Chamber of Commerce Votes To Go After \$10,000 Some Time After January 1.

A drive to subscribe \$10,000 for Ottawa university, as part of a \$25,000 fund to be raised in the state at large, will be sponsored by the Ottawa Chamber of Commerce some time after the first of the year, it was voted at the directors' luncheon meeting today at the North America hotel.

The action to sponsor the campaign was taken after a compre-hensive review of the O. # **CATCH STUDENTS** PAINTING AT O.U.

SIX BAKER BOYS CAPTURED, ONE IS FINED.

O. U. Board Sends Bill to Baker for Cleaning, and Finds O. U. Paint Was Used at Baldwin.

Six Baker University students who came from Baldwin early to-day did a good job of smearing paint on sidewalks, posts and signs at Ottawa University, but they were slow on the get-away. Their speeding motor car was hauled down on Main street go-ing 70 miles an hour by Officers C. L. Hough and V. M. Kinnison, who happened to be in the vicin-ity of the college when they start-ed rapidly from the scene of their vandalism. who came from Baldwin early to-

All six languished in jail over night, and this morning the driver, Robert Barbe of Kansas City, Mo., was fined \$12 in police court for speeding. The others were released after a conference of O. U. board members, who decided to send the bill for cleaning off the paint to Baker.

The five who were released this morning without fines were Frank Nugent of Kansas City, Kas., John Miller and John Coffman of Overbrook, Herbert Stotts of St. Louis and Emmett La France of Independence, Mo.

"If you had any O. U. boys in custody for a similar offense, we might trade hostages," suggested B. F. Bowers, an O. U. board member, to Baker authorities, but they had no hostages. However, it was reported at Baldwin that some painting on the Baker campus had been done apparently by

# **OUTLINES PLANS** FOR OTTAWA U

DR. A. B. MARTIN ADDRESSEI BUSINESS MEN.

New President Hopes To Rais Standards, and Increase Efficiency of School's Service.

Before a group of 45 busines men last night, Dr. Andrew F Martin, president of Ottawa University, outlined his plans for greater Ottawa University. H spoke following a dinner in Nort American hotel. Arthur E. Willi introduced Dr. Martin.

What he had to say was expressed after he had made a carful survey of the situation since

pressed after he had made a carful survey of the situation since he assumed his duties. He emphasized anew the necessity of the school setting a budget, whice must be held as low as possible and living within that budge. On the other hand, he also made it clear that the school must expand gradually to meet the demands for service. Next year, he said, it would be necessary to ad at least two new members to the faculty. faculty.

He suggested that increase service might be attained in way He suggested that increase service might be attained in way other than in securing increase funds. Particularly, he stressed desire to revamp the courses study and make them more specific. Standards of the colles should be raised, he said, and is his hope to make the scho distinctive in the work that does along certain lines. While should be easy for a student enter, he said it should be hat for him to get out. He favors much special attention for students as is necessary to give the every opportunity to meet his standards in courses of study. After he had spoken for le than an hour, he answered que tions. Dr. Martin made a fiimpression of his sincerity as showed he had definite plans mind for an expanded Ottav University.
