



# I See by the Times 1935-1960

A quick look at the highlights of our history as recorded in the 25 volumes of the Times. One is profoundly impressed with the activities of the Women's Mission Society, Church School, Young People's Groups, Choirs, Scouts, Men's Fellowship, Active Boards, continual emphasis on evangelism and personal commitment, and our loyal participation in all national projects. The pastor has asked me to include the names of some whose activities have been noteworthy. The list should be ten times as long to include those whose work in the Church has been equally significant. And what wonderful Staff Members we have had.

1935. CITY TEMPLE TIMES started March 8 by Pastor U. S. Mitchell, who introduced many other innovations. 25th anniversary of dedication of CITY TEMPLE observed in Fall with many of original choir. Those known to be living after 50 years (in 1960) are Mrs. F. H. Weatherwax, Mrs. A. E. Godfrey, Bessie Haas, Harold Odell, and Mr. and Mrs. Cressey all of Sioux Falls, and the following elsewhere: Mr. and Mrs. O. H.
