

O. U. DRIVE OVER TOP WITH \$5,530

PRESIDENT MARTIN GRATEFUL FOR SUCCESS.

Chairman Wassmer and Workers Made An Unusually Fine Showing.

The Ottawa University drive, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, has gone over the top with a total of \$5,530.50, according to an announcement made this morning by J. L. Wassmer, campaign director. The drive opened April 21 with the 65 workers aiming at a \$5,000 goal.

Dr. Andrew B. Martin, president of the university, said this morning, "We certainly do appreciate the fine support the men and women of this community are giving to the university. This drive, which was so admirably directed by Mr. Wassmer assisted by his large group of helpers, indicates that Ottawans believe that our university is worthy of their support. We shall try to make it increasingly so and assure those who contributed to the fund that the money will be sanely spent in the best interests of the school."

F. H. Parks, president of the Chamber of Commerce, was also enthusiastic in his comments about the drive saying, "Mr. Wassmer and all those who have helped deserve the thanks of the whole community. The drive was expertly directed and the results show just how the C. of C. feels toward Ottawa University."

Mr. Wassmer in announcing completion of the campaign said that all credit should go to the corps of workers who did the soliciting. "I especially want to thank all of those who assisted in the drive," said Mr. Wassmer. "The team captains, J. E. Colby, Edmund Lister, John G. Kaiser, R. M. Clogston and Harold J. Lamb, are to be thanked for their efforts in making the drive successful. Arthur Willis, A. C. Carpenter, Fred F. Fockle, S. E. Harris and Bert Anderson deserve much credit for their successful work with the special teams. Mrs. Edward Haley and A. F. Stephenson did a fine bit of work in getting contributions from clubs and organizations. The biggest part of the solicitation, of course, was done by the corps of 50 campaigners under the five captains and they did an excellent job, too."

Members of the O. U. board this morning were enthusiastic about the results of the drive and expressed appreciation for the fine manner in which it was conducted. "Mr. Wassmer put over the drive with a great deal of skill and much of the success is due to his fine organizing ability," said M. H. Forester of the board.

CONFERENCE MEET HERE

C. of E. Doped To Win Friday—Third to O. U. or Baker.

College of Emporia is doped to win the Kansas conference track and field meet to be held in Ottawa Friday of this week. Triumphant in all its dual engagements thus far this season the C. of E. squad should win in Ottawa by 12 to 15 points. Kansas Wesleyan of Salina should give the most competition and might possibly whip the Presbies.

Third place should cause a dog fight between two old rivals, Baker University and Ottawa University. Either team could win that place without upsetting the dope. Ottawa beat out Baker in the triangular meet with C. of E., but Baker nosed out the Braves in a dual last week.

The other two conference schools, McPherson and Bethany, might possibly have more than is expected, but the chances are they will be in fifth and sixth places.

The meet proper will get under way at 1:45 Friday afternoon. Preliminaries will be run off at 10 o'clock the morning of the same day. E. A. Thomas of Topeka will be the starter.

The golf and tennis meets of the conference will also be held in conjunction with the track and field meet. The golf competition will start Thursday morning at 10 o'clock on the Ottawa Country club course. Each school is allowed to enter four contestants who play 54 holes for two-man team and individual medal scores. Ottawa and Baker are favored to win the high places with the latter school holding a slight edge.

The tennis competition in which Baker is expected to win easily will start at 10 o'clock Friday morning on the O. U. courts.

BAKER SEEN AS THREAT TO C. OF E., WESLEYAN

Kansas Conference Meet on Today at Ottawa.

Ottawa May Push Favorites; Emporia Power in Every Event; New Marks Are Possible.

Ottawa, Kan., May 20.—College of Emporia's 15-man squad, undefeated in dual competition this year, is favored to gain its first Kansas conference track and field title here tomorrow. Herb Worl's well-rounded team is expected to receive stiffest competition from Kansas Wesleyan's fleet runners but experts also are counting in Baker U., winner of nine titles in the 10-year history of the league.

C. of E., will have entries in every event and is especially strong in the distance runs and field events. Carey and George are distance men sure to win points and Clift is a sprinter of promise and McNickle is a dependable quarter-miler. Wasson and Newland are capable weight tossers and Rock is an accomplished jumper and hurdler.

Wesleyan bases its hopes upon two sprinters, Warner and Launchbaugh; Klingman, a distance star; Watson, implement tosser, and a bevy of place winners. Baker has strength in nearly every event and George Brettnall's last Wildcat team has been finishing strong of late. Mitchell, hurdler; Smith and McKinney, middle distance men; and Heine, weight tosser, form the Baker nucleus.

Ottawa, only school to break Baker's reign over the last 10 years, will make a fight for third place. Roberts and Wiggins, two-milers; Koehler, hurdler, and Ferguson, middle distance runner, must get some first places if the Braves are to have a chance. Asa Eagles, javelin thrower, is expected to break the only record but several others are in danger.

Bethany has Nelson, of Kackley, former high school half-mile champion, and several other probable point winners. McPherson also will dig into the totals of the more favored teams.

Preliminaries are scheduled at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning with the finals at 1:45 o'clock. Golf and tennis meets also will be in progress. The track and field records:

Their other firsts went to Bob Marshall, who ran the half mile in a good 2:00.7, and to Bob Wasson, winner of the discus at 126 feet, 7 inches. But the well-rounded Emporia team piled up the points by ones, twos and threes.

Warner, who ran 10.1 in the century and 22.2 in the furlong, was joined in Wesleyan's winnings by Amos Morris, top man in the pole vault at 12 feet. Mitchell placed second in the vault and Layton was fourth to shove the Coyotes into a lead that stood up for almost an hour.

When the Salina crew backfired late in the meet, an ever-dangerous Baker team almost slipped into the runner-up position. A Topeka boy, Dick Schnacke, won the high jump in the clutch and then Jack Mitchell gained the decision in a blanket finish over the low hurdles to yank the Wildcats into the middle of the picture. But, like Wesleyan, their chances faded in the broad jump, where measurements had to be made with a microscope.

Swedes in Early Lead.

Bethany led the pack for the first time in years when two early races went to a pair of speedy Swedes. Clifford Nelson won the mile easily at 4:31.7 and Norman Hammer promptly blazed the trail in a spectacular quarter mile in 52.1. These were the first points won by Bethany in a conference meet since Archie San Romani, now at Emporia Teachers, participated there as a freshman. But the remainder of the Bethany corps failed to augment this 10-point total. Hammer's victory over McNickle, of C. of E., came by inches and produced the most gripping finish of the day.

McPherson's one victory came in the two-mile, which diminutive Mark Porter won from Dick George, of C. of E., in 10:17.4. The summary:

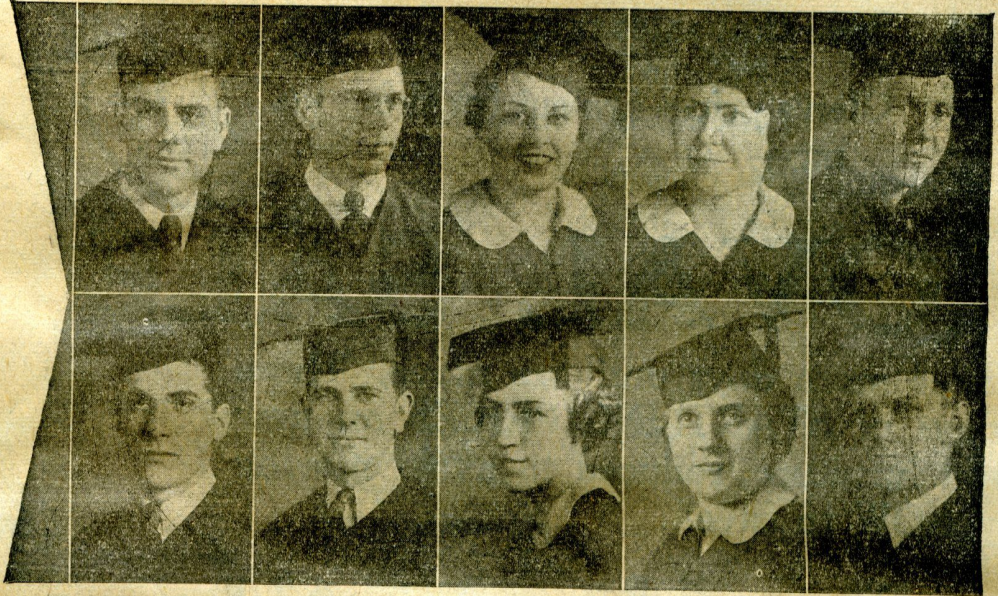

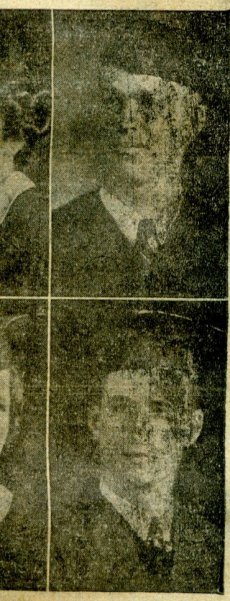

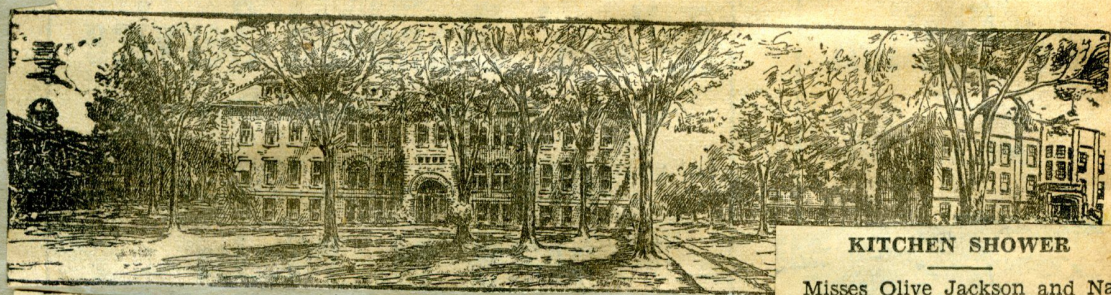
