This thinksheet displays the behavior of a certain single primordial sound beginning certain I-E roots and represented by "digamma," which in very ancient Greek was written somewhat as our English "F," "f." In NT roots beginning with that sound, we get words meaning "speak" [from this root also, "word"], "work" [directly from this root], and "see" [thus, "vi-sible"; but also "vision" and "idea"]. Gather those up and you realize that the sound can come into English as initial glottal stop [e.g., "idea"], "w" ["word," "work"], "v" ["vision"]. Add your English dictionary, then use Strong for the three roots, then catch for-you juicy scriptures, and make something of it all! You could hit, for that third root, also "veda" and "wisdom"! In these few words all these languages are in action: Sanskrit, Greek, Latin, Teutonic [Anglo-Saxon, English]! From your knowledge of these cultures, what cross-meanings can you catch? And what Hebrew-world parallels?
