The traditional order [here given in TEV] is as follows:

- 1. "Forgive them, Father! They don't know what they are doing." L.23:34
- 2. "I tell you this: today you will be in Paradise with me." L.23:43
- 3. "Woman, here is your son....Here is your mother." J.19:26f
- 4. "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani? My God, my God, why did you abandon me?" Mk.
- 5. "I am thirsty." J.19:28 15:34f
- 6. "Father! In your hands I place my spirit." L.23:46
- 7. "It is finished!" J.19:30

Here is a visual to show how dramatically different the gospels are in their crucifixion accounts -- or, to put it otherwise, how free the evangelists (the original assemblers of the materials) and the redactors were in story-telling on paper, and thus how free the previous and simultaneous oral tradition:
