## FRANKLIN COUNTY O. U. STUDENTS, 120

**OBTAIN HIGHER EDUCATION  
WITHOUT TAX LEVY.**

**Many Other Towns Obligated To  
Support Junior College, Get-  
ting Less for Money.**

Ottawa University this year is providing college education for 120 Franklin county students at no cost to taxpayers. While other towns the size of Ottawa in the state are maintaining expensive, tax-supported junior colleges for their students who are able to obtain only two years of advanced work, Ottawa may and does send its students to a fully accredited, four-year university at a small tuition cost.

That phase of the university value to the community is not apparent until it is known that possibly half the families in Ottawa have had one or more members attending Ottawa University from one to four years. Some of these students though of meager circumstances, have secured an education at O. U. They have gone out to win fame and fortune.

Many of the students who have attended the university have remained in Ottawa to occupy places of responsibility. Almost all of the business institutions in the city have at least one or more former O. U. students or alumni in the firm.

In spite of the fact that Ottawa University is one of the biggest assets to the city, it probably is the realization of what the school has done for the youth of the past, what it is doing in the present, and what it will do in the future, that leads local citizens to unite so solidly in the Chamber of Commerce-sponsored drive for \$5,000 to go to the current university budget. The campaign will open April 21 under the leadership of J. L. Wassmer who will direct a corps of 65 workers in soliciting contributions.

## WORKERS' DINNER FOR O. U. DRIVE

TEAMS PRIMED TONIGHT FOR  
START TOMORROW

Subscription Blanks Will List  
Advantages Of Having O. U.  
As a Town Asset

The lid will be blown off the  
Ottawa University drive for \$5,000  
sponsored by the Chamber of  
Commerce, tonight at a workers'  
dinner at 6:30 in the Nelson hotel.  
Actual campaigning by the  
five teams will begin tomorrow  
morning.

Subscription blanks to be used  
in soliciting funds remind the  
contributors of the many advant-  
ages of the university being lo-  
cated here. The fact that stu-  
dents and faculty members an-  
nually spend at least \$170,000 in  
Ottawa leads the list. Other ad-  
vantages disclosed are that a  
third of those enrolled at the  
school are from Franklin coun-  
ty and that O. U. is a fully ac-  
credited 4-year college. The twin  
development of the university and  
town is emphasized. Prospective  
donors are reminded that the \$1,-  
250,000 investment saves Ottawa  
from \$8,000 to \$40,000 annually,  
the amount which would be need-  
ed to support a junior college.  
Other towns the size of Ottawa  
in the state not having 4-year  
colleges maintain junior colleges.

The list of advantages further  
points out that over 5,000 stu-  
dents have attended Ottawa Uni-  
versity and that at least 50 per  
cent of the more substantial fam-  
ilies of the city have had some  
member attending the school.  
Since the enrollment each year is  
made up of students from many  
states, in addition to those peo-  
ple from Ottawa, the general com-  
mittee feels that O. U. is one of  
the best publicity assets the town  
has.

J. L. Wassmer, chairman of the  
drive committee, said that every-  
thing is in readiness to begin  
work. All workers are confident  
of the success of the campaign,  
Mr. Wassmer said.

# TOTAL FOR O. U. UP TO \$3,863.00

DRIVE IS \$1,137 SHORT OF ITS GOAL

Chairman Wassmer Urges Solicitors to Try to Wind Up Effort This Week

Workers on the Ottawa University drive spent a busy morning and ran the total for the first seven days of the campaign up to \$3,863 which is \$1,137 short of the \$5,000 goal.

J. L. Wassmer, who is directing the drive for the Chamber of Commerce, continued urging solicitors to complete their work as soon as possible. Since the amount reported today includes most of the large gifts sought by the special teams, the work of obtaining the balance of the \$5,000 is largely up to the solicitors working under the 5-team captains. Wassmer would like to have the drive finished this week. As soon as all teams complete work "clean-up" committees will check over the list to see that no one is overlooked.

Not many refusals were being met. As a rule everyone was as generous as financial conditions would permit. When it was explained to most people that the university annually spends close to \$170,000 in Ottawa, that it leaves the city several thousand dollars a year since no junior college is needed, and that O. U. has been a cultural force in the city for 72 years, most of those called on were willing to make contributions.

## O. U. PLACED SECOND

**C. of E. Won Triangular—Koehler  
Set New Hurdle Mark.**

Taking 11 firsts and placing heavily in all events, speedsters from College of Emporia ran away with the triangular track and field meet on Cook field yesterday afternoon. They scored 79 points while Ottawa was collecting 46 counters to nose out Baker which picked 39 points.

Ideal weather set the stage for a fast meet and the men came through in several events. In a closely contested high hurdles race Fred Koehler of Ottawa nosed out his field and hung up a new Ottawa school record of 15.5 seconds. Edward Wiberg and Bill Mattis finished right behind him after Mitchell of Baker fell at the last hurdle. Later Mattis stepped off the low hurdles in 25.2 seconds, just two seconds short of the O. U. record.

Asa Eagles tossed the javelin 182 feet to win the third and last first place for the Braves.

Carey of Emporia clipped off the mile in four minutes and 33.3 seconds, pulling away from McKinney of Baker in the stretch. The 880-yard run was won by Marshall of Emporia in two minutes and one second. Schnacke of Baker went six feet in the high jump to make the best leap scored by Kansas conference athletes this season. Rock of Emporia broad jumped 22 feet, 5 inches to win first place easily.

Bob Clift of Emporia by winning the 100 and 220-yard dashes and taking a fourth in the broad jump was high with 11 points.

The meet indicated that the conference track crown is very sure to be worn by College of Emporia unless Kansas Wesleyan can turn them back. The championship meet will be held in Ottawa on May 21.
