In this issue of the **Forensic** will be found several reports coming out of the office of the Secretary/Treasurer. I hope you find them informative.

The most important of these, of course, are the summary of the National Council meeting in Philadelphia where many of the decisions for the Convention next March were made, and the financial report for the year Aug. 1, 1973 to July 31, 1974. There is no valid way for me to make a definitive comparison with previous years financially, simply because of the many differences in operation of the office as a result of the physical moving, and the fact that the learning process seems to be never-ending. The actual number of memberships seems to be down a bit, but I have hopes that during the coming Convention year things will pick up.

This first year in this office has been a most interesting one to say the least. The membership and especially the sponsors have been most considerate of our mistakes and delays. We have had one change in office location early this summer which caused some problems, and as well a change in secretarial help, which has caused some rather long hours, once again in the learning process.

It is apparent that everything possible is being done by our hosts to make the coming convention a great one, and I want to solicit the aid of each and every chapter to do its part to make this next convention a great one. Aside from being present at the convention, I want to make the plea that each chapter sponsor and chapter president see to it that the fall report is returned as quickly as possible.

Memberships are the only source of income for this organization at this time or in the past. All other services for which a charge is made, including keys, are supplied at cost. This is the important reason that your Secretary/Treasurer has for years and now continues to ask that as early as possible during the year, and continuously during the year sponsors see to it that all

qualified debaters and individual events speakers process applications and send them in.

A considerable amount of confusion has occurred during this past year in the processing of Form A applications, and a lesser amount for Form B. This confusion has been brought about by the changes in the Constitution made at the Omaha Convention in 1973. **Please** read Pages 2 and 3 of the **new** Constitution dealing with Orders and Degrees. There you will find that qualification for membership in Individual Speaking is determined by the number of rounds. The number of tournaments is of no importance any longer. It is important to know how many individual speeches were given. Some tournaments have as few as one preliminary round, and others as many as four or five. Please list the number of rounds including finals if any. The "place" column is important for advanced standing, so that when a Form B is sent in, this office can refer to the Form A, and the applicant will not have to repeat any of the information on the original Form A. The same thing is generally true for debate. The total number of debates is now the sole determining factor for qualification for membership. We ask for the won/lost record only for reference when application for advanced standing is made.

A final note. We should ask that you send in the application on the new forms A and B, and we have an ample supply on hand, and would be most happy to send a supply upon request. We dislike very much having to send back applications for additional information, thereby delaying the membership process.

This is my hope for a good **Forensic** year for all of you and the expectation that we will have the pleasure of seeing all of you in Philadelphia. Make plans now, and don't be sorry you missed this great Convention during the very opening of the celebration of the bicentennial year of our country.

On March 1-2 Augustana speakers were able to win top honors in sweepstakes points for Sioux Province schools at the Bi-Province tournament held at Moorhead State College in Minnesota. By virtue of winning three straight Bi-Province awards, the K. Don Tibbetts memorial trophy was retired at Augustana. The trophy was offered in memory of the late K. Don Tibbetts, Augustana debate coach killed in the tragic plane crash of 1969.

Augustana debaters, on three occasions this past season, "closed out" debate competition by placing two teams in the finals. This feat was accomplished by Steve Binger - Steve Miller and David Lillehaug - Craig Anderson at the Mankato State Invitational; by Lillehaug-Anderson and Randy Jackson - Larry Scheier at the Kansas University Novice Tourney; and again by Binger - Miller and David DeLap - Craig Anderson at the University of Northern Iowa Invitational.
