic teams of a dozen colleges and universities.

The four students are: Wilbur Swenson, junior, Clay Center; LeRoy Cowperthwaite, junior, Colby; Leonard Sizer, senior, Council Bluffs, Ia.; Leland Roth, senior, Milwaukee, Wis. All are experienced debaters having had at least one year of forensic work.

The debaters are scheduled to open against Central State Teachers in Edmond, Okla., on Saturday. On Monday the group will go to Shawnee to engage the Oklahoma Baptist University, of which school Dr. Reiff is an alumnus and a former instructor. From there on the Ottawans march through a stiff schedule of from one to two debates a day in Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas. They return home on February 16.

The champion of the Kansas
conference basketball campaign is
just two games around the corner.
Two games and four teams. Next
Monday night Ottawa University
will meet Baker University at
Baldwin and next Tuesday night
McPherson College will meet
Kansas Wesleyan at Salina.

Since McPherson and Ottawa
are now tied for the lead, each
with one game to play, victories
for each would leave them tied
for the championship. If both
were to lose, there would probably
be a 3-way tie for the title with
C. of E. or Wesleyan sharing the
honors. Ottawa winning and Mc-
Pherson losing would give the
title to the Braves, and vice versa.

The Ottawa-Baker game at
Baldwin is scheduled to start at
7:15 sharp. Tickets are to be on
sale Monday morning at the
Davis-Wassmer clothing store and
North American coffee shop.
Since Ottawa University gets half
of the money on tickets sold in
Ottawa, Coach Dick Godlove is
asking all fans planning to go to
get their tickets in Ottawa. Gen-
eral admission is 40 cents. An en-
tire section has been reserved for
Ottawans.

The present conference melee is
not the first down-to-the-last-
minute finish in the history of the
conference, but it probably is the
most jammed up session in the
circuit books. Only one team,
Bethany, was out of the cham-
pionship running before this week.
Baker dropped out Monday. C. of
E., Wesleyan, McPherson and
Ottawa are still in the running,
the latter two having the inside
track. And Bethany, while not
being one of the teams shooting
for the top, has twice stepped out
to throw a monkey wrench into
the machinery. The Swedes after
losing six straight came up and
neatly dropped the aspiring Kan-
sas Wesleyan team with a 26 to 20
victory. A game or two later, they
halted the championship advance
of McPherson by bowling over the
Bulldogs, 36 to 32.

Scoring in the conference has
been high, probably 10 points
over what it was last year or any
years before. The Ottawa team,
for instance, has twice gone to 50
points or more, beating Bethany
50 to 32 and C. of E. 69 to 48. Out
of the 11 games they have won
(they have lost six) the Braves
have topped 45 or better in six.
In nine of the 11 they have gone
over the 40 mark.

WINS AGAIN IN CHECKER TOURNNEY

T. L. BOUSE OF ROSSVILLE
REPEATS VICTORY HERE.

Arza Fogle Second to the State
Champion—Three Tied
For Third Place.

Prof. Thornton L. Bouse of
Rossville, former principal of the
Ottawa junior high school, won
the annual eastern Kansas check-
er tournament held in the com-
mons room at Ottawa University
Saturday. Professor Bouse is state
champion and also won the tour-
ney here last year. Bouse scored
20 out of a possible 24 points.
Arza Fogle, Williamsburg, sponsor
of the tourney, took second place
with 17 points. Two points were
awarded for winning a game, and
one point for a draw.

In the 3-way tie for third place
were Ralph O'Neil of Wellsville,
Roy Herring of Princeton and Dr.
Arthur Bernhart of Ottawa with
11 points each. Fifteen persons
competed in the tourney which
started at 9 o'clock Saturday
morning and lasted until 8 o'clock
Saturday night.

The contests were divided into
two groups, with a round robin
schedule being played in each
group. The four high scorers in
the round robin qualified for the
final round, and the losers in the
preliminary round competed in
the class B final.

Bill Martin of Ottawa won out
in the class B tournament. Lyle
Swetnam, O. U. student from
Kansas City, Mo., took second
honors and Alfred Janssen of
Lorraine, another O. U. student,
won third place.

The decisive game in the tour-
ney came in the afternoon be-
tween Bouse and Fogle. Bouse
came out the winner, and the vic-
tory brought him into a tie with
Fogle for first place. Bouse then
went ahead to win the tourna-
ment, but had Fogle won this
game, he would have won the
tournament and Bouse would have
been in second place.

As sponsor of the tournament,
Fogle presented Bouse and Mar-
tin, winners in each class, with
desk souvenirs.

Kansas Wesleyan defeated McPherson College at Salina last night, 40 to 34, and thereby went into a 3-way tie with McPherson and Ottawa for the championship of the Kansas conference, each team having won six games and lost four.

McPherson led at the end of the first period, but Cletus Snyder, Wesleyan forward, scored 15 points in the last half to cinch the Wesleyan share in the crown.

This is the first time in the history of the conference that three teams, half of those in the loop, have tied for the top spot. It is not customary to play off ties.

WESLEYAN AFTER GODLOVE?

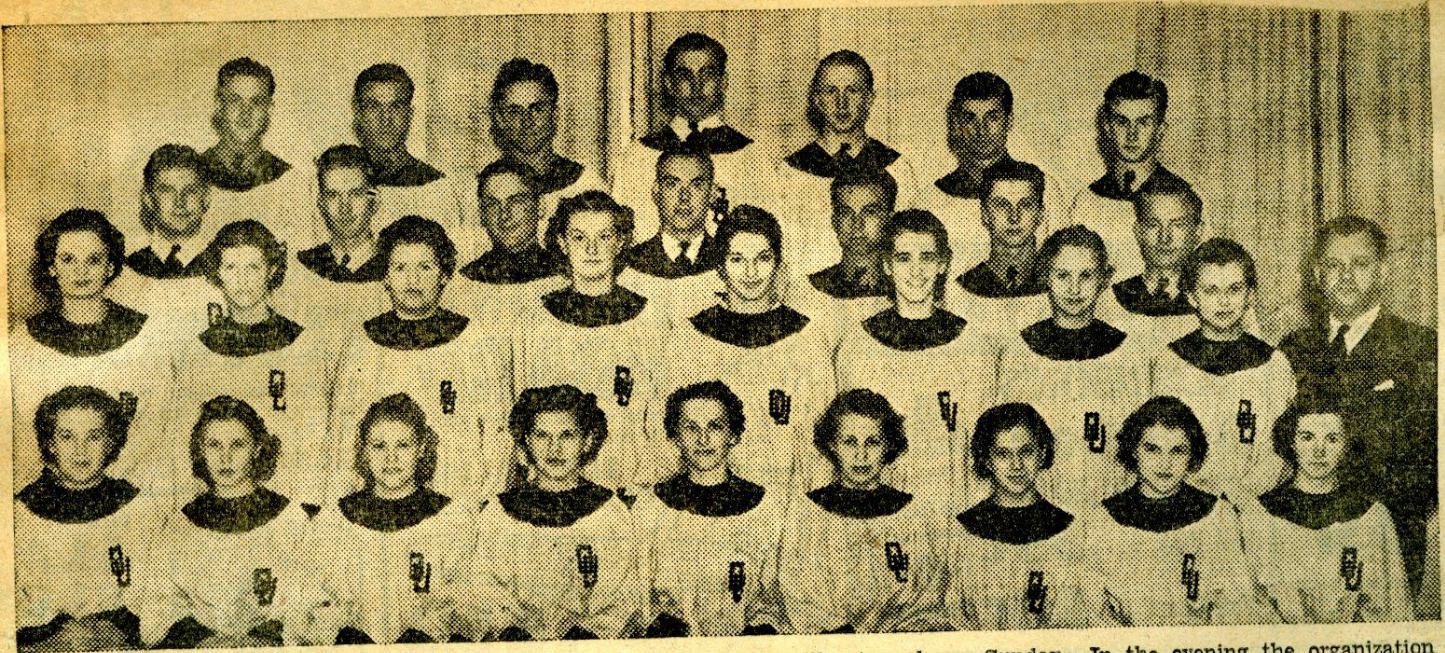
O. U. Coach Says He Has Not Applied For Post.

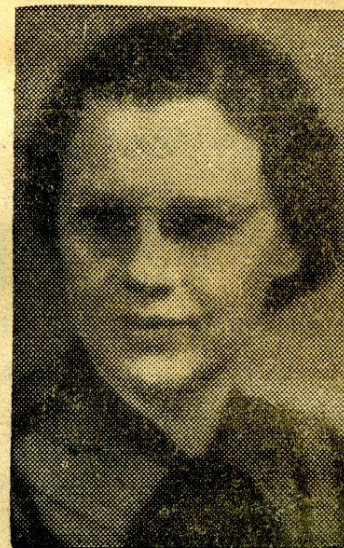
