

FORMER OTTAWA COACH JOINS STAFF IN JULY

Prominent Washburn Grad Popular Choice.

**He Will Also Tutor Freshman Grid
Candidates; Success Started at
Fort Scott J. C.**

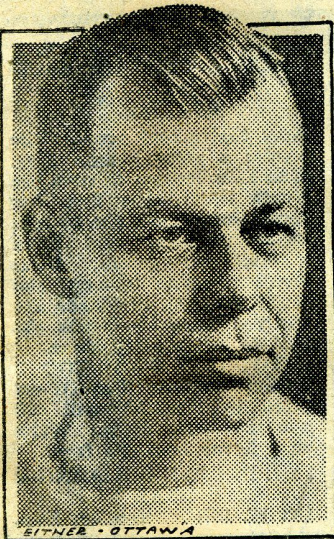
Charles "Dee" Errickson, a graduate of the school in 1923, signed a contract yesterday as head basketball coach and freshman football mentor at Washburn college. For the past six years, Errickson has been athletic director and head

During his residence in Ottawa, Errickson has won popularity with the townspeople and unqualified support for the school and its teams. He is the idol of the town's kids. He is a member of the American Legion and the Rotary club.

Errickson was married during last Christmas vacation to Miss Maureen O'Connor, of Atchison.

Staff Now Completed.

The employment of Errickson to take charge of basket ball rounds out the reorganized Washburn athletic department. Holm, in addition to being director, will be head coach of football. Eugene Barnett, now a member of the staff, will be varsity back field coach and head coach of track. Earl Kaufman, jr., will continue as director of intramural sports and physical education.

coach of all sports at Ottawa university where he has enjoyed remarkable success. He will join the staff here July 1.

Errickson's employment by Washburn had been expected for weeks and was forecast by The Daily Capital nearly two months ago. He had been in Topeka several times conferring with Athletic Director Elmer Holm and was offered the job at a conference held here Saturday during the state high school basket ball tournament. His acceptance came yesterday following his release by the Ottawa U. president, A. B. Martin. President Martin said no successor had been mentioned for Errickson's job.

Prominent Student Here.

The new Blue cage mentor was a prominent student and athlete in his under-graduate days. He captained the basket ball team while playing under Dwight Ream. He first gained coaching prominence at Fort Scott junior college where his teams won many championships both in football and basket ball.

Errickson succeeded John "Sap" Davis at Ottawa in 1931 when Davis accepted a job as coach at Greeley, Colo., State Teachers' college. He earned four major sport crowns in the Kansas conference: Football in 1932 and 1933, track in 1934, and basket ball in 1935. Finishing high in all sports, Ottawa won the mythical all-sports crown in the Kansas conference in 1932, 1933 and 1934.

The employment of Charles "Dee" Errickson as basket ball coach and freshman grid mentor at Washburn brings deserved promotion to one of the school's most successful graduates in the coaching field. Errickson has won his spurs in 12 years of coaching at Fort Scott Junior college and Ottawa university. His versatility is shown in his record at Ottawa where, since 1931, he has coached two football champions and one each in basket ball and track. At Fort Scott he had many championship teams but only after a first-year crisis that shows, more than any other one incident I know, the ingenuity of this new Ithabod coach.

When Errickson went to Fort Scott he placed a notice on the school's bulletin board which read:

"All men interested in football are requested to report tonight to Coach C. D. Errickson."

To the coach's surprise, only three men reported. Errickson went to his room that night and spent many hours—most of them wee ones—pondering his sad plight. The next morning he posted this bulletin:

"All men in school are invited to be the guests of Coach C. D. Errickson at dinner tonight at Hotel _____."

It took most of Errickson's first month's salary to pay for that feed but it gave him an opportunity to deliver a message so convincing that more than 50 players reported for football the next day. From that time on the school's athletes busted their buttons to make his teams and he never had a bad season. At Ottawa, Errickson pulled a school far down in the doldrums back into a place in the Kansas conference sun.

He should fit nicely into the Washburn athletic scheme.

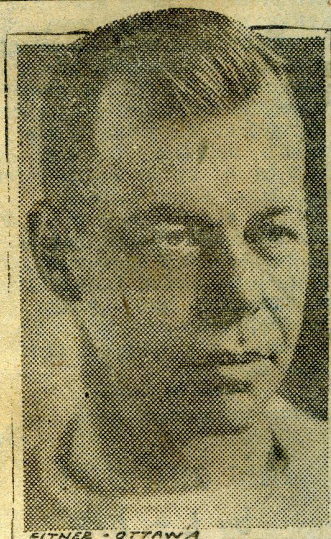
DEE ERRICKSON TO WASHBURN POST

WILL COACH BASKETBALL AND FRESHMAN FOOTBALL

**Ottawa U. and Fans Sorry to Lose
Coach Who Has Put Athletics
On a High Plane**

Charles D. Errickson, athletic director and Coach at Ottawa University since 1931, this morning tendered his resignation to accept a position as coach of basketball and freshman football at Washburn College in Topeka. His resignation will become effective July 1.

Errickson, known as "Dee" to

his friends in Ottawa and also throughout the state, has been one of the most popular and most successful Ottawa coaches. Since coming here in 1931 his teams have won four Kansas conference championships: Football in 1932 and 1933, basketball in 1935 and track in 1934. For three years Ottawa has won major sport crowns for high standings in all sports.

Before coming to Ottawa Errickson was a successful coach for 7 years at Fort Scott junior college where he won several championships. He graduated from Washburn college in 1923.

Errickson not only has been successful in coaching but has made a host of friends downtown in Ottawa. He is a member of the Rotary club, the American Legion and other organizations. Last summer he played in the Legion drum and bugle corps.

O. U. FRESHMEN WON

Ran Away With Interclass Track and Field Meet.

The Ottawa University freshmen ran away with the interclass track meet yesterday afternoon by amassing a total of 68 points. The closest rivals were the seniors with 46 points; the juniors were next with 36 and the sophomores last with 10. Pearl Edwards, colored freshman, contributed his share of points by winning the mile and half-mile runs; Judson Rudd and Joe Socolofsky, freshmen dash men, collected 13 points; Asa Eagles, junior weight man, won first in the shotput and javelin; Walter Dingus, senior, won first in the 120-yard high hurdles and pole vault, tied for first in the high jump and won second in the discus throw. Fred Koehler, junior, won first in the 220-yard low hurdles and second in the 120-yard high hurdles, and another junior, Eldon Hoover, won the quarter-mile run and took second in the 220-yard dash. In the long distance division Clarence Dowell, a senior, won first in the 2-mile run, second in the mile run and second in the half-mile run.

Several of the newcomers showed up well and promise to help in winning points for O. U. this year, and in coming years. The other members of the track squad are rounding out in fine shape.

JEWELL NOSED OUT O. U.

Ottawa Tennis Team Also Lost—Locals Weak in Races.

William Jewell College nosed out Ottawa University 66 1/3 to 64 2/3 in a dual track meet on the Liberty track. Good performance was out of the question due to a loose, soggy track and a halfway muddy field. The tennis team lost all six of its matches to the Jewell squad.

It was in the running that Ottawa was weak. The Ottawa runners won only two events, the mile and the high hurdles. Pearl Edwards put on a last minute finish to win the mile going away and Fred Koehler stepped out to win the high hurdles a step ahead of his teammate, Walter Dingus. Other firsts for Ottawa came in the broad jump by Wendell Starr, the javelin throw by Asa Eagles who also won the shotput, and the pole vault won by Hugh Mullen and Walter Dingus. Dingus suffered a slightly sprained ankle in working on the high jump.

Friday the Ottawa team goes to Emporia to engage C. of E. in a dual meet.

The Ottawa team sprouted forth in new suits, black jerseys with yellow "O's" and yellow shorts trimmed in black. The squad is also decked out in black warm-ups.
