Literary Bocieties of Ottawa Univers On the afternoon of Dec 17 th 1869 the students of OHall Whawa University meet to take action roncerning the organization of the first Literary Society of this institution. The result of this meeting and one held Dec 21 was the organization of the Euphemian society, which held its first regular meeting Jan 4th 1870 with Lest, Holf, (now editor of the Western Baplist ) in the chair The members of this society, mis numbered 38 and among this number we notice the names of some who are now farominent businessmen in this city, The society continued to prosper during that

Page two. year, but the next year, owing to the fact that only a few of its members returned to school they found it impracticable to continue their meltings and so in. connection with the public school organized a new society with its headquarters at the old Brick S. H. The next society of which we find and any mention is the Calliopean, The seconds state that on Oct 29 1877 a meeting was natted by Trof, Williams who stated the object of the meeting to be the organization of a Literary Lociety, I sof Williams relected president and for the first year or set the society was under the personal superarsion of the faculaty, among the laading worker we find the names of masses Bass & Whitney and modern trumverate White sotton, Dicklow & Fred Stolt,

Tage three Overthing went along smoothly until the autumn of 1882 when the young Ladies headed by the pricep tress, his Varnum, secepted and in the room a cross the half eround one dimly lighted lamp meet and. look the first sleps toward organy organizations a society of their own Sept 15- 1882. The mande chosin was "Ladies Ahensan" The ofthersan society started out under the most froming circumstances with 19 charter members and overy prosperous, But the same can not be said of the Calliopean society of never recovered from its foss, It lingured along for a fow months but on the night of march 30th 1883 it passed away. . Tage four to resurrect it but in wain, The Calliopean society was a thing of the past. The young men, with without a society until Dec 1 st 1883 when they met and formed the Kappa hu Kappa. This society was short lived but it should ever be remembered That it was through its efforts that the Olympian was formed. The young men believing that the last part of the provert, united we stand, devided we fall; had been satisfactory proven by the societies determined, if possible, to assistain the truth of the first hart, united we stand". With this object in wear they appointed a committee to visit the Ladies society and to use all honosable means to effect a union between the two. The young Ladies though struggling with

Page bine many difficulties for an existence decided that they could not join the Happa secrety buthat the societies should hold their meetings together for two months. Under this arrangement things went along smoothly and at the end of that time the ties that bound them were soo strong that neather could bear to think of seperating But when the young gentlemen were informed that they factor lacked sand they determined to show their grit by going it alone mel more, But once was enough and at the close of their first meeting adjourned "sine die". Olympian was formed and has continued from that time to this an honor, to its founders and to its members, In it was combinded all that was good in both and it slood without a rivil until the begin ming of the present term. It thin became apparent that another Literary society was needed by the students and this need was fully met by the organization of the Philalethian society the last but not the least of the societies that have been connected with this institution, Though younger than its sister, the Olympian, yet (in many respects it is not for behind her) and the time is not for distant when the last shall be first, and the first, last, Long may these societies live in friendly competition, to be an honor to our university and a blessing its officered students. a blessing to the nation.
