

tion (so we aren't always "meeting the same teams"), yet the distance travelled for most teams will be less than to many of the national conventions. Strong provinces with active officers and good communication among the member chapters will provide benefits to our students

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without detracting from (indeed giving added strength to) the national organization. We have always known that for PKD to be a strong national organization, the individual members, the local chapters, and the provinces must be active. Let's begin at the local level to enter this new decade with such a

goal in mind. The way in which we meet our challenges will determine whether the problems of the '70s will

become the burdens or the benefits

of the '80s.

However, we should be cognizant of the fact that a well-conceived and properly documented research design often receives the approbation of research administrations. We must carefully explain the specifics of the investigative paradigm in order to demonstrate that the completed research has the capacity to provide significant and reliable knowledge about communication behavior.

Obviously, the research design must involve a specification of the precise manner in which the data will be collected, verified, and analyzed. Prior to the submission of the grant request, the potential researcher should examine the standard references in the field. One of those sources which is especially relevant to communication research is the text which is edited by Emmert and Brooks. This book, Methods of Research Communication, 2 provides an excellent discussion of research designs as well as the methods and instruments available to the researcher.

Let us firmly resolve that the new decade will reflect a "Great Awakening" in the area of forensic research. Let us further resolve that Pi Kappa Delta shall become a catalyst for this revival.

As you return to your typewriter

and computer please note that all manuscripts must be prepared in accordance with **The MLA Style Street** (second edition).

I am confident that there is a rich reservoir of creative research within our Pi Kappa Delta family. We have an obligation to investigate, to explore, and to share. Our collective voice, strengthened by significant research publications, may be the most effective rejoinder to those journalists who view rhetoric, per se, in a pejorative light. Research can help to establish the parameters of a defensible rhetoric, one which is designed to train intelligent, effective, and spokesmen responsible democracy.

This is our research target for the new decade. I suggest that we focus on that objective with the same dedication, diligence, and determination which Pi Kappa Delta has exemplified in the past.

From the Editor ...

As the January issue goes to press we have received one statement for our "Points of View" feature. This is heartening. I was ready to conclude that no one among our membership was willing to make a statement. Perhaps this will "prime the pump."

There are matters of concern which should motivate comment. Walt Murrish is challenging all of us toward needed research. President Hufford has severed our relationship with CIDD. The National Council is in the process of site selection for 1981 Convention. Your views on these matters are valuable to all of PKD and especially to those whom you have elected to make decisions.

My reaction to ending our support for CIDD is mixed. While I may not be fully satisfied with the topics selected by the committee nor with the process which allows a plurality to bind us to a debate proposition, I don't think withdrawing the support, and thus influence, is the best way to go. If Pi Kappa Delta desires to have an influence which reflects our particular philosophy, then we need to stay on the inside. Our voice will not be heard if we have no representative. President Hufford has suggested that most of us are members of another of the several groups which sponsor CIDD. However, we may be a minority voice in such groups and have little influence. I feel certain that our influence will be significantly diminished without a voice in CIDD.

The convention sites being investigated by President Hufford seem desirable. We have not tried a Fiorida convention during my membership in PKD. The Atlantic coast would also be a new area. We have used sites close to the Rockies. That, too, could be a pleasant place to convene in 1981.

Several authors have indicated concerns for the 1980's in this issue. It appears likely that travel for forensics will be curtailed. This means new approaches, or perhaps a return to older methods, for providing opportunities for speakers to develop communication excellence.

This might be a time for us to turn for guidance to our fellow faculty members of the speech communication departments which support us. The decade of the seventies has witnessed the development of practices in debate which are somewhat apart from the guidance provided in fundamentals of speech and other public address courses. The balance has shifted from emphasis on persuasive delivery of fully developed arguments to an almost machine-like presentation of evidence and the introduction of myriad arguments. Perhaps we should ask our colleagues if this is what they wish to support as speechmembers of the communication profession. There is a tendency among those of us who coach forensics to adopt the approach which wins rounds judged by experts. We seem to accept criteria which may have little validity in the larger universe of speech communication. If by doing so we create an "art form" which has limited value beyond the realms of intercollegiate debate, then we perpetuate an activity that has, as its chief value, the creation of positions for debate coaches. I would hope that during the eighties the emphasis in debate will shift so that a good contest debate will also be a good debate when presented to an educated audience. I would hope this can be achieved without losing the strength of research which has always been the basis for sound argument in debate.

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
