## PRACTICE AT O. U. TO START MONDAY

TWO SESSIONS EACH DAY,  
ONE AT NIGHT.

Intensive Drills All Next Week—  
First Game With Haskell Sept.  
24—Likely New Material.

The Ottawa University football squad will start practice next Monday, according to an announcement by Coach Richard Godlove. Two practice sessions each day will be held, one in the morning and one in the afternoon. In addition a few "skull" sessions will be held in the evenings.

While engaging in the intensive week of practice the boys will have their meals at Charlton Cottage just as they did last year.

By starting Monday the Braves will have only three weeks in which to whip themselves into shape for the opening game with Haskell which is to be played on Cook field the night of Sept. 24. Coach Godlove said yesterday there is much to be done in the way of training new players for various positions as well as polishing up the skill of veterans.

"I expect to have a squad of 35 or 40 players out for the team this year," said Godlove. "There will be quite a number of new men to add to the roster of the veterans, but of course we cannot count on these until after practice starts."

Godlove thinks it is early yet to predict as to what the team will do this fall, but hopes the record will be much better than last season when the team won three, lost four and tied two. That was a good record when it is remembered that the Braves in the previous year failed to win a single game.

## BRAVES PRIME FOR HASKELL

FACE A FAST OPPONENT FRI-  
DAY NIGHT.

O. U. Expected To Have a Better  
Passing Combination—Re-  
serving Tickets Today.

Today the Ottawa University Braves opened their final week of practice before the first game of the season with the Haskell Indians on Cook field next Friday evening at 7:45. Spurred on by reports the Indians have a large number of new players with plenty of weight and ability, the Ottawans are bearing down in order to perfect their play as much as possible.

A year ago Coach Dick Godlove's team went to Lawrence and suffered a 3 to 0 defeat at the hands of the Red men; naturally they are anxious to turn the tables this fall, but they are not taking the matter for granted. The word has leaked out that Haskell definitely will have a bigger and better team good enough to give any Kansas conference team a lot of football.

Godlove has worked out several combinations in the backfield in an effort to find a clicking group. A likely looking crew consists of Lyman Morgan at quarter, Roy Fitzpatrick and Don Meeks at halves, and Bill Mattis at full. Jack O'Neil has been coming right along and has worked into that group at full and at half. Phillip Palmer has been used at fullback quite a bit and his experience is helping his play considerably. Godlove has also used Jack Ramsey at half with good effect. Oliver Smith is switching back and forth with Morgan at quarter and is certain to direct team play more than a little this fall.

The possibilities of a flashing backfield that can run, kick and pass are ahead of the Braves. Hemmed in on every side last year because passes were not clicking well enough to open up the opposing defense, the Braves got their yardage by sheer power. They hope to retain that this year and work in more passing which will be a welcome sight to all fans.

Season ticket reservations were being made today at Davis-Wassmer clothing store. They were moving right along and it was urged that all who ordered come in and make reservations by tomorrow at the latest. It is not too late to purchase season tickets, it was said today.

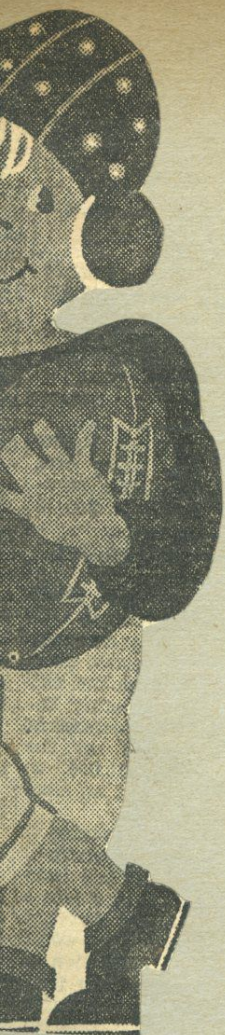

## O. U. TEAM SET FOR HARD GAME WITH INDIANS

Fireworks a Feature Unless Too Much Rain

### HIGHS AT ROSEDALE

The Haskell Indians will clash with the Ottawa University football team tonight at 7:45 on Cook field in the opening game of the season for both squads. This will be the first time in many years that the Haskell team has played in Ottawa.

While the O. U.-Haskell game is being played here, Ottawa high school will be playing its opener on Rosedale field in Kansas City, Kas.

The reserve seat section at O. U., is practically sold out, but Coach Richard Godlove assured fans there will be plenty of unreserved seats as only half the grandstand on the west side is reserved. The unreserved seat price is 50 cents plus tax.

Jack Ramsey, Jack O'Neill and Norman Gerhold looked especially good as they plunged through several plays. These three are as fast as any backs in Ottawa for some time and will give a good account of themselves if they have half a chance.

In the meantime the varsity team is preparing for the game here a week from Friday night with McPherson College. That will be the opening Kansas conference game and should attract a large crowd. While the dope now favors Ottawa, the Braves are not overly confident. Pierce Astle, new coach at McPherson, may not have too much material but he will bring a squad back here that is filled to overflowing with football fire. His boys will fight and a cocky team opposing them might find the going right difficult.

The famed Zuhars, who has run roughshod over the Ottawans for the last two years, is not in school at McPherson this year. Reports are that he will remain out of school a year and then follow his old coach, Bud Selves, to College of Emporia. Selves said that he surely could use a man like Zuhars, but added that the backfield ace had already decided to remain out of school before he, Selves, accepted the position at Emporia.

Those fans who are used to seeing a set-up in Bethel have another thought coming this year, for the Newton boys hung it on C. of E. 13 to 0 last week.

## O. U. 'B' TEAM BEATS CHANUTE

JUNIOR COLLEGE VISITORS  
WERE NO MATCH.

Local Second Stringers Displayed  
Fine Offensive and Defensive—  
Score Was 20 to 7.

A set of Ottawa University "B" backs wrote a story of effective speed, blocking and punting on Cook field last night to defeat a hard fighting Chanute junior college team, 20 to 7.

Displaying as fine and as fast offensive work as the varsity has accomplished so far this season, the yearling backs and linemen smashed away for two second quarter touchdowns and a final one in the third quarter.

The first Ottawa counter came on the first play of the second period when Jack Ramsey went around the Chanute right end back of good interference for the score. Morales kicked the point after touchdown. The score was a result of a 48-yard punt by Jack Ramsey. Taking the ball on his own 49-yard marker he punted outside on the Chanute 3-yard line. Cloke punted back 30 yards for Chanute, and then Phillip Palmer and Ramsey went to work with the latter taking the ball across.

Just three plays later Jack Northrup intercepted a pass by Cloke and ran 65 yards for a touchdown. This proved to be the longest gallop of the evening.

The third Ottawa score came in the third period climaxing a 91-yard march down the field. Chanute came into the second period with a more open attack. After Cloke had almost got away for a touchdown on the kickoff, the Chanute boys started a touchdown march from the center of the field. Two long passes and nice runs by Cloke placed the ball on the Ottawa 6-yard line and it seemed likely that the junior collegians would go over. At the inopportune time, however, the ball was fumbled and Lyle Swetnam recovered for Ottawa. Elated by that the Braves started their long trek to the goal line, featuring sprints by Ramsey and Norman Gerhold, the latter going over for the score on a 5-yard sprint around the Chanute left end.

The Chanute touchdown came on a 13-yard pass from Al Miller to Leland Sutterby midway of the final period. The speedy Rip Cloke, who kept the Braves' defense worried all evening, had made the score possible by his brilliant ball carrying only to be injured two plays before the score. He was removed from the game.

Ramsey and Northrup did some excellent punting during the evening and it was due to

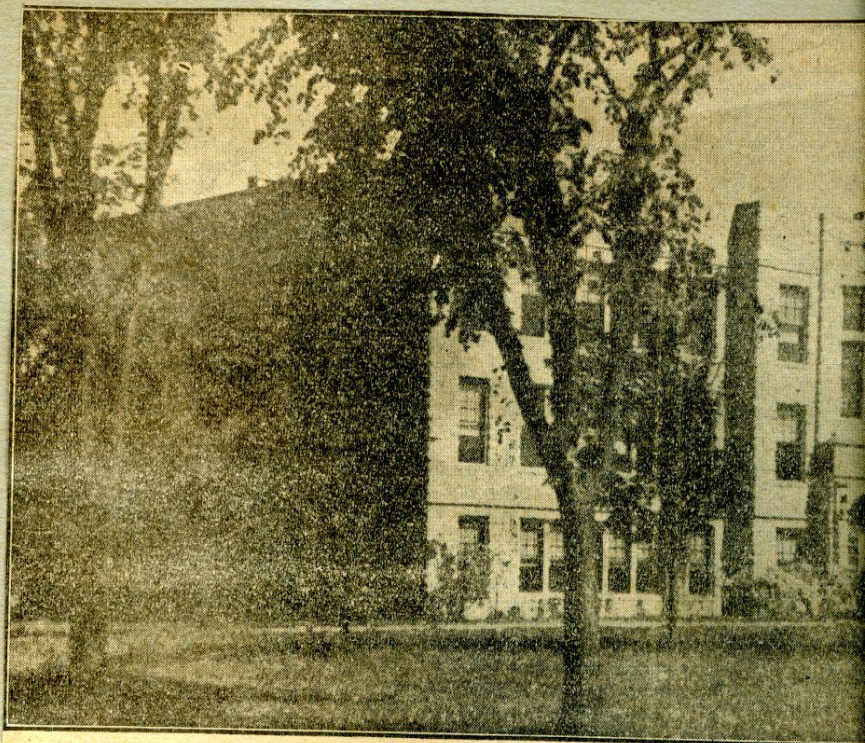

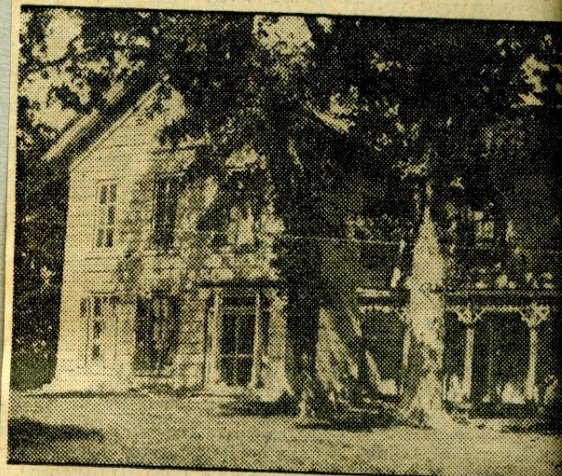

**Home of Taui Jones**

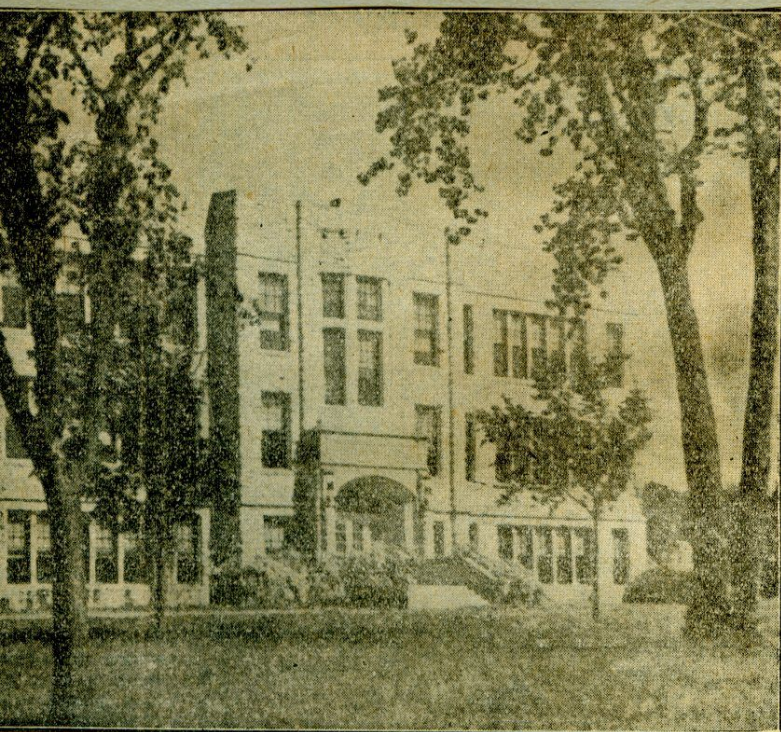

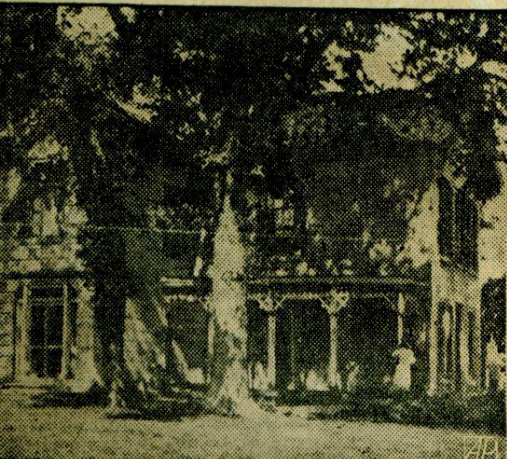
