The Kansas State Wildcats make a bid for national recogni-

tion against Marquette at Milwaukee tonight but today's firing in Kansas is centered around two Kansas Conference struggles with bearing on the final standings. Bethany and Baker clash this afternoon at Baldwin while tonight McPherson invades Ottawa U. Bethel played at Kansas Wesleyan last night. The Iowa State-Kansas game at Lawrence, appetizer of the Big Six campaign, tops the Saturday program in the Sunflower grid domain.

The only game played so far in the Kansas Conference chase was a scoreless tie between College of Emporia and McPherson. Thus, the six clubs seeing action this week end are potential champions. Ottawa, the defending titleholder, is not rated more than an even chance to retain its laurels in a seven-cornered picture. McPherson is one of the clubs given a chance to unseat the Braves, who lost valuable backfield chattels by graduation. McPherson holds an easy win over Bacone Indians while Ottawa's only start brought a 6 to 7 reverse at the hands of Chadron, Neb., Teachers.

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C. of E., Pitt, Leave State

Both Baker and Bethany have yet to claim a victory after their preliminary campaigning. Baker bowed to Washburn and Colorado College while the Swedes lost by a touchdown to the stout Kearney, Neb., Teachers. Bethel, winner by a convincing margin over Hebron, Neb., Junior College, met a Wesleyan club that tied Sterling and lost to Warrensburg. College of Emporia, which played scoreless ties with Southwestern and McPherson, goes outside the state to visit Tahlequah, Okla., Teachers.

The Central Conference gets under way in championship festivities in the St. Benedict's-Emporia State game tomorrow afternoon at Emporia. The Ravens, given a chance to contest the champion Wichita Shockers for the title, will be holding a coming-out party. The Hornets opened last week by outgaining Washburn, only to lose, 12 to 0. Wichita, defeated by Tulsa, entertains Southwestern Saturday night. Fort Hays State, licked soundly by New Mexico State and Kansas State, reverts to its own class Saturday night to play host to Oklahoma City U. and should profit by the change. The Tigers, however, learned some valuable lessons these past two weeks and deported themselves capably in clicking off eighteen first downs to Kansas State's ten.

Pittsburg Teachers, sixth Central member, continues its out-state program by invading Arkansas Tech. The Gorillas have won from Doane, lost to Superior, Wis., Teachers.

Kansas Hopes for Reversal

Kansas State apparently has its hands full tonight at Marquette, but has beaten the Avalanche two years in a row and has improvements to offset advances made by the Milwaukee school, beaten last week only 14 to 13 by Wisconsin. Kansas, a surprise victim at Drake, hopes to show a reversal of form against the Cyclones, winners over Coe and losers to Denver. Neither team is being given much consideration in the Big Six race.

Two Frosh in Ottawa Starting Lineup for McPherson Tonight

Ottawa, Kan., Oct. 5.—(Special) make their first Kansas Conference stand against McPherson College Bulldogs at Ottawa, Friday night. The Ottawans have already dropped one game, a nonconference affair with Chadron, Neb., Teachers, 6 to 7. On the other hand the Bulldogs have defeated Bacone Indians, 25 to 0, and held highly rated College of Emporia to a scoreless tie.

Coach Dick Godlove of Ottawa feels that his backfield which will start against McPherson will be weaker than it was last year. More than likely he will start Jack Ramsey, Lyman Morgan, Oliver Smith and Jay Jameson. The latter is a freshman but is showing enough to be the No. 1 fullback, especially in view of the fact that the Braves are woefully lacking in reserve strength in the ball lugging positions.

McPherson with a number of veteran backs may show up the Braves even tho the Ottawa forward wall might be hard to pierce. Thus far, however, the Ottawa line has been sluggish and none too aggressive. Mike Miller, 205-pound center is almost certain to start at the midline spot. Leonard Hofstra and Walter Reames, both veterans, will be the tackles. Kenny Hough and Gayl DeVore will probably be the guards, George von Arb and Larry Smith will possibly play the wing positions. All but Smith are veterans in that first string line. Replacements, however, for the most part will be inexperienced, causing Godlove no end of worry as to what he will do for substitutions.

Despite predictions for a weaker team than last year, Ottawa sports fans have purchased more season tickets, more than 500, than ever before. A new public address system is also being installed to keep the crowd properly informed. It is the gift of the graduating class of 1936.

McPherson Meets

O. U. Here Tonight

Dope Favors Bulldogs; Uncertain of O. U. Lineup

The Kansas conference football season for Ottawa opens in Ottawa at 8 o'clock tonight with the Ottawa University Braves going against the threatening McPherson Bulldogs. Perfect football weather indicated that a large crowd would see the game.

Late last night Coach Dick Godlove was not sure of his starters. Especially was he doubtful as to the backfield. In the line, without doubt, the following will start: George Von Arb and Larry Smith at ends. Leonard Hofstra and Walter Reames at tackles. Kenny Hough and Don Pendergast at guards, and Mike Miller at center.

The coach, last time he said anything about it, muttered something about starting Omer Brenton, Lyman Morgan, Oliver Smith and Joe Thomas in the backfield. But game time may find that outfit completely changed.

Coach Pierce Astle claims to have hard luck with injuries, but the Braves are not counting out many Bulldogs with injuries, even though Bob Pappan and Dave McGill seem to be out of the line. The Astlites are tough this season. Pre-game dope seems to favor McPherson due to their having nine experienced backs ready for work against Ottawa.

The Ottawa squad rested yesterday after having had two weeks of stiff practice. Late in the afternoon, Coach Godlove went to Salina to scout the Kansas Wesleyan-Bethel game, won by Wesleyan, 14 to 13.

Officials for the game tonight are E. A. Thomas, Ab Hinsbaw and Gene Kemper. Mr. Godlove advised fans to buy tickets at the Wassmer clothing store or North American coffee shop and thereby avoid waiting in line.

Braves Swamped McPherson Team

Godlove's Alert Squad Earned a 33 to 0 Victory

A hard driving Ottawa University football team last night on Cook field defeated McPherson College, 33 to 0. The Braves added the touch of Midas to their alert play and scored five times, twice on intercepted passes by Don Geiser and three times on drives down the field. It was the first Kansas conference game of the season for the Ottawans.

The charging Ottawa line led by powerful Leonard Hofstra early in the first quarter pointed to the superiority of the Braves' offense and defense, but in that period the Bulldogs fought back to meet fire with fire. It was not until late in the quarter that Ottawa got into a scoring position. Lyman Morgan, sending a twisting punt out on the McPherson one-yard line, touched off the drive. Tony Voshell kicked out for the Bulldogs to give Ottawa the ball on the 30-yard line. Joe Thomas picked up six and Oliver Smith two. Then into the Ottawa backfield came Omer Brenton, Jack Ramsey and Jay Jameson.

After a 5-yard penalty, Ramsey shot a left-handed pass to Brenton who was downed on the 16-yard line. Then the fleetfooted Ottawa runner plunged and stepped down to the 5-yard line. From there the boys took it over in three plays, Jameson plunging for the score on the second play of the second quarter.

During the second half, McPherson had trouble in getting off passes due to a hard charging Ottawa forward line which found all of Coach Dick Godlove's tackles. Hofstra, Walter Reames, Jack Jeffries, Jim Rollins and Wayne Capron, rushing in with Ends Larry Smith, George Von Arb, Winey Shepherd, Leray Barrett and Burton Cowan. Midway of the third period, however, Cramer sent a long pass to Brust and McPherson looked to be uncorking a scoring march. But the Ottawa line on the next play broke through and swooped down on the passer. The partially blocked pass spurted up into the air and came down near the alert Mr. Geiser who snatched out and took it in. The substitute center knew just what to do, for he immediately set out from the 40-yard line toward pay dirt. He got some nice aid in blocking from his teammates, eluded a pair of Bulldog tacklers and sped on to cross the goal line standing up.

Geiser repeated his performance in the waning seconds of the game. This time he picked a partially blocked pass out of the air and ran 60 yards to score. He got beautiful blocking, especially from George Von Arb who practically blocked one Bulldog out of the park. Geiser's parents, of Topeka, were present, a fact which may have inspired him.

One of the most pleasing touchdowns came after Harry Trigg intercepted a Bulldog shovel pass on the McPherson 45-yard line.

On the first play, Jack O'Neal moved like lightning, and he can do that, around the McPherson left end for 30 yards. In three plays, five yards at a crack, the Braves went over for the score. O'Neal registering from the five-yard line.

Trigg intercepted another pass in the fourth quarter to set up the Ottawans for another touchdown. Young Joe Thomas, a freshman from Waterville, and Jay Jameson led the way. Dean Norris, another freshman, also assisted. The three took the ball down to the 27-yard line and then Thomas sent a long, smooth pass to a flying Von Arb, deep to the left, who was run out of bounds on the 5-yard line. Jameson, the Argentine high star in Kansas City last year, took it over.

Alert was the word for the whole O. U. team. They fought a McPherson team which was somewhat down because of injuries. The Bulldogs, however, never gave up and kept punching away at the Braves right up to the finish. Statistics show that they were not as badly outplayed as the score indicated. Ottawa was probably two or three touchdowns better last night, but you put Lady Luck in there and it helps.

The Ottawa guards also did a good job last night especially in defensive work. Kenny Hough, Elvis Berger and Don Pendergrast not only were alert on defense but did some neat blocking. Big Omer Brenton, playing at blocking back position, was a surprise to the stands. Just how a big, tall fellow could do such effective blocking was difficult to understand, but not hard to see. Mike Miller, great Ottawa center, played a hard game, but was out most of the second half due to a cut mouth.

Coach Godlove was well pleased with the showing of his reserve material. Thomas, Jameson and Norris, freshman backs, did good work and were appreciated by the crowd.

Ottawa journeys to William Jewell at Liberty, Mo., for a game next Friday afternoon. On Oct. 21, the Braves resume conference play at Salina against the powerhouse Kansas Wesleyan team.

Tough Opposition Ahead for Braves

Godlove Kiddled for Poor Guess Against McPherson

Fort Hays State 0; Okla. City U. 0. Coach Dick Godlove whose Ottawa University Braves trounced McPherson, 33 to 0, last Friday night, both won and lost. His team turned in a man-sized victory over the Bulldogs thereby causing the mentor to fail in proving to the home town fans that he had nothing more than a prayer. And the friendly supporters while passing compliments right and left over the week-end did not fail to remind Mr. Godlove that all week long he had talked down the chances of his team.

"No reserves," chanted the coach, "and we have nothing in the backfield. This season will be a nightmare. We're due for a big crackup and this looks like the time. We'll probably do it in a big way, too."

And so his players went out and cracked down the McPherson squad to the tune of five touchdowns. Explain that, said the fans. But Godlove was too pleased to say much more than hand out a wisecrack now and then.

Football is a funny business, it seems. Two weeks ago McPherson looked to be one of the Kansas conference title contenders. Friday night they were the weakest team in the circuit. What happened? For one thing, injuries aplenty riddled the line and backfield of Coach Pierce Astle's team. You take men like Pappan and McGill out of the line and knock out a few backs and it is tough sledding as the Bulldogs can testify. On top of that the McPherson Reserves played a game the previous night with Dodge City junior college, winning 13 to 7. Astle sent all but 13 members of his team out west and then brought the whole squad to Ottawa the following evening. It was costly, for against Ottawa the Bulldogs had no fresh reserves just at a time when they needed them. The junior college game, according to Astle, was scheduled last spring when it seemed that there would be about 50 good players on the McPherson squad.

You could add to that the fact that Ottawa, with all its good playing, was endowed with a King Midas touch which turned to gold everything they tried. Those four pass interceptions led directly to scores, two of them right away, thanks to the hard running of Don Geiser.

McPherson may bring back some of their reserves, but they will have far to go, if they finish better than the cellar in conference standings.

After the week-end conference play, it seems that the Kansas Wesleyan Coyotes can have everything their own way in conference play. They have the man-power, better than any other team in the circuit. Good big men plenty fast two or three deep all over the field. And how they can go. Against Bethel they made 22 first downs. Only costly errors and penalties kept them from running up a huge score on the fighting Bethel team. The Coyotes' line will average about 200 pounds, which is just as big as teams come anytime, anywhere. Class of the conference, all rival coaches agree.

Bethany and Baker fought a tight defensive game on a sweltering afternoon, the Swedes winning on an intercepted pass. They were lucky for during the afternoon they gained a net total of only 16 yards. In other words the Baker forward wall is just as tough as conference teams produce. And Bethany with its great Kephart at tackle is not far behind in defensive ability. The afternoon was too hot to see just how much offense either team had.

This week, the Braves are not worrying about conference opponents. They are wondering what to do with the strong William Jewell team which they meet Friday afternoon at Liberty. Last year, fans will remember, the Ottawans had a tough time ekeing out a 13 to 6 victory against the mystic, hidden ball team from Missouri. A team on defense against Jewell has two problems, one to find the ball and the other to tackle the ball carrier.

In view of the pounding Godlove got from fans on his sour predictions last week, the Ottawa mentor made no comments about Jewell prospects. He left only the impression that his boys were lucky to win a year ago and that they would have to retain that luck next Friday if they win this time.

Mapping Defense Against Jewell

Look Better and May Click Against Topeka

The Ottawa University Braves
this week have been mapping out
special defensive measures for use
against the William Jewell Cardi-
nals whom they play at Liberty,
Mo., Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
Coach Dick Godlove has not an-
nounced the exact type of play he
expects to have his boys use
against the tricky, hidden-ball
offense of the Missouri team, but
it is expected he will have the
cup-like strategy which was used
with success a year ago.

The Jewell backfield passes the
ball several times before shooting
out into the open and it is diffi-
cult, as Ottawa fans who saw
the game here last year will say,
to follow the ball. Instead of hav-
ing the line charge clear in for the
would-be ball carrier, each man
goes in a specified distance and
then waits for the ball carrier to
come along. To use such a de-
fense it is necessary to have an
alert and capable line.

The Braves are planning no
special offense for the Cardinals,
only hoping that their off-tackle
and reverse plays will function
properly, at least enough to score.
Only the defense is being stressed.
One point which may give plenty
of trouble is that Mike Miller, big
center who received a bad cut on
his mouth in the McPherson game,
may not be able to play. Harry
Trigg and Don Geiser will make
good replacements, but do not
have the weight and experience to
play against the Missouri trick-
sters.

The Jewell game, if the Braves
have a chance to win it, will re-
quire the presence of veterans in
the backfield, for the Jewellites
use many passes and have several
shifty runners who are hard to pin
down once they are beyond the
line of scrimmage. The Liberty
line is also big and powerful on
defense, another reason why the
Braves will have to use their top
skills.

Braves Priming For William Jewell

Game Will Be Played Tomorrow Afternoon

The Ottawa University Braves
this afternoon are putting on
finishing touches for their game
with William Jewell college at
Liberty starting at 2 o'clock to-
morrow afternoon. Coach God-
love said that the squad will leave
here about 9 o'clock, eat a light
lunch in Kansas City and go on
to Liberty.

As usual, Godlove is not sure as
to his opening line-up. Probably
this will be about like it, however:
George Von Arb and Larry Smith
at ends, Leonard Hofstra and
Walter Reames at tackles, Kenny
Hough and Don Pendergrast at
guards, Mike Miller at center, Ly-
man Morgan at quarterback, Joe
Thomas and Jack O'Neal at half-
backs, and Oliver Smith at full-
back.

The present series of games
with the Missouri Baptist college
began in 1932, the tussle tomor-
row being the eighth. Of the
seven already played, Ottawa has
won five, lost one and tied one.
The first game which was played
on the Ottawa gridiron brought
up one of the biggest thrillers that
the then new football interest in
Ottawa had produced. Jewell
with a great team, doped to win
by a heavy margin, made a
smashing start. In the first three
minutes they trotted back from
the first score of the game, con-
fident of victory. But at that
point a mighty Ottawa team
struck hard and when the smoke
had cleared, Ottawa was on top
with a score of 38 to 14.

The game last year was no
pint-size thriller. The Braves,
with stars such as Don Meek and
Roy Fitzpatrick sitting on the
sidelines with injuries, moved to
the first touchdown after beat-
ing down a stiff Liberty drive.
Late in the game with only min-
utes to go, Jewell drove down for
a touchdown and tied the score at
six all and it seemed that score
would mark the final outcome,
but the Braves were not through
for they literally exploded after
the ensuing kick-off and romped
down the field in five plays to
score the winning touchdown in
the waning minutes of play.

Looking back on that interest-
ing series of games, no one can
predict that the battle will not
have its thrills. It should have
because both teams are defending
champions of their respective
conferences. Jewell, because it
lost only one or two men by
graduation, is doped to win by

some of the experts, but at that
the margin should not be great.

Braves Turn Back William Jewell

O. U. Stopped Famed Hidden Ball Offense

The Ottawa University Braves—
not the Eagles as one Kansas City
paper called them this morning—
defeated William Jewell College
yesterday afternoon at Liberty,
Mo., 20 to 13, after a hectic strug-
gle. Those last two words prob-
ably describe the game better than
anything else would, for the
Braves ran all over the field but
at the end were battling to shut
off a Jewell attack.

The three Ottawa touchdowns
came on three drives down the
field, the first being plunged over
by Junior Jameson midway in the
first quarter, the second on a lat-
eral pass from Jameson to Jack
Ramsey, and the third on a plunge
by Joe Thomas after a series of
passes had advanced the ball 35
yards to the four-yard line.

Jewell had the ball in Ottawa
territory only once in the first
half, just for one play. They re-
covered an Ottawa fumble on the
30-yard marker and on the next
play made a deep pass to score.
The second Jewell touchdown
came in the fourth quarter after
completion of a 51-yard aerial flip
to the Ottawa two-yard line. The
Braves got tough at that point, and
the Cardinals barely got it over in
four plays.

The far-famed Jewell hidden
ball offensive failed to click
against an alert Ottawa forward
wall. The Cardinals gained only
49 yards from scrimmage. But
their passing attack was effective
even though only three passes
were thrown. Maybe it is the day-
light which spoils the wizardry of
the Jewell mystic offense, but at
any rate the Ottawans had little
difficulty in bottling it up.

The Ottawa attack functioned
beautifully at times, then at other
periods it was dismal in its drive.
Three times the Braves were turn-
ed away from scores when in the
very shadow of the Jewell-defend-
ed goal posts.

The first Ottawa score was not
long in the making. After an ex-
change of long punts, Ottawa
took the ball on the Jewell 33-yard
line, Thomas running back the
Jewell punt from midfield to that
point. The Braves immediately
put into operation a powerhouse
running attack with Ramsey jam-
ming off tackle in three plays to
carry the ball to the Cardinal 13-
yard line. From there a shovel
pass from Ramsey to George Von
Arb sent in to the four. Jameson
and Ramsey took turns punching
at the stubborn Jewell line, the
former carrying it over from the
one-yard marker. Von Arb kicked
goal.

Early in the second quarter, Ot-
tawa fumbled the ball on the 30-
yard stripe. Anderson promptly
stepped back and sent a long,
deep pass to the goal line where
Guenther caught it and stepped
over for the score. Anderson kick-
ed the placement to tie the score
at 7-all.

booming right away. The Jewell kickoff went out of bounds and Ottawa took possession on its own 35-yard line. Oliver Smith, Dean Norris and Thomas started the march and carried the ball to the Jewell 34-yard line. Here the Braves' first string luggers came in and drove on toward pay dirt. But at the danger zone the Ottawa threat was turned back and Jewell took possession on the six-yard marker.

Jewell moved the ball out on a nice 14-yard run by Wilkens, and then punted out to the 47-yard line. Here Ottawa started a vicious drive. Ramsey hurled a 32-yard pass to Larry Smith to place the ball on the Jewell 15. With the final seconds of the half ticking away, Ramsey and Jameson drove the ball down to the Jewell 5 and there little impression was made. It seemed that the cause was lost, but on the last chance Jameson started a plunge through the middle of the line, then turned slightly and tossed a deft lateral to a speeding Ramsey who went around the Jewell left end, unmolested, for a touchdown.

Early in the second half, another long pass, this time a heave from Thomas to Larry Smith good for 21 yards, put Ottawa again in scoring position. A Thomas-to-Lyman Morgan pass for eight yards put the ball on the Jewell 4, and from there Thomas went over on the first play. No fooling about that drive. Oliver Smith recovered a Jewell fumble earlier in the half to set the stage for that attack.

An Ottawa fumble in midfield gave Jewell its opportunity. On the very next play the Cardinal deadly form of lightning struck, Anderson sending a 51-yard pass to Guenther on the Ottawa 2-yard line. In four plays the Cardinals inched their way across the big last line to make the score 13 to 20. That's the way it ended.

The last few minutes found the Jewell team unleashing a forward passing attack that found the Ottawa defense staunch. Right at the end with Morgan playing full-back, Ottawa was marching down the field, gaining 22 yards on three plays.

Ottawa had to battle for all its points, because Fate did not beam down on the Braves so fondly. Once, though, Don Geiser almost intercepted a partially blocked pass. He might have been loose for touchdown had he been successful in holding onto the pig-skin.

Two good punts, one by Morgan which rolled dead on the Jewell six-yard line, and one by Jack O'Neal which traveled 77 yards.

The Ottawa line came in for a large share of the credit with Tackles Leonard Hofstra, Walter Reames, Jim Rollins and Russell Klotz leading in the attack. The guards, Gayl DeVore, Kenny Hough, Don Pendergrast and Elvis Berger, played well as did Centers Mike Miller, Don Geiser and Harry Trigg. The ends, George Von Arb, Larry Smith and Burton Cowan, also helped with the victory.

Next week, Ottawa plays Kansas Wesleyan at Salina on Saturday night.

Ottawa scouts have seen all conference teams with the exception of Emporia in action this fall, and it seems to be the opinion that Kansas Wesleyan looks to be the toughest of the lot. True, the Coyotes lost to Bethany, 6 to 7, last week, but since that is a case of two old rivals playing a feud game in which most anything can happen it can be discounted.

Manpow is the basic keynote of a football team. And a scout cannot look at that big bunch of big men on the Salina squad without a shiver. That line will average about 199 pounds to the man. With Bates, Baer, Egbert and Reuhlen around there is plenty of ability and speed as well as weight. The backfield boasts such names as Junior Shaw, admittedly the class of the conference quarterbacks last year. He does everything with a football but eat it, and we are going to investigate that angle right soon. He gets assistance from Davis, Jones and Smith, a couple of fire eating backs, who have lots of drive. By the way, that's their actual names. Dupree also figures in the picture along with several others. As a matter of fact, Coach Gene Johnson has about 30 good, big boys which is about 10 or 12 more than any other school in the conference has.

The Braves beat that same crew last year. It could be done this year, but a few things stand in the road. First, it will take power to do it, and the Ottawans certainly do not have the power that they were able to fling at the Coyotes as they did a year ago. Fans will remember that the Braves earned their last season 13 to 0 victory via the road of hard pounding. That is the only way to win over the Salina team, and it is doubtful as to whether the Braves have the hammer and tongs to use in that fashion this fall.

Braves Know They Will Meet a Tough Foe

When the Ottawa University Braves tackle the Kansas Wesleyan Coyotes at Salina this weekend, it will be the first Saturday night game which the Ottawans have ever played, but that should make no difference to the warriors of Cook field. They have learned to play their games when they come, night or afternoon, and right well, too.

A trip to meet the Coyotes is always more or less a thrill for any conference squad, for every member of the group always knows that he is invading the home stand of a series of teams which have made small college football history. Under Coach A. B. Mackie, now head of a Salina business college, the Coyote teams grew and burst into full glory as one of the best small school outfits playing intercollegiate football. Good big boys came to play under Mackie and worked into a machine that mowed 'em down regularly. Now under Gene Johnson the same type of men are reporting for practice to carry on the tradition of fine teams.

Take a look into the past and you will think of such stars as lithe Gilbert Robinson who without doubt was the greatest broken field runner the conference ever uncovered. His swivel hips weaved their way to victory over countless foes, including Ottawa. Then just a year or two back was the superb athlete by the name of Watson. A big 200-pound with full coordination, he was a star at almost any position. There were others, too, who were in the starlight of those well-knit and powerful Wesleyan crews.

The same type of boy is still enrolling in the small college of Salina. Take Junior Shaw. There's a fellow any coach would like to have on his football or basketball team. A ball carrier, a great defensive player and a field general of brilliant ability. There is Baer in the line, a bone-crushing charger playing the guard spot. Egbert, an end with performing ability and weight and speed to make him one of the standouts of the circuit, is only a sophomore but plays like a senior. Then there is Reuhlen who is one of the best pass snappers in the state. He tucks them in and then runs. Last year he was on the receiving end of that 73-yard pass for the Wesleyan score against Ottawa. Bates, a huge tackle, is too powerful to move and hard to keep out of plays. There are Jones, Davis, Smith, Glazier and about 20 or 25 other big boys who have plenty of stuff.

By a freak of luck, Bethany beat the Coyotes last week even though Wesleyan collected 15 first downs to 5 for the Swedes. Of course, that Bethany line is mighty stubborn at the goal line, but two times out of three the Salina team might win. Any way you look at it, Ottawa will be in for a tough go, Saturday night.

Hoping to have a knife-edge, Ottawa University warriors of the gridiron await the first big test of the Kansas conference when they take on Kansas Wesleyan at Salina Saturday night. The game will not start until 8:30, in order that more business men may make arrangements to attend. Consequently the score of the game will not reach Ottawa much before 11:30.

Word from Salina indicates that the men of Gene Johnson regard the game as a toss-up, which is a bit more than many of the experts believe as they glance at the weight chart of the heavy Wesleyan team. Coach Johnson announced that a new defensive plan to stop the fast Ottawa running attack was being cooked up to head off end runs of Jack O'Neal and Jack Ramsey.
