given by the top strata of our nation's college and university students did have a real effect on the climate of public opinion which made possible the adoption of these proposals."

Forgive me if I talk of debating. I've been a debate coach for over thirty years and I am best acquainted with its values. Those of you who have been most interested in drama, oral interpretation, and radio - television can cite values with me, case for case. But whatever the form of the activity, we in speech can be proud that our past students stand high today among the leaders of our nation who are trying to bring a sense of human balance out of economic, and political the social, changes that have been created by the phenomenal increase in the knowledge of our physical world that has taken place during the past fifty years.

As I stand here this afternoon, I predict a greater, wider horizon for speech activities if we continue to shape our students to the full realization that in a free society such as ours, the welfare of all citizens depends ultimately upon public opinion and that the person who has an idea or recognizes a fallacy in the ideas of others and fails to speak is worse than a person with no ideas. If the concept of freedom of speech as a right of our democracy is to live as a vibrant force for a freer man and a better society, we must continue to train our students to exercise certain responsibilities. They must acquire a knowledge of local, state, national, and even international problems. They must learn to evaluate proposals critically. recognize emotional appeals, and suspend judgment until they are in a position to draw logical, non-emotional conclusions. They must develop the ability to express their ideas clearly and forcefully. They must realize, sanction, and support the right of others to express their ideas as freely as they would demand the right for themselves. They must never forget that democracy without people who speak freely and forcefully is an empty term.

These are criteria that educators must keep before them when they plan

programs for the superior student. The belief that these criteria have been before us, at least in part, in most of our endeavors is why I'm strongly prejudiced in favor of speech activities and why I believe I am not alone in my attitude. I'm firmly convinced that if our speech program had nothing to offer but an evening before a row of footlights, a gold cup, or a piece of paper or that it had no lasting values to the student in his adult life, that the predictions made twenty-five years ago that speech activities were dying would have come true and we would not be here today. I'm also sure that each of us is happy to have had a small part in the speech history of American education. But I charge each of us as we look to the educational horizons of tomorrow that we do so with the words of John Ruskin ringing in our ears. "When we build . . . let it not be for present delights nor for present use alone. Let it be such work as our descendants will thank us for, and let us think . . . that a time is to come when these stones will be held sacred because our hands have touched them, and that men will say as they look upon the labor, and the wrought substance of them, 'See! This our fathers did for us'."

And thus, I submit that speech has and does provide an honors program for the superior minded, talented, and motivated student and that we can be proud of the record we have made.
