



PASTOR'S MESSAGE

My dear Friends,

First of all, I am grateful for the opportunity of being involved in a week of Spiritual Renewal at the North Shore Baptist Church in Chicago. It was a real experience which affected my own life, and, I hope, had some meaning for the lives of others. I hope that all of you are aware that this is a sharing on the part of our church with others. Again let me say how grateful I am for the staff who work so loyally in all that we are doing here.

There will be a breakfast for young people at 7:30 a.m. and two morning services There will be baptism at both of these services, as well as that night. We hope that you will make plans accordingly.

- THE CROWING OF THE COCK -

Mark 14:53-72

One can not read the story of Jesus' life without becoming profoundly aware of the drama and tragedy of His last days. As men began to discover they could not make him into a bread king or define what kind of a Messiah He would be, they increasingly felt uncomfortable, ill at ease and judged by His presence.

So in Jesus speaking the truth and in bringing the light of God into the darkness of men, He forced evil to show its hand, and it struck back with treachery and anger. The religious leaders fought him with fanatical dogmatism. Pilate tried to wash his hands of the whole affair, so he could keep peace and not lose favor with Caesar. Herod tried to force Jesus to perform a sign.

Finally, there was the betrayal, the lonely garden, the rigged trials and Calvary.

In the midst of this, the men who had traveled with Jesus and known him intimately were scattered like frightened sheep. When He asked three of His close friends to watch and pray, they fell asleep. Before the face of the cross, they all ran, and Jesus was left alone. There was one whose name was Peter, who tried to follow and be true. But in the end, even he failed.

We are so much like Peter, who made the boast that whatever happened, he would be true. But Jesus understood that these were idle words. When the test came, Peter would fail. How easy it is for us in the atmosphere of the church and in the midst of prayers and hymns to make promises we never keep. When the trial of Jesus began in the hall of Caiphas, Peter was in the courtyard. According to Mark, he followed Jesus "at a distance." Here is where most of our trouble begins. We are afar off. We understand the outer and the superficial. We do not come close enough to know the inner joyful companionship which ought to be the experience of every Christian.

When temptation came to Peter, it did not come as a frontal attack. It was only

the innocent question of a maid as Peter warmed his hands by the fire. She asked him if he was from Galilee. Peter tried to shrug it off. This was the beginning of hs downfall. When she asked him again if he was from Galilee, he was more insistent in saying he did not know what she was talking about. Now other people in the courtyard began to make a joke of it all, and Peter tried to cover up his crumbling defenses with bluster and cursing, but it was too late. The denial was obvious.

Deep within each of us in some hidden area is cowardice. We keep quiet when we ought to speak up. We watch carefully to see how the crowd will move before we make our decisions. So prayer is mocked, and sacred causes are trampled underfoot while we stand silent. At the beginning the temptation is only a small nibbling at the edges, but soon we have lost the center and life is disintegrated.

Now in the midst of this, for Peter there came the crowing of the cock. All his promises made to Christ and now his terrible failure came over him like a great tide of remorse, and he wept bitterly. You see, God comes to us in unexpected ways like the crowing of cocks to remind us. A letter comes from home, and Mother says, "I am praying for you." Or we see the courage of an unashamed Christian, and we know God has spoken. Thank God that He does not leave us without some remembrance of our cowardice and weakness.

This is not the end of the story, for beyond the bitterness and remorse of that night was the cross and the resurrection and forgiveness. Peter had a chance to start all over again. When Christ asked him, "Lovest thou me?," the answer came, "Yea, Lord, thou knowest I do." I can only hope and pray that for someone today there will be the crowing of a cock.
