Ottawa, Kan., May 20.-College of Emporia's 15-man squad, undefeated in dual competition this year, is favored to gain its first Kansas conference track and field title here tomorrow. Herb Worl's well-rounded team is expected to receive stiffest competition from Kansas Wesleyan's fleet runners but experts also are counting in Baker U., winner of nine titles in the 10-year history of the

C. of E., will have entries in every event and is especially strong in the distance runs and field events. Carey and George are distance men sure to win points and Clift is a sprinter of promise and McNickle is a dependable quarter-miler. Ottawa, Kan., May 21.-(A. P.) -College of Emporia, a school which had only a half dozen Ba trackmen four years ago, won the Kansas conference title here today. And the coach who brought the school out of the track and field woods, Herbert Worl, de-feated his rivals with a squad which won only four first places but placed in 13 of the 15 events. This massed strength garnered 47 points and pulled away from Kansas Wesleyan and Baker in a meet which needed the final events to decide.

Wesleyan finished second with 36½ points and Baker a tight third with 34. Ottawa scored

251/2, McPherson 12 and Bethany 10 in the most hotly contested in meet in conference history. Each of the six schools won at least one first place and six relay quartets competed for the first time

in years. Only a soft track and an inter-fering shower mid-way in the afternoon prevented an assault on conference records. Despite the unfavorable conditions, Asa Eagles, of Ottawa, tossed the javelin 04 feet, 7 inches, to displace his own 1936 mark of 194 feet, 2 inches, and Fred Koehler, also of the Braves equalled the existing the Braves, equalled the existing mark in the high hurdles. Koehler skimmed over the tall barriers in 15.4 seconds to match the performance of Walker, of Baker, back in 1930. Other performances were respectable, some of them surprising, in face of uncertain footing on sloppy runways.

Undefeated in dual competition and winner of the recent Sterling Relays, C. of E. found spirited competition all the way today and trailed Wesleyan by a half point with only three events remaining. But the Coyotes had played out their string and failed to place in the javelin where the Presbies picked up four points on Newland's second and Harzman's fourth.
