The object of the college Y. W. C. A. is to promote growth in grace and fellowship and aggressive Chrisiian work by and for the student. It is the purpose of the Association to strengthen and enlarge the Christian ideals, and to be helpful in every way to every student. Culture does not stand for intellectual attainment alone. Without Christian character there can be no culture that deserves the name. This organization supplements the work of the church and exerts its influence in the direction of the development of true, practical, Christian, womanly character. It is coming more and more to be regarded as an essential part of college life—a part of which no girl can well afford to deprive herself.

MEMBERSHIP.

The membership is divided into the active and associate membership. Any young woman who is a member of an evangelical church may become a member. All other young women of good moral character may become associate members.

DEVOTIONAL MEETINGS.

Regular weekly meetings are held each Sunday at 4 p. m. in Olympian hall. Every effort is put forth by the devotional committee to make these meetings interesting and helpful. These meetings are led by the members of the organization, and in this way great benefit and training is given to each girl.

BIBLE STUDY.

The Y. W. C. A. offers three classes in Bible study. These are conducted by interested and competent teachers. Credit is given by the faculty for work done in any of these organized classes. Every seeker after knowledge should become a member of one of these classes. Such an one cannot wish to be only slightly informed in regard to Bible truths and the best methods of carrying on personal religious work.

MISSIONS.

The missionary department of this Association has organized five classes for the study of missions in various parts of the world. The classes are led by students approved by the faculty, and credit is given for the work done.

SOCIAL.

The organization would be incomplete without the social department. It is the work of the social committee to provide amusement and entertainment and any help that is needed by the new girls. A reception is given to the new students at the beginning of the fall term in order that we may become better acquainted. A short program is usually rendered the first part of the evening, and the remainder of the time spent in a social way.

The aim of the Young Men's Christian Association is summed up in its motto: "The Mind, the Spirit and the Body." The symmetrical development of the three-fold functions is sought by this organization of young men. The work of the Association is broad and extensive and is extended to every young man and helps him to lead a strong, manly life.

MEETINGS.

Meetings are held every Sunday at 4 p. m. in Philal Hall, throughout the college year, at which topics of interest to students are discussed by the boys in that free, brotherly way which characterizes those meetings. At various times men, who are specialists in their line, address the meetings. Last year a series of life-work meetings, intended to aid men in choosing a lifework, were attended with much interest. Every young man is urged to attend and take part in these meetings and secure therefrom inspiration and

BIBLE STUDY.

It is well recognized that no education, however extensive, is complete without a knowledge of the word of God. The courses of the Y. M. C. A. are arranged to suit the needs of a busy man, requiring from 15 to 30 minutes' study. As far as possible the classes are under faculty leaders, and the method of instruction is not by lecturing, but by open discussion. A large number of the boys are pursuing these courses with profit. The following are the courses adopted by the Association:

FIRST YEAR'S COURSE.

Study in the Life of Christ, by H. B. Sharman, based on a "Harmony of the Gospels." Both books in cloth, \$1.25; paper, 75 cents.

SECOND YEAR'S GOURSE.

Studies in the Acts and Epistles, by Edward I.
Bosworth. Based on "Records and Lectures of the Apostolic Age." Both books in cloth, \$1.25: paper, 75 cents.

THIRD YEAR'S COURSE.

Studies in the Old Testament Characters by Webster White. Based on "Old Testament Records, Poems and Addresses." Books in cloth, 90 cents.

FOURTH YEAR'S COURSE.

Studies in the teachings of Jesus and His Apostles, by Edward I. Bosworth. In cloth, 75 cents; in paper, 50 cents.

Books may be returned in good condition at the end of the year, and the Association refund, 50 cents for them. The faculty has recognized the importance of this work and has given full credit for work done under certain regulations.

INTER-COLLEGIATE.

The Inter-collegiate committee keeps the Association in touch with the world-wide movement. By frequent visits of the State Secretary and others, new life is infused into our Association, and practical methods are put into operation.

SOCIAL.

The Association realizes that man is a social being and enjoys a good time. The first social of the year is held in connection with the Y. W. C. A., in the new chapel, on the first Saturday evening of the school year, to which every student is invited. In addition to this "stag socials" for men are held to "break the ice" and establish cordiality between all classes of boys.

MEMBERSHIP.

In connection with the social committee, this committee meets all trains and welcomes the new students to our midst. In every way possible the new student is made to feel at home and is aided in securing room and board. Be free to use this committee, for it will be glad to help you. In addition to this work the membership continues a canvass for new members throughout the year. All students are eligible to active or associate membership.

MISSIONARY.

The study class is carried on in the same way as the Blble work. A knowledge of the field, its needs and its workers, are necessary to a proper missionary spirit among Christians, and it is the aim of the missionary committee to supply this information and awaken missionary zeal. The class will be in charge of one of the professors.

THE TWO ASSOCIATIONS.

THE GENEVA CONFERENCE.

At Lake Geneva, Wis., near Chicago, each year are held two conferences, one for the Y. M. C. A. in June, and the other in August, for the Y. W. C. A. Delegates are sent from colleges in the whole Middle West to this gathering. Our University has been represented each year in both conferences. There a host of good things are in store for those who attend, and those of us who do not attend rely on our delegates to give us the benefit of their experience there. This proves of lasting good to our Associations. The ten days spent there are ten days of labor and recreation—ten days of contact personally with men and women who are the best in the land, men and women who are pre-eminently qualified to counsel-ten days of heart to heart talks with God. If possible, be one of those who go to represent your Association this year. You will never regret it. It is the opportunity of a lifetime,

THE MORNING WATCH.
