Coach Dee Errickson of the Braves will watch the game with unusual interest due to the fact that his proteges will be trying out a new offensive system made necessary by a change in the rules which prohibits a player staying in his own free throw lane more than three seconds at a time while his team has the ball. That almost eliminates the center pivot play which has been so popular in the last few seasons.

#### O. U. EASY FOR OMAHA

Big Red Team Scored 29 Points Here Last Night.

Omaha University ran the scoring gauntlet last night on Cook rield and submerged the Ottawa University Braves 29 to 0. The big red team showed plenty of power in the pinches and scored two touchdowns by force of carrying the ball over, passed 33 yards for another, intercepted a pass for another, and kicked a field goal. Leo Peary was the star for the visitors, scoring two of the touchdowns.

The Ottawans while never getting too near the Omaha goal line showed power at times and prevented the Nebraskans from having their own way, even to a greater degree than the score indicated. The Braves made 6 first downs to the Nebraskans' 8. The summary shows the yardage not favoring Omaha too overwhelmingly, 199 to 90.

of offense and since it was the first time of its use, the timing was not as good as it might have been. It showed possibilities and permitted a nice amount of de-ception. The Brayes' line at times showed polish, opening nice holes in the heavier Omaha line. The locals lacked punch frequently and had difficulty in taking care of Johnk, Omaha center, and Gardner and H. Sorenson,

the first Omaha score came in the first quarter after a double exchange of punts had placed the ball on the Ottawa 36-yard line. After Peary's incomplete pass, "Tippy" Tyler broke around the Ottawa right end for 20 yards. In short line plunges Peary carried the ball across from the 1-yard

Brown's field goal from the 19-yard line came late in the second quarter after the Omahans had carried the ball to the Ottawa 5yard line. In the face of savage resistance the Nebraskans fell back to the 19-yard line from where they made a place kick.

Peary passed to Baidenow for 33 yards to get the second touchdown which was obtained in the middle of the second quarter. Af-ter a short march down the field, Tyler took the ball over the center of the line for the next touchdown. A few minutes later Peary intercepted Swetman's pass to run 57 yards for a touchdown.
