two areas, and when the work is completed, a certain number of credit hours will be given in accordance with how much work has been done. The two areas of research are the rhetorical teachings of Quintilian, a Roman orator of the first century, A.D., and the public speaking techniques of Kenneth S. Wherry, U.S. Senator from Nebraska from 1942 until his death in 1951. Mr. Twedt's master's thesis dealt with the speaking abilities of Sen. Wherry, and his work this summer will involve delving more deeply into the same subject. Mr. Twedt has been in contact with Northwestern University, and he plans to transfer his Nebraska credits there and complete his doctoral work in 1965 or 1966.
