U. To Meet a Determined Foe on Thanksgiving Day.

The Ottawa University football team had after a rest yesterday, went out the serious business of preparing for the Thanksgiving day game with College of Emporia. The Presbyterians will come to Ottawa keyed high to beat the Braves and thereby break into the conference win column. And, of course, the Ottawans are just anxious to turn in a victory. This will be the first college Thanksgiving game to be played in Ottawa in several years. It was made possible through the disagreement between the Emporia Teachers and C. of E. For over 20 years these institutions engaged in an annual battle which was heralded as one of the most additional of Kansas grid wars. When the Teachers a year or so ago, began feeling important, and became so dictatorial that a severing of relations resulted. The attitude of the Teachers was detested far and wide and only recently the Emporia Chamber of Commerce has asked that the two teams meet again on the football field. Emporia Teachers have substituted the Pittsburg Teachers for C. of E. on their Thanksgiving card and the latter has selected Ottawa as a suitable opponent for the turkey day affair. Last year Ottawa went to C. of E. and lost 12 to 14. The game here is scheduled to start at 2:30.

Morgan and Mattis May Not Play Against C. of E.

Two injuries in practice yesterday afternoon gave Ottawa University's chances in the Thanksgiving game here with College of Emporia a severe jolt. Lyman Morgan and Bill Mattis received leg injuries that will in all probability keep them out of the running. It is almost certain that Morgan, who has been doing the bulk of the punting lately, will be unable to play.

Otherwise the squad is in good shape and unless more injuries are sustained will go into the forthcoming game with high hopes of playing ball on a par with the Emporia team.

It is rather fitting that Emporia and Ottawa should finish their respective seasons in a game against each other. Both had some tough breaks or rather played poor ball in the middle part of the season but lately both have swung into a better stride. Ottawa snapped out of a losing streak and turned back Baker and tied Bethany. C. of E. turned back the Oklahoma Baptists 6-0.

Early in the season the Emporians were placed on paper as one of the strong teams of Kansas. Early wins over Bethel and Southwestern gave proof of that statement. Then something happened as it so often does. The Presbies went into the Kansas conference and dropped games to Baker, Bethany, Wesleyan and McPherson. These contests were close. The McPherson Bulldogs edged out with a 14 to 13 victory. During that time Emporia stuck in a 7 to 0 victory over the Pittsburg Teachers just by way of showing that they were a good team. The Pittsburg squad is in a tie for second place in the supposedly more powerful Central conference. So there you have it. The Presbies have truly a great team and have won all their non-conference games against formidable opponents and yet have lost all of their conference games. Perhaps they are one of the teams sports experts describe as being unable to go when they are "shooting for the money." Another guess would be that the Presbies had a mighty strong dose of over-rating at the beginning of the season and had their minds too much on winning the championship over Kansas Wesleyan. They were not over-confident, just forgetful there are other teams in the circuit than

Wesleyan. Now, however, they are remembering that Ottawa is in the league and intend to do something about Thanksgiving.

Of late Von Arb has been starting the game and playing through most of it. He was instrumental in defeating Baker and Bethel. Of course, any freshman football player has much to learn and Von Arb is no exception unless it is that he is learning quickly and trying mighty hard.

Another freshman who has come along in recent weeks is Phillip Palmer of Wellington. He took an early slump and did not show anything until about the middle of the season shortly before the Baker game. In that melee he helped slam over the first touchdown from his full-back position. He will bear watching in the years to come.

There are other boys who have marched a considerable distance down the road of football ability—and they may help make things quite tough in the Kansas conference next year. But it is hoped that they will not forget to make it tough on C. of E. Thanksgiving day.

TO BE TIGHT GAME

O. U. and C. of E. Both Anxious To Win Thanksgiving Day Tilt Here.

What promises to be another rousing football game is on schedule for Thanksgiving afternoon at 2:30 when College of Emporia meets Ottawa University in the final game of the season for both teams.

Both of these teams after slow starts have made recent snappy comebacks to show that each team is better than average. The Ottawans after ramming into tough defeats at the hands of the McPherson and Wesleyan eleven came back to show increased strength against Southwestern and then registered victories over Baker and Bethel and a tie with the supposedly powerful Bethany team. Charted in the last three games the Braves have proved themselves a fast rising team capable of playing football with anyone in the Kansas or Central conferences.

It is a fact, one of the odd facts of football, that the big team from Emporia has not won a conference game but has knocked off an array of non-conference foes with plenty of punch and vigor. Among those non-conference victories are triumphs over the Oklahoma Baptists, Southwestern, Bethel and Pittsburg. This is Coach Herb Worl's second year at the Presbyterian school and it was thought at the beginning of the year that he did have an exceptionally fine team gathered at Emporia. The squad started off that way and then cracked just as the conference season rolled around. Lately, however, they have shown signs of making a comeback, especially in the Oklahoma Baptist game which they won 6 to 0. Reports from C. of E. are that the Presbies are just a bit more anxious than usual to win this ball game and will do it unless the Braves are able to throw a mighty potent offense.

The Ottawans on the other hand are wanting to play the game from a winning angle and thereby add a touch of success to their season. If the Braves win this game, they will have a 500 per cent standing. They have lost four games, tied one, and won three to date.

READY FOR PLAY!

Big Crowd To Witness O. U.-C. of E. Clash on Cook Field Tomorrow Afternoon.

With fair weather scheduled for the Ottawa University-College of Emporia football game tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 on Cook field it is expected that a large crowd will turn out to see the first college football game to be played here on Thanksgiving for several years.

College of Emporia is bringing a special train to Ottawa with about 200 persons, including the Emporia band. Today the Emporia school is holding several big pep rallies in order to engender a winning spirit in their team.

Often the dopesters are able to show easily where one team is strongly favored. Not so, though, with this game. In several ways C. of E. is favored to win and in others Ottawa is slated. The team which has the greatest drive on the field tomorrow afternoon will win.

At least one C. of E. ball lugger will have to be watched. He is Reuben Harzman who is a fast and slippery halfback. The Ottawa team remembers him well enough from last year, having watched him speed 94 yards for a touchdown and the ball game. This year he has made several long runs.

Ottawa has no sensational backs but a few boys who keep plugging away at the line with relentless drive. Joe Lynch, Bill Mattis, Don Hough and Phillip Palmer will be cracking away at the C. of E. line.

Coach Richard Godlove this morning was not quite sure of his starting lineup for this final game of the season but hopes to start George Von Arb and Asa Eagles at ends, Bob Harrop and John Haley at tackles, George Lister and Gordon Daugharthy at guards, Cecil Smith at center, Oliver Smith at quarterback, Joe Lynch and Dorbin Gardner or Lyle Swetnam at halfbacks, and Donald Hough or Phillip Palmer at fullback. This lineup includes seniors who will be playing their last game, Lister of Ottawa and Haley of Leavenworth.

Braves Fear Harzman in Game Today on Ottawa U. Field.

Ottawa, Kan., Nov. 25.—(Special)—"I don't know what we will do with this fellow Harzman," said Coach Dick Goodlove of the Ottawa university Braves in commenting about his game with College of Emporia at Ottawa on Thanksgiving afternoon. Reuben Harzman of C. of E. has been a gridiron meteor on many occasions this fall and Coach Goodlove is worried that he may be a menace to his enjoyment of the Thanksgiving holiday. Last year Harzman ran 94 yards to a touchdown that beat the Braves, 14 to 12.

With the exception of one player, Lyman Morgan, injured in practice last week, the Braves will have a squad at full strength as they go into the Turkey Day battle. The Ottawa line has been especially groomed the past few days to stop the speed of Harzman and of Fullback Bob Wasson, who has proved to be a regular horse in many games this season. With Bob Harrop and Leonard Hofstra, tackles; George Lister and Gordon Daugharthy, guards, and Cecil Smith, center, in the middle of the line the Ottawans hope that line plunges of the Presbies will be cut down to a minimum and they

hope, too, that the minimum C. of E. is thinking about will be the same one they are thinking about. Protection of the ends from the speedy, slippery Harzman will be up to Eugene Harding and George Von Arb.

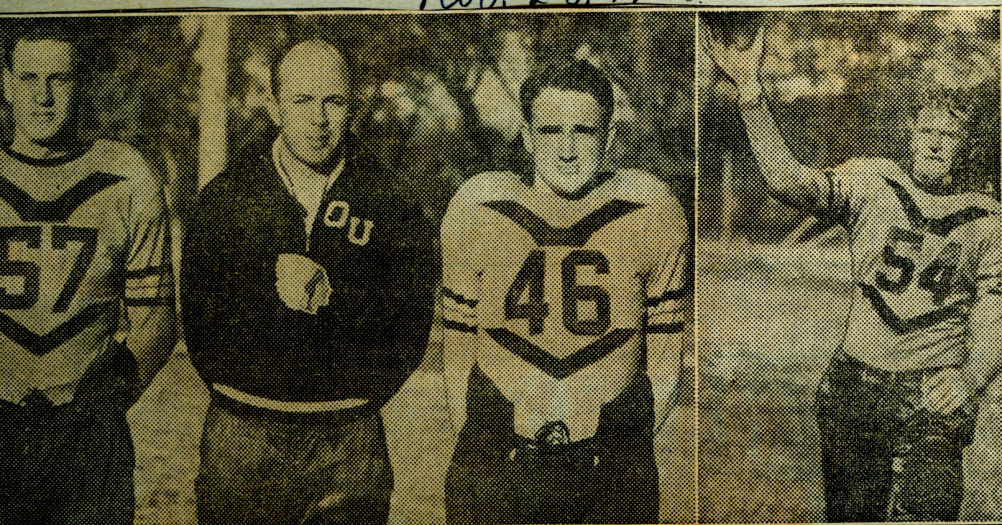

Von Arm tried to place kick on the next play, but the ball went wide. Taking the ball on their own 20, Emporia fumbled on the first play and Ottawa recovered. Two great lines pounded each other between the 30-yard lines yesterday on Cook field as Ottawa and College of Emporia tied 0 to 0 in the first daylight college game to be played in Ottawa in about five years.

Scoreless battles are not always interesting to the spectators, but the fans focused their attention on the magnificent defensive line play yesterday. Largely the game was a punting duel between Bell of C. of E. and David Conley of Ottawa. A stiff wind blowing out of the north made booting in that direction rather difficult, but Conley continually outpunted Bell when kicking into the wind which gave Ottawa a good advantage all during the game.

Most excitement in the game was staged by Ottawa in the closing minutes of play. Twice near the completion of time George Von Arb attempted place-kicks that missed the uprights by inches. Either one being good would have won the game.

Early in the game Ottawa twice threatened the Emporia goal line. Conley got off his first punt for 43 yards placing it outside on the 15-yard line. Bell got off a high, short kick which traveled only 13 yards and Ottawa had possession on the 28-yard line. Four plays netted only 5 yards, however, and C. of E. punted out of immediate danger. Conley kicked back immediately and gained 20 yards on the exchange of punts. C. of E. carried the ball for no gain once and then Harzman taking the ball fumbled and Bob Harrop recovered for Ottawa on the 10-yard. Two plunges and two passes failed to gain an inch. Bell again

Again Ottawa failed to dent the Emporia line and the ball passed to C. of E. on downs.

Emporia's big threat came in the third quarter. Harzman opened up for about the only time in the game and returned Conley's punt 23 yards to the Ottawa 36-yard line. A 14-yard pass, Bell to Lee, put the ball on the 22-yard. A stab at the line and two attempted passes gained nothing but did place the ball in the middle of the field from where Newland attempted a place-kick that was no good.

After that there were no threats until Ottawa made two attempts at place-kicking late in the last period.

It should detract no deserved credit from the Ottawa backfield to say that the feature of the game as far as O. U. was concerned was the magnificent defensive play of the Ottawa line. From end to end the Presbies found that stalward forward wall of the Braves too stout to break through for more than a few yards at a time. Even the great Reuben Harzman, playing his last game for C. of E., was unable to make headway against the terrific onslaughts of the crashing defense of the Ottawans. Three seniors, George Lister, John Haley and Asa Eagles, turned in defensive performances that were brilliant.

Undoubtedly Haley played his best game of the season. Time after time he got back into the C. of E. backfield to toss the Presbies from behind. After the game one of the Emporia boys said that on account of Haley C. of E. had five men in the backfield all afternoon.

Bob Harrop, Leonard Hofstra and Harold Pitts took care of the tackle posts in great shape. And Cecil Smith at center was a thorn in the side of the Emporia team. He was in almost every defensive play and did a nice job of passing the ball in the cold, windy atmosphere.

Joe Lynch, Don Hough, Phillip Palmer and Bill Mattis did most of the ball lugging for Ottawa and did very well against the hard playing C. of E. line. Mattis left the game with an injury late in the third quarter. It was not serious, however.

Emporia brought a crowd of 200 rooters on a special train.

The tie left Ottawa in fourth place in the conference standings. Kansas Wesleyan by getting a tie with McPherson yesterday retained undisputed possession of the championship.
