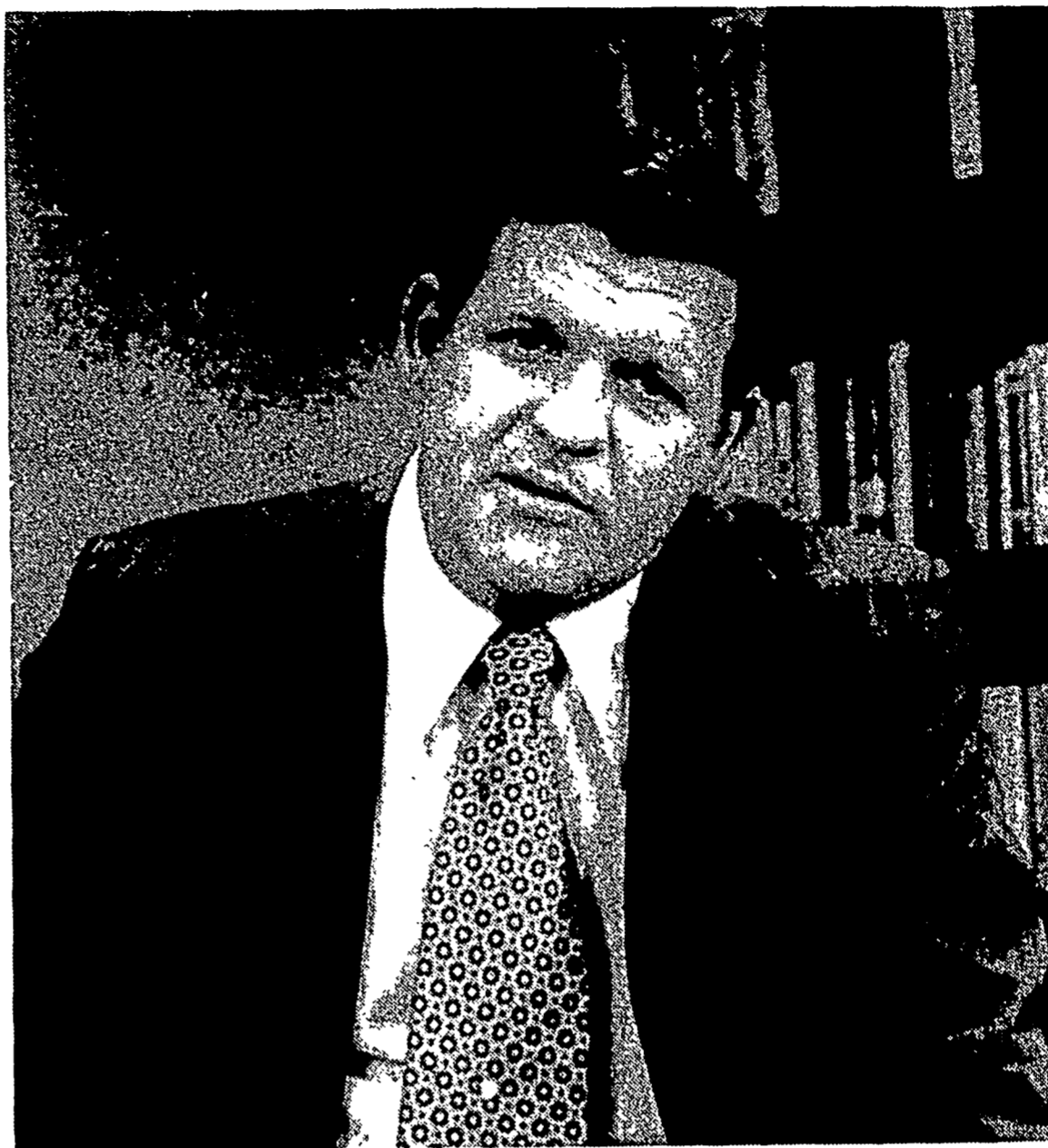


President's Report

1975-76

The 1975-76 year was a period of great opportunity and accomplishment for Ottawa University. It was a year in which we experienced significant curricular enrichment, new dimensions in our religious life program, major enrollment increases due to the tremendous success of our College Without Campus (CWC) program in Kansas City, the addition of a new and highly sophisticated computer, and the largest gift and grant income in our history. It was a year in which we balanced the operational budget despite the pressures of inflation

We are truly grateful to our many friends who supported Ottawa University in a magnificent way; without your concern for young people, for the future of our nation and for the cause which we serve as a Christian college of liberal arts, this successful year would not have been possible. We trust that you will be pleased with our stewardship and share our joy in the accomplishments of Ottawa University.

CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

We have been guided throughout our history by our commitments to liberal education and to Christian higher education. All curriculum development has been within this context. The needs of our students have always dictated a concern for career preparation, and we have sought to do so without focusing narrowly on this aspect of education. Such is a proper stance for a liberal arts college. In these days of national economic uncertainty and increased unemployment, there is a heightened interest in career preparation on the part of students and their parents. In these times of rapid social change and growing complexity, there must also be a renewed emphasis upon liberal learning—upon such things as value clarification and development, effective communication, skill in problem-solving, preparation for citizenship and perhaps most importantly, upon learning how to learn for oneself.

So, we have attempted to expand and enrich our curriculum in areas where we believe that Ottawa University, as a liberal arts college, has the capacity for excellence in preparing students for careers in areas of exceptional employment opportunity during the next decade. We have been aided in this effort by a five-year \$1.3 million grant from the federal Advanced Institutional Development Program (AIDP) which has enabled us to expand our faculty and enrich our curriculum in business management, public service, social work, environmental studies and special education. Our approach to career preparation in these and other areas has several key features. It is a broad, interdisciplinary approach which emphasizes the integral nature of knowledge by encouraging and assisting students to identify and comprehend the ways in which various subject fields are interrelated. Our approach provides each student with a depth of knowledge and experience in his or her chosen career area and also enriches that career preparation with the enduring qualities of a liberal education. In keeping with our basic commitment to liberal education, we seek always to keep our approach to career preparation broad rather than narrow. As an integral part of our approach to career preparation we provide, wherever possible, internship opportunities as well as opportunities for extensive contact on campus with persons successfully employed in a variety of occupations. In pursuit of the proper balance of these concerns, we seek to individualize educational and career planning, and the particular educational experiences which each student chooses in conjunction with his or her advisors as the appropriate features of his or her individual plan of education.

COLLEGE WITHOUT CAMPUS

With the same forward look in which we recognize future manpower needs, we also realized that the number of "traditional college-age" students will be decreasing in the coming years and that the number of adults interested in completing baccalaureate degrees is increasing. Thus, just as our long-range planning eventually led to curriculum development in light of manpower needs, our planning also led us to the establishment in Kansas City of an educational program for the non-traditional working adult in Fall, 1974. During 1975-76, the College Without Campus (CWC) program experienced tremendous growth, ending the year with more than 1,300 different students having taken as many course units and paid as much tuition as 418 full-time students on the Ottawa campus. The comparable figures for the first year of the CWC program, 1974-75, were 315 students with a full-time equivalence of 59.

In our CWC program, many of the features of the campus program are replicated. The same individualized approach to educational planning and programs of study is used, though slightly modified to overcome the traditional obstacles which prevent working adults from enrolling in traditional residential programs. The interdisciplinary approach is similarly used, though it too is modified somewhat.

However, in contrast to other programs, our CWC offerings are not all taught by our permanent full-time faculty nor are they all offered in Kansas City. We have recognized that a cost-effective model for education is to maintain a small group of full-time faculty as key advisors and instructors in the CWC program both to assure high quality instruction and to infuse the features of a liberal education into this non-traditional program. Then, to achieve these specialized instructional objectives of the program, adjunct faculty members are hired to guide an independent study or to instruct a group of people with educational interests common to a particular specialization. These adjunct faculty members are screened and selected carefully for their ability to handle the assigned tasks and are usually practicing professionals who have the interest and ability to teach what they themselves have devoted their lives to doing. In this way, we make best use of the abilities of our full-time CWC faculty to offer the distinctive features of our liberal education program, and we also make best use of the specialized expertise which can best aid our students in achieving their educational and career goals. Also, because word-of-mouth communication by CWC students has spread the reputation of CWC across the nation, the program is now offered in numerous locations from coast-to-coast. The growth of the program and the enthusiastic response of the students informs us that this is a program we must continue.

COMPUTER ACQUISITION

Another highlight of the year was the acquisition of a Data General Corporation Eclipse C/300 mini-computer for support of our educational program and administrative activities. Under the federal grant for our Advanced Institutional Development Program, we were able to acquire this computer for development of a management information system and for initiation of computer-assisted instructional activities. We now have courses in computer science, operations and programming as well as the opportunity for other courses through the use of computer-assisted instruction.

This sophisticated computer permits time-sharing use for as many as thirty-two terminals simultaneously and has a built-in hardware partition to separate administrative from instructional operations, thus enhancing operational security.

ENROLLMENT

Ottawa University experienced its largest enrollment in history during 1975-76, totaling more than 2,000 people who enrolled in one or more courses during the year. On the Ottawa campus, 680 students enrolled in September, 1975 and engaged in more than 5,200 course units during the year. In the College Without Campus program, more than 1,300 students enrolled in a total of units in excess of 3,200 for the year. Consequently, for the year *in toto*, 8,400 units were taught for more than 2,000 students.

One hundred and eighty-one students graduated from Ottawa University in May, 1976, including 148 from the campus program and 33 from CWC, a total of 89 men and 92 women. These people had pursued courses of study in 19 different departmental areas plus 31 interdisciplinary studies (a sign of our emphasis on the interdisciplinary nature of knowledge).

These students ranged in age from the traditional college age of 18-22 who were just beginning their careers to senior citizens who were achieving a lifelong goal of completing their bachelor's degrees. This experience is very much reflective of the changes in types of students in higher education today.

VENTURE CAMPAIGN

1975-76 was the second year of our campaign and we saw notable progress toward our \$5.7 million goal. During the year, total receipts and pledges reached \$3,237,699. Of this amount, we realized \$1,032,031 during the fiscal year, composed of receipts for current operations and endowment.

Area campaigns were completed in Central Kansas, Denver, Fort Collins, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Ottawa, Philadelphia, St. Louis and Wichita and were in final phase in Lawrence, Topeka and Western Kansas as the year ended. Other campaigns in progress included Los Angeles/San Diego, San Francisco and Phoenix.

Mini-campaigns were begun in areas where there were not large concentrations of constituents, but where devoted alumni willingly and actively initiated efforts. These areas included Arkansas City, Clay Center, Concordia, El Dorado, Emporia, Great Bend, Hutchinson, Osawatomie in Kansas, Colorado Springs, Pueblo and Grand Junction in Colorado; plus Omaha and Des Moines.

Major gifts have not been easy to realize despite the continuing efforts of Trustees, alumni and University staff. We have made a very large number of cultivation and solicitation calls, but the results to date have been disappointing. While this is an area which needs additional emphasis, progress is being made in an area in which it is often difficult to make dramatic strides. Yet it remains true that success in the major gift area is important for success in the total campaign.

To all who have contributed generously and often sacrificially of their time, talents, and funds, we owe our sincere appreciation and gratitude. Without your continuing support, we would not have been able to accomplish that which we have been able to do to serve the educational needs of our students as they shape their futures and progress toward their educational career and life goals.

BUDGET BALANCED

Because of the efforts of many people, we were successful in balancing the operating budget for 1975-76 with a surplus of \$43,618. Many factors contributed to this success.

First, budget managers carefully oversaw their areas of operation, seeking to trim expenses wherever possible while still achieving quality results through their efforts. In detail, this careful management allowed savings of approximately \$30,000 with no decrease in the quality of education and service provided.

Also, the superb planning and follow-through of the development staff assured that our fund-raising efforts were appropriately managed and promptly and effectively completed. The University received \$1,231,609 of which \$1,181,932 was for the current fund.

In addition, our net tuition income increased by 55 percent (\$530,000), due largely to the phenomenal growth of the College Without Campus program. This increase is obviously directly related to the fact of our largest enrollment in history, but is worthy of note in its own regard as an indicator of growing financial strength.

Finally, and of great importance, the gift support provided by our alumni, our church constituency, and our other supporters registered substantial increases. We are thankful for this sign of continuing and growing support – we are thankful to you!

AT THE HEART OF THE MATTER

At the heart of the matter is that which takes place between faculty and students. We fulfill our mission through the individual development of students in ways which support our goals as a Christian college of liberal arts. And the key to our success is a faculty of extremely competent and dedicated persons who share a commitment to our objectives and willingness to become deeply involved in the teaching relationship with our students.

To be sure, the Ottawa University faculty members are rather diverse individuals from many backgrounds and with many interests. Such diversity brings a richness to the educational program, a richness which adds depth, breadth and quality to our fundamental endeavors, and a richness which enlivens our campus life. With this diversity and richness also comes a devotion to the *raison d'être* of the liberal arts college – teaching and learning undergirded and inspired by our broader sense of mission. Our faculty members also demonstrate in many different ways a devotion to the Christian heritage and context of Ottawa University, striving to show how spiritual development is important to the total development of the individual student and seeking to infuse our campus life with opportunities for confrontation with personal beliefs and value convictions through which student development occurs.

A highly qualified faculty – more than 70 percent have earned their doctoral degrees – our faculty combines their instructional expertise, their advising abilities, and their innovative approaches to enhance continually program implementation and development. They strive to define and provide the necessary balance between career preparation and liberal education.

Within our student body, there is also notable diversity. While our traditional student population comes from Kansas, and especially Kansas Baptist homes, there is sufficient representation of students from other locales, with other religious affiliations, and with other perspectives on life to bring additional richness to our campus life. In this diversity and richness, there is opportunity – opportunity to share perspectives on life and living, opportunities to grow through this learning and sharing. Students in our English Language

Institute come from Iran, Vietnam, Japan, Nigeria, adding a cross-cultural awareness to other aspects of campus life. Students in our campus-based baccalaureate degree program bring the diversity of urban, suburban and rural life to the residential campus, adding various perspectives from their varying socio-economic backgrounds, enriching our religious awareness through the comparing and contrasting religious beliefs and philosophical perspectives. Indeed, our students come from over 40 states and ten foreign countries, and our minority group members constitute approximately 13 percent of the student population on the residential campus.

Of course, when this variety of family backgrounds co-exists, there is often variance regarding the acceptability of the common standards which govern our University community. During 1975-76, this variance of acceptability took the form of questioning our residence hall visitation policies which require an open door, and a limitation on the number of hours each day when visitation is permitted. Some students believed that the visitation policies infringed upon their rights to privacy. Others felt that there is a disparity when students are being encouraged to act as adults, but still have to abide by regulations which they interpret as being *in loco parentis*. To some extent, the crux of the problem seemed to be some difficulty of enforcement of conduct regulations, a matter which was heightened by the tension between peer pressure, on the one hand, and responsibilities for enforcement of unpopular regulations being carried by the student resident hall staff members, on the other hand. This matter received much attention by the entire campus community; together we have reached greater understanding of the need for regulations in general and the rationale for each of the regulations in particular — even though there are still differences of opinion. Similarly, the matter of enforcement has been resolved through better staff training, better resident orientation, and improved management control. We have learned a great deal — perhaps most important, we have learned to live together with respect for individuals and individual differences as well as with the necessary concern for common interests and features of campus life.

THE PRESENT AND THE FUTURE

We face tough times!

We continue to experience the considerable effects of inflation on our activities. Utilities, supplies, food and services all cost more and more each year. Just as this affects campus activities, so too does it have impact on the family budget which supports each student. The inflationary spiral is very pronounced and current trends in consumer awareness often lead to substantial questioning of the value of education, with a special round of such questioning applied to the marketable value of liberal education. The rising cost of energy is an excellent example of the pervasiveness of these effects — it costs more to heat, cool and light our buildings; it costs more to travel on essential University business, it costs more to cook our dining hall meals; it costs more to supply water to all our buildings.

As costs increase, it is more and more difficult to absorb the increases. Yet to pass these costs along is to demand a larger piece of the family budget when the family is also facing inflation. There appears to be a trend toward increased enrollment in lower-cost public institutions. This then requires private colleges and universities to compete more aggressively just to maintain the same share of the college-going population. Now we are beginning also to see the effects of population decline in the traditional college age group. Therefore to maintain the same share of the population is to accept reduced enrollment levels. Consequently, more private colleges and universities have taken more aggressive action to increase their market share and hopefully to increase enrollment levels as well.

We face the future with optimism, but our task is not easy. To withstand these pressures our long-range planning must be both visionary and realistic. Our management must be wise and prudent as we make difficult decisions about the allocation of scarce resources and seek always to live within our available income. Our implementation of the educational program must be outstanding, and most important, our basic commitments to Christian higher education and to liberal education must be clear and resolute as we steer a course amidst constantly changing circumstances.

Likewise, our future success depends — as in years past — upon the continued prayers, concern and generous financial support of the Trustees, alumni, American Baptist church constituency and countless other friends of Ottawa University. To each of you, we express our heart felt gratitude for your encouragement and support.
