RE : Disciplinary Action

At about 1:00 pm Monday, February 21, 1994, a resident of Ottawa called the Provost's Office to lodge a complaint about the programming he heard on KTJO-FM during the noon to 1 pm hour. His complaint cited remarks made on-air that he felt were in bad taste considering this community, and the American Baptist affiliation of the University, and the general interference with his enjoyment of the music, including singing, general "loudness, rudeness and obnoxiousness" on the air, over the records. Several students and members of the University staff also commented on the general poor taste of the broadcast.

Inasmuch as the caller is a resident of the community which we serve, who listens to KTJO because he enjoys the music and the efforts of the students, this incident could have had extremely serious ramifications, including a formal complaint to the Federal Communications Commission and general bad publicity within the Ottawa community for the station, the broadcast communication program and the University.

The incident <u>did</u> cost an entire afternoon and evening in making phone calls to determine the nature and extent of the complaint, verbal and written apologies to the listener, drafting this memo, an entry in the station's public inspection file regarding the complaint and a special meeting of the Radio Workshop class.

It is also noted that Mr. Myers, who signed the Operating (transmitter) Log as the operator on duty during the noon to 1 pm hour, is not licensed. This is a serious violation of FCC rules which could have resulted in a \$25,000 fine, and loss of the station operating license.

Therefore, relative to your disregard of the sections of the KTJO-FM Operations Manual entitled "The Public Interest" (page 5), and "Locally Originated Program Content" (page 10), and Section 73.1230, CFR Title 47, FCC Rules and Regulations (cited on pages 6 and 45 of the Operations Manual), you are hereby indefinitely suspended from broadcasting on KTJO-FM, with a failing grade in Radio Workshop for the Spring, 1994 semester.

I want to thank you, once again, for your phone call earlier today in which you expressed concern about the programming on KTJO-FM during the 12 Noon to 1 PM hour, and for your time and courtesy in visiting with me about the problem this afternoon.

The radio station is an educational laboratory for students majoring in broadcast communication and, as such, students on the air are in a learning situation. However, since we are licensed to serve the public interest, there are well documented standards of good taste, decency and plain common sense which govern all on-air personalities. It is obvious to me from your comments, and from the comments of several other people who heard part of the program, that those standards were disregarded. Therefore, I have taken the disciplinary actions I indicated to you against the students in question. It may be a hard lesson, but that, too, is part of the learning process.

Finally, I want to thank you for listening, and for your positive comments about the music and programming generally. The students like to know that people are listening out there, and are appreciative of their efforts.

Dear Mrs. Lee:

As a follow up to our telephone conversations of December 20, I want you to know that I have contacted our chief engineer concerning the problem with your television reception. He, I'm afraid, is as baffled as I am as to the cause, since we have not altered our power, signal pattern, tower or antenna height or position in any way since going on the air over a year ago. He feels, however, that something near you may have changed which would re-radiate our signal. This could be a neighbor erecting a tower, something at the Middle School, or some other structure.

One possible solution is installation of an FM trap on your television antenna line. I have ordered the trap from Radio Shack, and will deliver it to you as soon as it arrives. In the meantime, I might suggest that you talk to the people at the Radio Shack store here (205 South Main). They are aware of the problem, and said that if you'll contact them they may be able to help with a solution. We will, of course, pay for any needed filters, traps or cable.

If the FM trap fails to rectify the problem, or if the people at Radio Shack can't suggest a solution, there may be another alternative. Hopefully we can clear your reception up this way, however.

I do apologize, very sincerely, for your inconvenience, and can certainly understand your irritation, and I hope we can resolve the problem to your satisfaction in the very near future.
