Sioux City, Ia. (AP)—Ottawa, Kas., University and South Da-kota University will play tonight for the championship in the annual Morningside invitational bas-

ketball tournament, each having won their encounters last night.

O. U. SQUAD BACK, **TIRED BUT HAPPY**

Cleaned Up on Its Trip, Winning Final Game at Sioux Falls, 39 to 33-At McPherson Saturday.

A tired, though effective, Otta-wa University basketball team made a complete sweep of its 3made a complete sweep of its 3game northern trip by trimming

33, in a ragged, thrill-packed battle Saturday night. Previously

Braves to break the scoring ice, the Ottawa Braves went to work and on five quick goals by Omer Brenton and counters by Don Meek and Lyman Morgan gained an 18 to 7 lead at the quarter. As the second quarter opened, the Northerners came to life and battled back into the game as the traveling Ottawans noticeably felt the effects of their long trip. Screening and hit-ting the home basket effectively, they brought the score to 23 to 24 as the half ended. Omer Brenton went out of the game on fouls shortly before the melee reached the midway point. Four minutes after the third period started, Goodbarn, a taller center than Brenton, left the Sioux Falls lineup on fouls.

Coach Dick Godlove sent in Walt Reames to handle the center spot, and Reames, lacking in experience at the position came through for the boys, not with goals but with good defensive play. Early in the third period, the Ottawans pulled themselves together, perhaps profiting from a between-halves lec-

ture by Godlove, and quickly had control of the game.

The reliable Morgan dropped in a neat one to set the boys in motion. Bob Schupbach and Reames dropped in free tosses; then Meek and Swetnam came through with sizzlers while the Dakotans were scoring a lone basket. As the quarter ended, Morgan iced the game with a long one at 35 to 27. About all the boys did down the final stretch was to play conserva-tive ball and hold off the driving Sioux Falls team.

They returned last Sunday after-noon from their northern trip on which they defeated Morningside College, South Dakota University and Sioux Falls College.

The big victory of the trip was chalked up over South Dakota, a team which is doped to win the North Central conference cham-pionship. In that game the Otta-wans for 14 minutes were a great ball club running up an 18 to 3 score. Then they let down and Dakota came within one point of catching them in the third quarter. In the stretch, the Braves poured on the power and came through the winner, 37 to 30.

Dating from far back where tall slim McJurin Miller and the season of when tall, slim Melvin Miller led the Bulldogs in close victories over Ottawa at the time when such men as Cliff Binns and Frank Kepner were on the local roster, most of the tussles have been close and hard fought.

Tomorrow night might find a repetition of any one of those historic games, for the Bulldogs have shown flashes of power and might manage to pull enough of those flashes together to make out a full

Fans here still recall a great ball game of 1930 when the Bulldogs defeated Ottawa here, 38 to 26, but only after a terrific battle in the first half. Frank Kepner, ace Ottawa forward, was a hot shot in the first five minutes greatly and the first five minutes the first five minutes, standing far out on the court and dropping six long shots through the net from a long shots through the net from a favorite spot over on the east side of the university gym. He cooled off, however, and Melvin Miller and his cohorts went to work and finally overcame the big lead to win the game, displaying some of the form which made the Bulldogs that year one of the "greats" of all-time conference basketball.

Ottawa bristled with the charge that was to make them a championship team. Led by Gerald Barker, the Braves turned back the Bulldogs, 33 to 30, at a time when the Mc-pherson team was slated to go through for the title.

Fans observed last week that the rule of five years' standing had been modified and that the Otta-wa University center or the Bethel pivot man, whichever team had the ball, was allowed to remain in the outer half of the circle as long as he wanted to so long as he did not have the ball in which case he could stay only the usual three seconds.
