

O. U. SQUAD TO HASTINGS

Coach Godlove Takes Four to Meet Tomorrow.

Coach Dick Godlove and four Ottawa University athletes left this morning for Hastings, Neb., to participate in the annual Hastings College Relays tomorrow.

Don Meek will enter the shotput and discus, Jack O'Neal will contest in the 100-yard dash, T. C. Bundy will throw the javelin, and Edward Wiberg will run the high hurdles.

The meet in Nebraska annually brings together some of the leading college track and field stars in the middle west.

Godlove had expected to enter a mile relay team, but an injury to Omer Brenton Wednesday at Baldwin prevented his doing so. Brenton was spiked in his left leg when a high school boy got in the way at the finish of the 100-yard dash.

Next week will also be a big one for the Braves. They have a double dual meet with Haskell and St. Benedict's at Lawrence on Wednesday, and will enter contestants in the K. U. Relays a week from Saturday.

O. U. GOLF TEAM DOWNS EMPORIA

Von Arb Led Field Here With One Over Par on 18 Holes—Over-shot at Ninth To Go Above.

Ottawa University golfers defeated College of Emporia, 14 to 4, on Ottawa Country club course, in the opening match of the season for both teams. George Von Arb, Ottawa, Kansas conference champion for two years, led the field with a brilliant 73, one over par, for 18 holes. Right behind him was his teammate, Ernest Woods, with a 76.

Von Arb came up to the ninth hole on the last round with a possibility of finishing in par or even a stroke under. He was far down the fairway on his drive from the tee and pitched to the lake side on his second stroke. On his third he overshot and dropped the ball back of the tennis court fence which gave him a penalty stroke for laying out. He was still aiming at par, however, when his putt from the lay-in spot missed the cup by a fraction of an inch.

Woods also had a torrid afternoon but he played in hard luck from time to time, earning a total of five penalty strokes on the 18 holes.

Foster Rickenbacker and Don Campbell, playing the No. 3 and 4 positions for Ottawa, had a tough time with their opponents, but emerged with victory by a single point, Rickenbacker taking his match from Kaeler, Emporia, by the margin of a single point.

BUSY WEEK FOR O. U. TRACK CREW

Braves Meet Baker Tomorrow, With Edge to Wildcats—O. U. in Hastings Relays Saturday.

This week is to be a busy one for Ottawa University track and field men. Tomorrow they go to Baldwin for a dual meet with Baker University, an affair which has twice been postponed because of rain, vacation and what not. Friday, Coach Dick Godlove will take his hopefuls to the Hastings, Neb., relays, which are to be run off on Saturday.

The edge in the meet tomorrow still goes to the highly improved Baker team, but the Braves will probably make a close meet out of it. Don Meek is counted on by the Ottawans to be a heavy point winner. Last night in practice he got the discus out to 140 feet which is a fair throw. He also has tossed the shot out to around 41 feet and under pressure could probably do better than that.

Jack O'Neal was slightly sluggish in his practice jumps at the 100 and 220-yard sprints yesterday, but will probably be in better shape tomorrow. Leonard Fergus and Forrest Officer kicked through a neat workout yesterday giving some hope that at least later in the year they may be of help in getting points.

Still puzzling Godlove is what to do about the high jump and broad jump, two events in which the Braves have little hope unless some fellow with springy legs suddenly appears in the training camp.

The Hastings meet will bring together the cream of the college crop in three or four middle western states. Competition will be keen for all places, seconds and thirds being more sought after by the athletes than the first and second places in ordinary meets.

Godlove has not decided as to the makeup of the team which will go to the Nebraska meet, preferring to wait until after the Baker meet to name his crew. The chances are that two or three carloads will make the trip.

O. U. TO OBSERVE 74TH BIRTHDAY

**SCHOOL WAS FOUNDED ON
APRIL 21, 1865**

O. U. Speakers in Churches Sunday — Foundation Drive Launched Next Tuesday

Ottawa University will have a birthday tomorrow, the 74th anniversary of the founding of the school in 1865 at a time when Ottawa was just beginning and only a handful of white men lived on the banks of the Marais des Cygnes river. The observance of the occasion will be next Sunday morning with several churches in the city having special services to note the significant occasion.

Linked up observation is that the campaign in members of the school is asked to make this by local business started Tuesday dinner at the o'clock.

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Linked up with the Charter day observance is the announcement that the university will open a campaign in which local members of the Ottawa Foundation, the school financing plan, will be asked to make annual contributions. This movement, sponsored by local business men, will be started Tuesday evening with a dinner at the Nelson hotel at 6 o'clock.

Sdmund Lister, again chairman of the drive, said that the committee expects to raise \$2,500. Forty or fifty workers will be engaged in the work which is to be completed within a week.

The Charter day observance on Sunday will find Dr. Andrew B. Martin speaking at First Baptist church, Dr. Harold E. Conrad at North Ottawa Baptist church, Dr. Allen P. Wikgren for a few minutes at First Methodist church, Paul Barker at Federated church, Rev. J. E. Woods at the Christian church, and Dr. Evan Reiff at the Church of the Brethren.

The Foundation is made up of Baptists, alumni and friends of the university who have expressed a desire to make contributions to the school each year. Mr. Lister said that not only will old members be approached, but new members for the organization will also be solicited.

TWO O. U. TEAMS AT K. U.

Ottawa University has two relay teams entered in the K. U. Relays at Lawrence today and two men are also entered in the open events. Leonard Fergus, Edward Wiberg, Omer Brenton and Jack O'Neal will compete in the 880-yard relay. Fergus, Brenton, O'Neal and Tommy Allan will make a try in the mile relay. O'Neal will enter the open 100-yard dash and Jack Ramsey will participate in the pole vault.

O. U. RELAY TEAM SET SCHOOL RECORD

Did Not Place in K. U. Relays But Set New School Mark in Mile Relay.

A surprising performance by the Ottawa University mile relay team competing in the K. U. Relays Saturday afternoon was the feature of the big meet as far as Ottawans were concerned. The team, composed of Leonard Fergus, Tommy Allan, Jack O'Neal and Omer Brenton, finished sixth in the race, but in doing so ran the distance in 3 minutes and 26.4 seconds which is faster than the Ottawa school record.

The performance was noteworthy in that it was thought at the beginning of the season the mile squad would not be as powerful as the one last year which consistently ran around 3 minutes and 31 seconds.

The 880 team which also ran in the meet finished fifth after winning its head in 1 minute and 31.2 seconds. Ed Wiberg, Fergus, Brenton and O'Neal were the four Braves who made up this team.

O'Neal did not compete in the 100-yard dash and Jack Ramsey did not take part in the pole vault.

Next Friday afternoon College of Emporia and Baker will come to Ottawa for a triangular meet with the Braves. Regarded as the strongest squads in the Kansas conference, these three teams should have a close and exciting meet. It would be difficult to pick a winner, as there is not much difference in the power of the schools. Ottawa defeated Baker by winning the last two events in a close meet, and Baker took C. of E. by winning the last two events in a contest last week.

HIGH INTEREST IN TRIANGULAR MEET

Ottawa, Baker and C. of E. Evenly Matched for Track Contests Here Friday.

Interest among sports fans is fanning to a lively flame over the Ottawa-Baker-C. of E. triangular track and field meet which is to be held on Cook field Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The three teams, tops in the Kansas conference this spring, are evenly matched.

Among the most interesting of the races will be the 880-yard run which will find Williams of Baker, Marshall of Emporia and Leonard Fergus of Ottawa battling for first place. Williams rules as favorite by virtue of his victory over Marshall. Fergus did not run this event in the Baker dual, so no basis of comparison between the two exists.

Cleland of Baker is expected to win the mile and 2-mile events, but might find Marshall of Emporia giving him plenty of competition in the mile. The high hurdles in which Bill Mattis and Ed Wiberg of Ottawa have entered will also bring out some hard running. Larson of Emporia and Delafield and Cragoe of Baker are top-notchers in this event. The low hurdles will find Walter Reames and Mattis defending Ottawa laurels against the same trio.

The shotput will also be closely contested. Led by Wertzberger, Emporia has three good tossers who will be pushing to collect as many points as possible. Don Meek will be the Ottawa entry in this event and in competition this year has put the heavy ball almost as far as Wertzberger.

Coach Dick Godlove announced that a 25-cent admission will be charged to take care of expenses.

FOUNDATION DRIVE ON

Workers Are Seeking Pledges for Ottawa University

A score of teams were at work today on the Ottawa University Foundation drive hoping to raise \$2,500 for the college in short order. At a dinner last evening at Nelson hotel, Edmund Lister, chairman, told the workers he thought the campaign could be completed within a week.

In a short talk explaining the Foundation, President Andrew B. Martin said that its success depends upon enlistment of a large number of members who will give something to the school each year. He pointed out that large gifts to various enterprises in the United States are declining and that institutions such as Ottawa are finding it advisable to depend on a system whereby small donations may be secured.

Dr. Martin also said that the university hopes to develop a feeling in its constituency which will lead to voluntary giving. He believes that will lead to greater interest and belief in the future of the college.

Workers are calling on all members of the Foundation, there being about 400, and also on new prospects seeking new memberships. Each team of two workers has about 20 to 25 people to interview.

O. U. Foundation Opportunity for Everybody to Contribute

When Ottawa business men start their solicitation of funds for Ottawa University tomorrow morning, it will be the fifth year of work on the Ottawa Foundation, the fund collecting organization of the university. The workers will get instructions at a 6 o'clock dinner tonight at Nelson hotel and begin canvassing early tomorrow.

The Foundation was organized on the basis of enlisting friends of the university to give something each year toward support of the college. The members of the organization do not sign pledges to give a definite amount annually. The size of each contribution is determined at the time at which it is made.

Starting with Baptists throughout the state, the plan was later

taken up by the alumni and then by the citizens of Ottawa. It is yet new and it is hoped it will gradually be expanded to include a large percentage of friends of the university.

President Andrew B. Martin gave new impetus to the movement two years ago when he organized a general committee which controls the activities of the Foundation. This group in the future will take an increasing interest in the promotion of the plan.

The committee in charge of the solicitation this year in Ottawa will call on old members and endeavor to enlist as many new members as possible. The workers will be seeking a total of \$2,500 and hope to complete work within a week. Edmund Lister is chairman of the drive.

TOP TEAMS MEET ON TRACK FRIDAY

C. of E., Baker and Ottawa in a Triangular Here—One Expected To Win in Loop Match.

College of Emporia, Baker and Ottawa, the three top teams of the Kansas conference this year, will meet in a triangular meet on Cook field Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Experts generally agree that one of these three squads will go on to win the conference championship May 13 in Salina, but no one will venture to say which one will turn the trick. There are four other teams in the conference which may give a lot of competition, but for any team outside Ottawa, C. of E. and Baker to win the championship would be a distinct upset.

In the triangular, several events will come up which will be worth watching. Jack O'Neal of Ottawa, immmons of Baker and Haskell of Emporia are expected to have a battle in the two dash events for supremacy. O'Neal and Haskell have both beaten Timmons by slim margins, but Timmons might have enough stuff to win Friday. Emporians are confident Haskell can beat O'Neal. The C. of E. flash was a state high school champion two years ago.

The hurdle races are also expected to bring out competition aplenty, with Edward Wiberg and Bill Mattis of Ottawa meeting Cragoe of Baker and Larson of Emporia. Walter Reames of Ottawa will also be in the running especially in the 120s, and might show something in the highs.

Ottawa will be counting heavily on Don Meek in the discus and the shotput, and on T. C. Bund in the javelin. With good luck these two boys might tow in 10 points for Ottawa, although Meek will have tough competition in the shotput.

All in all, it should be the meet of the season aside from the conference meet at Salina, and will be the only one to be held in Ottawa. Coach Dick Godlove has announced that a 25-cent admission charge will be made.

O. U. TENNIS MEN WIN FROM C. OF E.

Gonser and Trump Main Cogs in
O. U. Machine—First O. U.
Victory in Two Years.

For the first time in two years, Ottawa University tennis players won a tennis meet by going out on the courts at the university yesterday afternoon and defeating College of Emporia net men, four matches to two.

Despite the high wind which made fine play impossible, the matches were evenly contested and it was not until Ottawa won the final doubles match that the afternoon contest was decided. Durl Gonser and Bob Trump proved to be the big powers in the Braves' victory by winning both of their singles matches and then pairing up to take a doubles match from Deputy and Barker of Emporia. This contest found Ottawa winning, 7-5, 2-6, 6-2.

Gonser opened the victory march by turning in a win over Gruber of Emporia. Trump followed with a quick win over Barker. C. of E. kept in the running when Deputy defeated Malvin Marchand of Ottawa, and Wolvington won over Russell Burnett. With the matches tied at two each, Ottawa went into the doubles with enough determination to pull out a pair of victories. Marchand and Gordon Goodwin won their doubles over Wolvington and Gruber in a closely fought match which found two of the sets going to deuce.

Coach Dick Godlove, who is coaching tennis for the first time this year, announced that the team will meet Baker here on Wednesday, and will go to Emporia for a return match with C. of E. on Thursday.

BAPTIST ORGAN PLEASED CROWD

Powell Weaver At His Best At Dedication, As Were Those Who Assisted Him Last Night

A master organist and a fine organ held a large audience entranced for more than an hour last night at First Baptist church. The organist was Powell Weaver, head of the Ottawa University school of music, and the organ was the one recently rebuilt for the church. The occasion was its dedication.

Thunders of applause constantly expressed the appreciation of the audience not only for the performances of Mr. Weaver, and Mr. and Mrs. Edgar D. Kerr and Mr. Everett Fetter who assisted him, but also for the fine organ which was being dedicated. There were a number of out-of-town persons present.

The numbers by Mr. Weaver were especially pleasing. The "Sonata in the Style of Handel" by Wolstenholme was fitting and dignified for the opening dedicatory number. Weaver played in the masterly style that audiences have learned to expect of him. Two of the most pleasing numbers, "Scherzo" and "Toccata", were written by Weaver last summer as parts of a suite for the organ. The last numbers on the program provided a brilliant climax to the concert in which Mr. Weaver further demonstrated his ability as a sincere and capable artist.

Mr. Fetter, playing two violin numbers, and Mr. Kerr, singing a Mendelssohn composition, assisted brilliantly on the program. The two and Mr. Weaver combined with Mrs. Kerr to please the audience in "O Lord Most Holy" by Franck.

Dr. W. A. Elliott, the pastor, opened the dedicatory service with a few well chosen remarks in which he stated that the new organ was being dedicated to the memory of the late F. H. Stannard, who family gave a large contribution to the \$3,500 fund which was raised to meet the rebuilding cost. There is no debt on the instrument as the money was raised before the work was started.

Dr. Elliott led the congregation in a responsive reading, and Dr. Andrew B. Martin gave the prayer of dedication.

The original organ was installed in the church by the Kimball Organ company in 1904. It served well until a few years ago when certain parts wore out. The church, faced with the problem of replacing or rebuilding the instrument, took the advice of experts and rebuilt it. Present last night for the dedication was Max Runge of the Kilgen Organ Co., of St. Louis, which rebuilt the organ. He was well pleased with its performance. The organ was first used last Dec. 11.

Mrs. E. E. Haley is church organist.

O. U. NET MEN STAGE COMEBACK

Pull An Upset by Registering a Tie—O. U. Tennis and Golf Teams at Emporia Today.

Ottawa University net men pulled an upset by tying the Baker University tennis team, three matches to three, in a meet at Ottawa University yesterday afternoon. The Braves were given only an outside chance to win or tie the strong Wildcat team, but succeeded in turning the trick when Durl Gonser and Bob Trump turned in singles victories and then won a doubles match.

Spencer Self, Kansas conference champion last year, turned in the first victory for Baker, beating Malvin Marchand in straight sets. Jewell of Baker then defeated Burnett of Ottawa in straight sets. Trailing by two matches, Ottawa staged a comeback when Bob Trump turned in a triumph over Rebb of Baker after a hard fought match, and Durl Gonser pulled a victory away from Donham of Baker.

Ottawa, Kan., April 28.—(Special)—Ottawa University won a triangular track meet here today with 73½ points, College of Emporia finished second with 53½, and Baker third with 36. A fair day and a fast track brought forth good times and marks, six new meet records being set and two Ottawa school records smashed in the close competition.

About \$900 Has Been Raised, With Most Teams Yet to Report

Edmund Lister, chairman of the Ottawa University Foundation drive, announced that reports from only a few teams indicated that \$900 has been raised toward the goal of \$2,500. He expressed a hope that the campaign will be completed within a few days.

Only three of the teams have made complete reports and three others have made partial reports. That leaves nine of the 15 teams not yet heard from. The workers are to report to the office of Mr. Lister in First National bank building.

The campaign director said the solicitors were meeting with fine cooperation. Apparently most of those being interviewed feel that the university is a worthy institution and that the Foundation is an acceptable channel through which to make regular contributions to the school.

It is hoped that a larger number of supporters will be included in the rolls of contributors when the drive is completed. Already there are a few new members and it is likely that there will be more. Probably the membership in Ottawa should be around 800 and it is now about 500.

Ottawa University's tennis and golf teams fared badly yesterday in matches with Baker teams. While the tennis men were getting no better than an even draw in the battle for places in the conference meet to be held in Salina next week, the golf squad was being soundly beaten by a steady 4-man team from Baker.

In the tennis matches, Bob Trump, Ottawa freshman ace, and Spencer Self, Baker star, won their way to the finals, and with it the right to compete next week at Salina. Both men teamed up with their doubles partners to qualify for the doubles competition. Trump paired with Durl Gonser to defeat Baker's second entrant decisively, while Self and Dan Donham had a little more trouble with Ottawa's team of Marchand and Goodwin. They finally won, 8-6, 6-3.

George Von Arb, defending conference champion, shot a 73 for medalist honors in the golf matches, but received practically no support from his teammates as the Braves lost, 4½ to 13½. There was hardly anything to choose between the Baker men. Welborn shot a 75 for the low Wildcat score, but was closely followed by his teammates, who shot two 76's and a 77 between them.

WON AT STERLING BY CLOSE MARGIN

O'Neal Ran 100-Yard Dash in 9.8; O. U. Nosed Out Emporia by 1 2/3, with Baker Third

One and two-thirds points is not an impressive number as a rule, but it was last night to the Ottawa University Braves. That was the margin by which they won the annual Sterling Relays, scoring 61 5/6 points while College of Emporia was picking up 60 1/6. The meet was just that close all the way; so the competition was so keen that eight of the fourteen meet records were broken.

Jack O'Neal of Ottawa turned in the outstanding performance of the day when he won the 100-yard dash in the brilliant time of 9.8 seconds. He beat out Haskell of Emporia by a pair of yards, the Emporia lad having run a 9.9 heat in the afternoon.

Baker was third in the meet with 45 5/6 points, Bethel fourth with 29, Kansas Wesleyan fifth with 21 1/3, McPherson sixth with 11. Sterling seventh with 6, Friends eighth with 5 5/6, and Bethany ninth with 3. All but Sterling and Friends are in the Kansas conference and will be right back at each other next Friday in the loop meet at Salina.

Ottawa broke its own record in the 880-yard relay by running the distance in 1 minute, 30.9 seconds. Ed Wiberg, Leonard Fergus, Omer Brenton and Jack O'Neal being the runners in this race. That was the only one of the relays won by the Braves, but they won second in the 2-mile, second in the sprint medley, second in the mile, fifth in the distance medley, and fifth in the football relays.

Don Meek set a new meet record in the discus with a toss of 138 feet, 1 inch. Willard Beaman got second in that event with a throw of 121 feet, 11 inches. Meek won the shot-put by pushing it three-quarters of an inch further than Newland of Emporia.

T. C. Bundy, continuing his winning ways in the javelin, set a new meet record with a throw of 178 feet, 8 1/4 inches. In other field events Ottawa's scoring was short, Jack Ramsey tying with Washburn of Emporia in the pole vault, in which Charles Bonebrake of Baker set a new meet record with a vault of 12 feet, 2 inches. Wiberg got a tie for third in the high jump. That meant one-third of a point, and fractions of points were valuable last night.

Ottawa's fine pair of hurdlers, Ed Wiberg and Bill Mattis, had a tough evening, Larson of Emporia winning the highs and Freisen of Bethel taking second. Mattis took third and Wiberg fourth.

Coming down to the final event of the evening, the mile relay, Ottawa was trailing Emporia by a scant margin and needed to take at least three points more in the meet. Baker nosed out Ottawa at the tape to win, but a stroke of fate had earlier doomed Emporia. Presby runners dropped their baton and were able to take no better than fourth. Since points in the relays were counted 10 for first, 7 for second, 5 for third, 3 for fourth and 1 for fifth, that was enough to enable Ottawa to nose out a meet victory. Points in the individual events were counted in the usual 5, 3, 2 and 1 order.

Jack O'Neal's 9.8 seconds mark, considered as one of the best marks of college competition in the state this year, was a new Ottawa school record displacing one held jointly by Aubrey Henshaw and Virgil Livingston since 1931. The 880-yard relay was also a new school record, displacing one set at Sterling last year. Ottawa now holds five of the fourteen meet records at Sterling: the two mentioned above, the high hurdles

mark of 15.2 seconds set by Mattis a year ago, the discus set by Meek and the javelin set by Bundy yesterday.

NOT ALL TRACK EVENTS AT PAR

Sterling Meet a Good Example of Disappointments Along With Surprises; Godlove a Good Sport

A track meet usually considered a so-so affair by fans, has plenty of dramatic minutes. Take for instance the Sterling Relays in which Ottawa beat out Emporia by the narrow margin of 12-3 points. The athletes were on their toes constantly. Every victory by a teammate brought out smiles and yells. Every unexpected defeat was acute disappointment.

While the meet did end in a haze for the Braves, they had their share of disappointing performances. Right at the start, for example, the two Ottawa hurdlers, Ed Wiberg and Bill Mattis, trailed Larson of Emporia and Freiesen of Bethel. Wiberg, holding the school record, was supposed to have won, but he did not and that was a shock to the Braves. But Jack O'Neal evened up the break a few minutes later by winning the 100-yard dash in record time of 9.8 seconds. That brought whoops of joy from the Ottawans.

Big Omer Brenton, who could be the best quarter-miler in the conference, hit a low key in the meet every time he ran and was beaten in every quarter in which he participated. Strange, last week in the Baker-Emporia-Ottawa triangular he was tops, but at Sterling he brought only moans to the Ottawa camp. Two other Ottawa runners, Al Roberts and Leonard Fergus, also failed to measure up to their best and consequently brought frowns and worries to the watching Braves.

Counterbalancing these performances were some by such boys as Forrest Officer, who ran a pair of nice half-miles, at least for him; Don Meek, who won the shotput and discus throw; T. C. Bundy who won the javelin throw and set up a new meet mark in doing so; and Max Alderman, who ran a quarter-mile in the distance medley that was right up to his par.

A team always gets that sort of performance. Some of the boys are up to form and others are down a bit. As it happened, the Braves got enough good breaks to cover up their bad ones and as a result, won the meet.

Coach Dick Godlove was well pleased with the results but believed his team should have done better. By the way, Godlove's honesty met a neat test at the relays. Near the end of the meet with only a point or so separating the teams, a dispute arose as to whether C. of E. should be awarded one point for having finished fifth in the sprint medley. The judges had reported that the fifth team in that particular race did not finish, but Coach Bud Selves was sure that his team, the fifth, had crossed the final line. Points were quite valuable right then, but Godlove, who had heard the argument, stepped up to say that he was sure that the Emporia team had finished the race. So the point was given to C. of E. By keeping still, he might have made sure of a victory that he later got anyway.

Next Friday in the Kansas conference meet at Salina, seven of the nine teams which competed at Sterling will be at each other again dealing out disappointment and joy.

Ottawa Favored to Retain Track Crown

Ottawa, Kan., May 10. — (Special)—Ottawa University, defending champions of Kansas Conference track and field, will find their rule challenged stoutly by College of Emporia and Baker University at the annual conference meet Friday afternoon at Salina. There is also possibility that a dark horse contender, Kansas Wesleyan or Bethel, might come up with sufficient power to win the meet.

Last week Ottawa nosed out Emporia in the Sterling Relays by the slight margin of one and two thirds points; so it is expected that the two squads will battle each other tooth and toe-nail again at Salina. Coach Dick Godlove of Ottawa points out that Baker was not far behind the leaders at Sterling and has a well balanced team. Kansas Wesleyan showed surprising strength in the Sterling meet and may find a high spot, if not first, at Salina. Likewise, Bethel with its star decathlon man, Eric Freiesen, will be a threat.

To compete in the dashes, Godlove will take Jack O'Neal, Omer Brenton and Lyman Morgan; in the middle distances, Brenton, Dorbin Gardner, Max Alderman, Leonard Fergus and Tommy Allan; in the distances, Forest Officer, Oliver Smith, and Al Roberts; in the hurdles, O'Neal, Ed Wiberg, Bill Mattis and Walter Reames; in the weight events, Don Meek, Willard Beaman, Jack Jeffries, T. C. Bundy and Roy Fitzpatrick; and in the other field events, Morgan, Wiberg, Bundy, Beaman, Fitzpatrick and Jack Ramsey.

VON ARB WON IN GOLF

O. U. Entry Six Strokes Under Par in Conference Meet.

George Von Arb, veteran Ottawa University golfer, won the Kansas conference singles championship at Salina yesterday with 213 strokes for 54 holes which was six strokes under par. Welborn of Baker was second with 217 and his teammate, McFerrin, tied for third with Johnson of Wesleyan at 224. Ernest Woods of Ottawa was fifth with 249. The Baker two-man team won out over the Ottawans, 441 to 462, in team play.

Von Arb won his championship by virtue of a blazing second round of the 18-hole course in which he shot a 66 on the par 73 course, one of the most brilliant performances ever made on those links. The victory was the third in a row for the Ottawan.

O. U. WINS TRACK AND FIELD TITLE

Fifth Championship in Row Under Godlove—Well Balanced Team Brought Victory.

Ottawa University track and field athletes retained their leadership of the Kansas conference in the loop meet at Salina yesterday. The Braves scored 49 points while College of Emporia was able to muster a total of 43 for second place honors. Baker trailed the leaders with 37 points, Kansas Wesleyan was fourth with 15, Bethel fifth with 11, McPherson sixth with 8, and Bethany last with 2.

It was the fifth championship in a row for the Ottawans who seem to be in a golden era under the tutoring of Coach Dick Godlove. The Braves started their string by winning a share in the 1938 basketball crown, then followed with the 1938 track championship, the 1938 football honors, the 1939 basketball championship, and now the 1939 track title. No group of teams in the history of the school have turned in such a feat, and it is doubtful that any of the conference teams have ever before won so many championships in a row.

Just how the Braves won the meet yesterday might well be called a mystery, for the summary shows that they won only two events, Jack O'Neal taking the 100-yard dash and Don Meek the discus; and they tied for two others, Jack Ramsey tying with Charles Bonebrake of Baker in the pole vault and T. C. Bundy deadlocking with Newland of Emporia for the javelin. As a matter of fact, the victory was the result of a well balanced track and field team plugging away in every event to take two firsts and tie for two, four seconds and tie for one, six thirds and tie for one, and four fourths.

Ottawa trailed practically all the meet and it was not until the last four events that any ray of victory hope shone through the cloudy day. If victory could be credited to any one event, that would have to go to the discus in which the Braves scored eight points, by virtue of Don Meek winning first, Alpha Fitzpatrick taking third, and Jack Jeffries fourth. The results of that when posted gave Ottawa a half-point lead. Then Ramsey and Bundy came through in the pole vault, the former tying for first and Bundy tying for third. Fitzpatrick showed up with a needed third in the broad jump, and Bundy got his unusual tie in the javelin at 184 feet, 11 1/2 inches. Officials argued over the measuring for a half hour, but finally decided to call it a tie and go home. In the last five reported events Ottawa won 2 1/2 points which brought home the victory.

Jack O'Neal of Ottawa and Haskell of Emporia split honors in the two dash events, O'Neal capturing the century in 10 seconds, Haskell taking the 220-yard affair in 21.8 seconds. Jack tied with Eric Friesen of Bethel for high scoring honors with 11 points each, O'Neal's other points coming on seconds in the low hurdles and furlong sprint.

"Bud" Larson of Emporia won both hurdle races in nice time but was pressed closely in each race by Ottawa and Bethel runners.

The 440-yard dash, one of the feature events of the afternoon, brought a lot of good running with Seaman of Baker coming through to win by a few feet from Omer Brenton of Ottawa in second and Davis of Wesleyan in third.

AN INTERESTING GRAVE

In Highland cemetery, two miles southeast of Ottawa, near the main entrance gate I found an interesting grave. The marker is an old time tombstone slab of marble, gray with mildew and moss. On the top edge is the name, K. I. Okazaki. The front inscription is difficult to read, being covered with dirt and mildew, but the one word at the top which attracted me to the grave is Japanese in large letters, for Mr. Okazaki was the first student from Japan to enroll at O. U. The inscription reads, "Formerly a Student in Tokio University. Accepted Christianity and was baptized March 1885. Entered Ottawa University March 1886, to prepare for missionary service. Died January 2, 1887, aged 22 years. A young man of rare ability and of large hopes for the Christianizing of his native land."

I have been told that his father, a very rich man, disowned this son when he accepted Christ, but later came to visit this grave.

Mr. Okazaki was a very popular student socially as well as scholastically. The girls, I am told were crazy about him and wanted above all to find out his age, which he in true oriental style would not tell. Finally the girls got the help of Mrs. O. C. Charlton to find out his age. Mrs. Charlton, the wife of Prof. O. C. Charlton was a charming social leader among the students, and the Cottage was later named for her. At an all school social Mrs. Charlton and the girls surrounded Mr. Okazaki and began to talk about ages, some giving their own ages and that of their friends. Finally Mrs. Charlton said, "Well, Mr. Okazaki how old are you?" A faint flush tinged his bronze face, a merry twinkle filled his dark eyes and with a low oriental bow he answered, "Excuse me Madam, but it would be more interesting if I do not tell."

On the base of the grave marker is this lovely statement, "Erected by his fellow students."

To me an alumnus of O. U. this lovely grave is a shrine and should be placed in the list with the Taub Jones home and the Indian burying ground, for students to visit and cherish. It marks the beginning of that far reaching

influence for good which O. U. has always exerted. It brings to mind those lines from our sacred O. U. song, "May thousands to you flow and thousands from you go, to heal earth's sin and woe. My Ottawa."

Ottawa Scores Grand Slam in Kansas Circuit

Ottawa, Kan., May 16.—(Special)—Ottawa University track and field athletes completed an unusual and unique sports record when they won the Kansas conference track and field meet at Salina last week. That victory, pulled out of an Empire grasp at the amen minute, gave the Ottawans a grand slam in major sports for the 1938-39 year. Under the guidance of Coach Dick Godlove the Braves were undefeated and untied in their football season last fall, came thru with a winner in the basketball race and now add the track crown to their record. It is the first time in the history of sports at Ottawa that a group of teams has ever accomplished such a feat.

BRAVES TEAMS WON THREE SPORT TITLE

Track Championship Fifth in a Row Under Godlove—Pays Tribute to Fans.

With the winning of the track and field championship last Friday at Salina, Ottawa University athletes completed a perfect record in the major sports of the Kansas conference. They won all three crowns, football, basketball and track, a feat which has never before been duplicated by an Ottawa team and seldom, if ever, by another conference school.

Not only that, the track championship was the fifth in a row for Coach Dick Godlove and his boys. The string started out in 1938 when the Braves tied for basketball honors, and then continued with undisputed ownership of the 1938 track crown, the 1938 football (in which the Braves were undefeated), the 1939 basketball, and now the 1939 track and field crown.

The grand slam in major sports and the continuance of the athletic reign of the Braves brought down all sorts of compliments from coaches and athletically interested people all over the state. Teams just do not do that sort of thing every year or so, as witness the fact that some mighty good Ottawa teams in years past have never before turned the trick of taking the championships in football, basketball and track.

What will the Braves do next year? That is a big question, but they probably will not win all three and no one could howl much if they won not a one. Godlove and his athletes, however, already have their eyes set on next year, casting around for likely looking prospects.

Godlove does not say much about the unique record which his teams have established other than "We have some mighty fine boys out here and you can't forget that we have the best group of downtown supporters of any school in the conference." He is right, too, but it takes all three to have successful teams, good boys, a good coach and a bunch of good fans.

In competition for the mythical all-sports crown of the conference, Ottawa University scored three points in the ranking with the lowest possible score. College of Emporia with 7½ was second and Bethany with 11½ was third Bethel College was not ranked because it did not start its conference competition until the basketball season.
