Dr. Rolvix Harlan will remain in Ottawa over Sunday and will preach at the Baptist church both morning and evening, and will speak to the students of the college in Olympian hall at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. No meetings will be held this afternoon or tonight. Dr. Price will go to Kansas City this afternoon, and will preach at the Central Baptist church in that city tomorrow to supply for Dr. Harlan.

Dr. Rolvix Harlan has held a week's successful series of revival meetings at Ottawa University and at the First Baptist church this week; preaching at the church evenings and speaking to the college students each afternoon in Olympian hall at 4 30 o'clock.

Good crowds greeted the first two meetings and the hall has been crowded for the remaining sessions, indicating the increased interest on the part of the students. Dr. Harlan has made no sensational pleas to the students and his daily talks have been greatly appreciated by those who attended the meetings. A number of students have stood up in meetings, indicating a desire and determination to live a Christian life and the spirit of the meetings has made its impress on the thoughts of a majority of the students in school.

Dr. Harlan also conducted the devotional exercises in chapel each morning and gave some helpful talks at these sessions. While in Ottawa Dr. Harlan has been entertained at the home of President S. E. Price. Dr. Price supplied for Dr. Harlan as pastor of the Central Baptist church of Kansas City last Sunday.

A number of college boys assisted in the singing with the men's chorus at the meetings at the Baptist church. The men's chorus was one of the special attractions of the meetings. Chester Roberts and Harold Hanson assisted in the orchestra, Leslie Hanson played the pipe-organ, Hal Crain the piano and Frank Jennings directed the singing.

The Campus quartet, composed of Frank Jennings, Hal Crain, Herbert Foote and Charles Bachman, furnished special music at several of the night meetings and R. Lee Osburn, a former O. U. music student assisted with solo work. Mr. Osburn is a musician of note and his special selections were greatly appreciated by all.
