## Braves' Cage Dates Announced

### Will Have 17-Game Schedule This Year

Coach Dick Godlove this morning announced a 17-game Ottawa University basketball schedule following the Kansas conference meeting in Kansas City yesterday. The Braves will open with Sioux Falls (S. D.) College at the junior gym Thursday, Dec. 14. The first conference game will be with Bethany at Ottawa January 4. Ottawa may play a practice game with C. of E. at Emporia Dec. 19.

After the Sioux Falls game, the Braves will rest and practice until Dec. 27, when they go to Kansas City for the Rockhurst College tournament. That will last four days. Ottawa will play each day.

Coaches yesterday adopted the tan moulded basketball for use in games. Presidents of the colleges met with the coaches and faculty representatives. In addition to discussing various phases of the conference setup, they moved to cut out spring football practice. This rule will come up for final action at the spring meeting. It will not affect the Ottawa plans, as the university never has spring training. Faculty representatives also agreed to adopt uniform methods of reporting eligibility. President Andrew B. Martin and Dr. W. B. Wilson, as well as Godlove, represented Ottawa at the meeting.

Ottawa University basketball players will swing into action tomorrow night at 8 o'clock on junior high court against Sioux Falls (S. D.) College. It will be the first opportunity which local fans will have of seeing the new version of the Braves in action.

Coach Dick Godlove said that he may start Melvin Sarchet at a forward spot. The Superior, Neb., player is a little fellow as college basketball men go. He is 5 feet, 5 inches high and weighs 120 pounds. That is very small for a college player, but Sarchet is clever with the ball. Already he

is one of the best passers on the squad and is so quick that he eludes the big boys all too frequently. Godlove is not sure that he is big enough to do a lot of playing, but he certainly will have a good many chances.

Larry Smith is another freshman who will get an opportunity to display his prowess before local fans. He is much bigger than Sarchet, standing 6 feet, 2 inches and weighing 190 pounds. Last year he was captain and guard of the Wyandotte high team in Kansas City, Kas. Burton Cowan, 6 feet, 1 inch, 170 pounds, is another top-notch prospect. His home is in Uniontown and last year he played with Fort Scott junior college. He will be playing a forward spot.

High school will re-open the Tuesday morning following New Year's day. At the college there will be an extra day of vacation, classes not starting until Wednesday morning.

## DOUBLE HOLIDAYS

Clerks in Ottawa stores are going on the run these days. They plan to keep stores open evenings all of next week to accommodate late shoppers.

Both Christmas and New Year's coming on Monday this year combine with a Sunday to give double holidays and double headaches for the morning after. There'll be even more than usual of the traffic jam on highways as families take advantage of the double holiday to visit distant relatives.

Christmas dinners will cost just a little less than last year, grocers say. While the prices of most foodstuffs are about where they were at this time a year ago, the price of poultry is down a little. Even sugar, which took a jump upward when the announcement of war against Germany was made in September, is now down again.

## SEVERAL CLOSING HERE

Christmas day is the one event for which Ottawa business houses are practically unanimous in closing. Even service stations close all day to permit employees to spend the day with their families.

New Year's day sees a general closing, too, not quite as complete as for Christmas, but most merchants will take advantage of the day to get the bulk of their annual inventories taken care of.

The Herald will not be published on Christmas day and will come out at noon on New Year's.

## PROGRAM AT HIGH

Ottawa high school will present its Christmas program on December 22, the Friday before school closes. Church choirs are practicing Christmas anthems. Several are planning to give special programs before Christmas. Some of the churches many other groups and individuals are planning watch parties for New Year's eve.

Santa Claus will be on Main street all day Saturday and every day next week, to meet the children and find out what they want in their stockings and on the tree.

## Braves On Court

Tall Centers In O. U.-

Sioux Falls Game Tonight

The opening of the Ottawa University basketball season tonight against Sioux Falls college of South Dakota has more unusual angles than any athletic contest played here in recent years. The game will start at 8 o'clock in the junior high gym.

The feature attraction will be the battling of two big and capable centers, Omer Brenton, 6-foot, 5-inch Ottawan, and Bob Goodbarn, 6-foot, 5-inch Dakotan. Last year these two big fellows had such a hectic struggle that they both went out on fouls midway of the last half. But they played spectacularly before they prematurely marched off the court. Tuesday night, Goodbarn playing against the powerful Maryville, Mo. Teachers scored 20 points while working against Ike Howell, 6-foot, 10-inch center, who has been ranked as one of the best in Missouri the last two years.

Both teams are representing Baptist colleges, Sioux Falls being the denominational school of the northern states. Dr. W. P. Behan, former O. U. administrator, is president of the Sioux Falls institution.

That is not all, each college claims as its mascot, the Indian. The athletic teams of each college are known as the Braves. Putting all this together makes the prospect good for an unusual season opener.

In addition to Goodbarn, Sioux Falls will have five other lettermen ready for duty, Misner and Begley, forwards; Kramer, a substitute center, and Meier and Jones, guards. Coach Dick Godlove said he probably will start Lyman Morgan, Burton Cowan or Willard Beaman at forwards, Omer Brenton at center, and Jack Ramsey, Larry Smith or Melvern Sarchet at guards.

One new rule change this year makes an important difference in the game. A team which is given one or more free throws as a result of a personal foul may refuse the penalty and take the ball out-of-bounds at the mid-court. Primarily, this rule has been made to prevent intentional fouling on the part of a defensive team, especially late in a ball game. On a technical foul, the offended team gets the free toss and then gets the ball out-of-bounds at mid-court.

There is no change in admission price, the charge being 50 cents even though a large guarantee is being paid the Sioux Falls m.

## Pady to Speak Before Scientists

### Other O. U. Teachers at Special Holiday Meetings

A summer of study at the Rocky Mountain biological laboratories in Gothic, Colo., and a chance observation of fungi growing near a leaking water pipe at his home, gave Dr. Stuart M. Pady, professor of biology at Ottawa University, the material for two papers to be presented at the annual convention of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 28 to 30.

The first of these papers, "Conpinus Micaceus Growing in Unusual Habitat", fungus to the uninitiated, will be given before the Mycological society, a section of the association, Dec. 28. The article has already been published in the journal of the organization. Material for the second paper, "A Comparative Study of Melampsorella on Abies and Picea," was gathered last summer while Dr. Pady was doing research work in Colorado. It will be given before a combined meeting of the Mycological section and the Phytopathological society, students of plant disease to the layman, on Dec. 30. This study, an investigation of the rust fungus which grows in parasitic form on balsam and spruce, disproves the long established theory that the rust is the same on both trees. Dr. Pady has found that the two forms differ in 40 points. The disease which causes distortion of limbs often resembles a bird's nest in the trees. Dr. Pady has long been a student of rusts, his research for his Ph. D. thesis being in that field.

## O. U. Took Opener From Sioux Falls

### Braves Had No Cinch in Winning Last Night

The Ottawa University Braves made their court bow successfully last night by whipping their fellow Baptists of Sioux Falls (S. D.) College, 41 to 33, on junior high court. It was not smooth sailing, however, for every now and then the visitors put on steam to come within touching distance of the Ottawans.

Lyman Morgan broke the scoring ice by sinking a slick shot from the side. A Sioux Falls guard tied up the score, but Morgan then coupled his efforts with those of Omer Brenton and soon set up a 16 to 10 lead at the quarter. That looked fairly safe, but in the second period, the northerners came to life and all but knotted the count. In the meantime Coach Dick Godlove kept a constant procession of Ottawa players marching in and out of the game. The starting group which found Burton Cowan, Jack Ramsey and Larry Smith working with Morgan and Brenton was short-lived. Melvin Sarchet, diminutive competitor, came in along with Bob Schupbach, LeRay Barrett, Walter Reames and Willard Beaman. Bob Goodbarn, towering center of the Sioux, started hitting in the second period and through his efforts the visitors at one time pulled up to within a point of the retarded Braves, but just about the time the lead seemed to be on its way out, Brenton came through with a couple of nice shots to give Ottawa a 21 to 17 lead at the half-way mark.

A vicious Sioux tribe returned to the court for the second half. Meier, guard, slipped in under the basket to sink a neat one and worry the Braves. Morgan reclaimed the lead, but Goodbarn closed up the gap once more. Then Morgan retaliated with a jumping shot in front of the basket. Goodbarn made a pair of free tosses to keep his team on the heels of the Braves. Again Morgan came to the rescue and dropped in one from the side. Larry Smith ended the quarter with a shot that gave Ottawa a 29 to 23 lead. This was considered quite unfair as Goodbarn and Morgan had held a private scoring duel, each collecting six points in the quarter. Smith offered to cancel his score, but Godlove said as long as it was already made, the scorekeepers would count it. From here on Smith will quit messing around and stop butting in on private parties.

Another Ottawan took up Morgan's scoring thrusts in the last period, Burton Cowan of Uniontown. After Goodbarn had scored for the Sioux, Cowan dropped in a shot near the basket and got a free throw along with it. Goodbarn counted again for his team, but Cowan came right back to hold the Braves well in the lead. And he scored again before the game ended.

Goodbarn with 16 points was high scorer of the game, but Brenton with 14 and Morgan with 13 were close behind him.

All in all, the Ottawans showed good possibilities, but must go a long way before being ready for the Rockhurst tourney in Kansas City, Dec. 27, 28, 29 and 30.

### Couldn't Get Going; Meet M. V. Team Today

Ottawa University Braves were  
upset yesterday in the Rockhurst





## Bethany Downed in Conference Opener Here

That is the way things went until the quarter was almost over, then Bethany on three free throws by Norburg went into a 10 to 7 lead.

At this point the Ottawa offense shook off its shackles and went into a pell-mell scoring streak which gave the Braves the lead. Burton Cowan touched off the rally with a swishing long shot and Beaman followed almost immediately with a pair of beauties. In that 10-minute period of scoring in which the Ottawans counted 17 points, Ramsey got a brace of buckets, Beaman three, and Smith and Brenton one each.

In the second half, the Braves found the Swedes maintaining an air-tight defense. Not being able to score on short shots, they simply stood out in the back court and potted long ones. ## O. U. Defense Too Much for McPherson

In that 56 to 22 victory over McPherson College Tuesday night, Ottawa University set up as airtight a defense in the first half as the Kansas conference has witnessed. The Bulldogs were able to count only one point in that period while the Ottawans were stacking up 26. The rangy McPherson team was moving so slowly and handling the ball so carelessly that Coach Dick Godlove's men had little difficulty in guarding them. The second half was a bit different, for the Bulldogs opened up with a couple of sizzling shots, but the Braves came out of a momentary lull and moved to a 43 to 9 advantage at the third quarter mark. The last period was an even-Stephen count with each team registering 13 points.

McPherson has potentially a good lot of manpower. Schubert, a tall and well built freshman lad, is probably the smoothest looking new player in the conference. He has much to learn but he has a good eye for the basket and the coordination so essential to a good basketeer. The rest of the Bulldogs are tall and rangy. They lack speed, but may develop to play great ball during the latter part of the season. They probably will not be beaten again as badly as they were Thursday night.

Larry Smith, a freshman, was the Ottawa guard who was guarding Schubert most of the way. So efficient was his defense that the McPherson freshman failed to get a bucket off of him and only a few shots. Two or three times Smith went up to block out shots which were on their way toward the basket.

On basketball trips of two or three days, Coach Godlove is something of a versatile manager. He is a cordial representative of the university as well as a coach. Not the least of his duties is that of a schoolmaster, because he sees to it that his athletes take along plenty of books and use them during the day. At McPherson, the boys spent several hours studying, Wednesday, some of them doing quite a bit of work at the public library. The forthcoming finals, starting the week of Jan. 22, add to the zest of book using.

Colds and bad coughs were a handicap to most of the Ottawans on the trip. Two, Willard Beaman and Burton Cowan, were not too well and so saw little service in the McPherson battle.

Lyman Morgan, cold for the past two weeks, regained part of his shooting heat against McPherson. He set off the fireworks by dunking in as sensational a one-handed shot as he has registered in his collegiate career. The Ottawa scoring throughout the game was never spasmodic. The Braves simply kept up a constant, even fire at the basket, adding a couple of points every two or three minutes.

Against McPherson, Ottawa did better than they had this season on free throws, making 12 out of 20 chances.
