# COVER STORY

The national collegiate record of 56 hours of non-stop debate was established at Baldwin-Wallace College during its Debate Marathon held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 3-5, in the college union, Strosacker Hall.

The lighting of the torch by Dr. Fred Harris, dean and vice president for academic affairs, launched the Marathon before an audience of students and faculty members.

Establishing a record in collegiate debating was one aim of the Marathon, but in academic terms, another aim was to encourage an interest in the principles of free debate, a fundamental process of democracy.

The idea of the Debate Marathon came from Dr. James Ross, associate professor of speech and the debate coach. It was taken up and sponsored by the B-W Ohio Alpha chapter of Pi Kapa Delta.

The Marathon was given impetus by the B-W varsity debaters who argued, pro and con, the intercollegiate topic, "Resolved, that Law Enforcement Agencies Should be Given Greater Freedom in the Investigation and Prosecution of Crime."

After the varsity debate, the debate was thrown open to the floor, and the Marathon continued around-the-clock with students, faculty, administration, and even townspeople participating in the 50 different topics ranging from "Should Red China Be Admitted to the UN?" to "Should You Believe Everything Your Professor Says?"

Linda Sutliff, senior from Lynnfield, Mass., was the chairman of the Marathon, and a varsity debater. Thomas Ross, junior from Fairview Park, Ohio, was her partner in the kick-off debate when they took the affirmative side. Their opponents were Chris Martin and Tim Bratton, both freshmen.

## **MOORHEAD STATE COLLEGE**

The Minnesota Kappa Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta was installed on Moorhead State College campus, October 20, 1965.

During the fall quarter the chapter sponsored the annual tri-college High School Debate Clinic and traveled to the University of Chicago debate tournament and the Bradley University tournament, Peoria, Illinois.

Winter quarter, Kappa Chapter sponsored the first Expository Speaking Contest to be held on our campus. During the quarter the debate teams have traveled to University of South Dakota, Mankato State College, and University of Wisconsin, Eau Claire. Miss Diane Bergeson captured two first place trophies in public address, one at the Mankato tournament and the other at the University of Wisconsin.

Activities for spring quarter will include sponsoring the International Debaters from Cambridge University, England, on our campus, March 30. We are also planning to hold our second annual audience judged debate tournament in late April.

## **TEXAS CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY**

The Texas Christian University Zeta Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta began a very active season of debating in the fall of this year. Once again under the direction of Dr. David L. Matheny, debaters participated in eight tournaments in five different states before the Christmas holidays. Sweepstakes were won by the squad at Bethany Nazarene College in Oklahoma. Highlight of the fall season however, was the annual debate tournament held on campus on the first weekend of November. Southwest Missouri State College captured senior division, while Houston University won Junior. During the tournament weekend for the second year three television debates centered around national and international topics were filmed. Texas Christian University served as the host team in each of the shows which are thirty

minutes in length and will be shown on WBAP-TV sometime later this spring.

Refreshed and teeming with vigor from the Christmas holidays, the spring semester found the squad traveling to seven more tournaments occurring in Kansas, Illinois, Mississippi, Oklahoma, and Texas. The team of Mike Hadley and Paul Madden have continually done well at these tournaments.

On March 25, and 26, Texas Christian University hosted the West Point Elimination Tournament for our district. Later this spring the school will also play host to the High Schol Regional Interscholastic League tournament.

In the Elimination Tournament, the Texas Christian University team of Mike Hadley and Paul Madden, placed first.

The chapter has added nine members to its ranks, four of whom are freshmen this year. New members are: John Attaway, Ginger Brittain, Linda Cordell, Caroline Derksen, Mike Hadley, Ralph Leinweber, Paul Madden, Al Mitchem, and Dee Vangilder. New chapter officers were also elected at a recent meeting. Mike Hadley was elected president, and Carol Miller secretary.

## **MISSISSIPPI STATE UNIVERSITY**

With 15 students competing in at least 5 intercollegiate debates, the Mississippi Beta chapter won 117 debates in competition with Colleges and Universities from throughout the nation this year. The tournament schedule included 10 events in Mississippi, Alabama, and Georgia, as well as the Southern Speech Association Tournament in Miami, Florida, and the Harvard Invitational in Cambridge, Massachusetts. During the year the team won a total of 13 trophies, 4 medals, and 57 certificate awards. A breakdown of the trophy awards includes 6 first place trophies and 2 second places in debate, and 4 first places and 1 second place in individual events. Medal awards were for 2 first places



and 2 second places in individual events. The certificate awards won in both debate and individual events include 28 Superiors, 12 Excellents, and 17 Goods.

Some of the highlights of the season included 1st place in the senior division of debate at the Magnolia Speech Festival held at the Mississippi State College for Women in Columbus, Mississippi, and a Superior rating in debate for a perfect record of 6 wins and 0 losses at the Southern Speech Association Tournament in Miami in the Men's Division.

At the Province of the Southeast tournament held at M.S.C.W. this year our debaters won the first place debate and over-all sweepstakes trophies in the Women's Division. At this tournament, M.S.U. compiled the outstanding record of winning two trophies, four medals, and 19 certificates of merit in both the Men's and Women's Divisions of debate and individual events. Membership in the Mississippi Beta chapter is at an all-time high and we are looking forward to our annual end-of-the-season cook out election of new officers meeting next month.

### **WISCONSIN STATE UNIVERSITY Oshkosh**

The Wisconsin Gamma chapter of Pi Kappa Delta, under the direction of John W. Schmidt, is now preparing for its final event of the year—the annual banquet. Banquet activities include the initiation of new pledges, honorary members, and the newly elected officers. The retiring officers include president Mary Koplitz, vice-president James Abbs, secretary Donna Witkowski, and treasurer Alan Johnson. The highlight of the banquet will be the second annual presentation of the John A. Gronouski Award for Excellence in Debate, which was won last year by Mary Koplitz.

The banquet has taken on new significance since last year when parents and alumni were invited. To keep the alumni informed an annual newsletter has been prepared. This year's news-

letter will tell of the twenty-five intercollegiate debate tournaments, and the exhibition debate with the team from Cambridge University.

### **EASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY**

The 29th Annual Eastern Illinois Speech Tournament, sponsored by the Illinois Sigma Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta, was held on the campus at Charleston last quarter. Over 200 students and coaches from 30 colleges and universities in 10 states participated in the two-day affair. For the first time, the tournament featured switch-sides, power-matched debating, both in junior and senior divisions, as well as men's and women's oratory and extemporaneous speaking.

Sweepstakes was won by the University of Southern Mississippi, with Vanderbilt University second. In senior debate, Indiana University defeated Southern Mississippi in the finals; and Amundsen-Mayfair of Chicago, winner over Southeast Missouri State, took junior division honors. Individual winners included L. Rohler of Indiana University, in Men's Extemp. Speaking, Mary Jo Willingham of Manchester College in Women's Extemp., John Cozad of Westminster, in Men's Oratory, and Viki Kristal of Northern Illinois University in Women's Oratory.

Eastern is in its first year under our new director of Forensics, Dr. E. R. Tame, who came to Eastern from Bethany Nazarene, in Oklahoma. We have participated in 17 debate tournaments in 10 different states this year. In addition, under discussion coach Al Rundle, Eastern's discussants have had a busy year. About 30 students have participated in 4 tournaments, and numerous other appearances before clubs, schools, and other organizations throughout east-central Illinois. They discussed not only the national discussion topic, but also other areas of interest.

Among Eastern students competing in individual events, sophomore orator Jo Hicks has had consistent success. She



has finished among the top three in every tournament she entered this year, finishing second at Pittsburg, Kansas, and in the Peace Oratory, at Galesburg, Ill.

Sigma Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta will initiate about 20 new members this spring. The annual forensics banquet was scheduled for May 10, with Dr. Georgia Bowman, National Pi Kappa Delta President, as our featured speaker. The banquet honors all participants in our forensic program, and recognizes outstanding individuals.

### **WESTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY**

Our chapter initiated six new members this April. They are: Dan Erwin from Rock Island, Illinois; George Maguire, from Macomb, Illinois; George Stege from Northlake, Illinois; Bill Hoffmeier from Chicago, Illinois; Bob Gaudas from Rockford, Illinois; and Assistant Professor of Speech, Dr. Fredrick Voigt, instructor in public address and frequent judge and coach for the WIU teams. Our chapter adviser, Dr. Raymond K. Tucker, has been on leave since January, 1966. He has been doing post-doctoral work at Harvard. PKD members are looking forward to his return in June. Taking over his duties as adviser has been our new debate coach, Mr. Robert Holton.

PKD members have been kept pretty busy this season with three tournaments held here at Western—the Season Opener Tournament held in October, the Double Threat Tournament held in February, and the Oral Interpretation Tournament held in March. Members have assisted debate coach Robert Holton in tabulating, timing, and other details of the tournament operations.

### **FRESNO STATE COLLEGE**

The California Nu Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta held their annual Spring Initiation at the home of co-sponsor Dave Natharius in Fresno, Calif. The initiation was presided over by: Larry Cole, President; Marcia Rantsma, Secretary-Treasurer; and Pat Prewitt, Histor-

ian and Acting Vice-President. The new members initiated into the Degree of Fraternity in Debate were: Ron Capps, Janis Pendegraft, Tom Tusan, and Randy Walsh. New members in the Degree of Fraternity in Oratory were: Fay Ewen, Darlyne Kishi, Janet Matlock, Joan Mulliner, Tony Perella, and Richard Ullman. Also initiated was Ralph Salgado, Jr. in the Order of Instruction.

Mr. Salgado is Assistant Director of Forensics at Fresno State. The formal initiation was preceded by an informal program in which each initiate presented a humorous oratory or interp. Following these speeches each initiate was given two minutes in which to speak on a contemporary issue as an impromptu topic. Such topics were discussed as: Why did the chicken cross the road? The tortoise and the hare—a fair race? Should the coyote be allowed to catch the road-runner? Will Snoopy ever catch Red Baron? Intellectual discussion followed each impromptu presentation.

The forensics activity at Fresno State this past year has indicated that much will be heard from the California Nu Chapter in the future. Tentative plans are already being discussed concerning the anticipated trip to Wisconsin next spring.

### **OTTAWA UNIVERSITY**

The Ottawa University Alpha Chapter closed its season at the Province of the Plains Regional at Greeley, Colorado with superiors in Debate, Discussion, and Extemp. The squad attended 19 tournaments during the school year and finished with a 66 per cent win record. Twenty-two students were involved in forensics and debate during the year. The squad will lose only two individuals: James Anderson, who will attend seminary, and Carl Joecks, who will attend graduate school in speech.

On June 4 the Alpha Chapter has scheduled a banquet to honor the Ottawa University Pi Kappa Delta alumni. The chapter sponsor, Micheal S. Twedt,



was elected Vice Governor of the Province of the Plains for the ensuing two years.

### UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI at Kansas City

This has been an eventful and exciting year for the UMKC debaters. Along with the excitement, however, there was a certain air of gravity in the forensics office last fall. Dr. Walter H. Murrish stepped down as director of forensics. We were all sad about this, but he continues to take an active interest in the debate squad, and, as always, is ready with encouragement. Though we all miss him on the tournament circuit, we are glad he is still in his office with a sympathetic ear for all who come in.

Taking over for Dr. Murrish is Mr. Harold Cook. Mr. Cook did his undergraduate work at Alma College, then went to Bowling Green for his M.A. He is finishing his Ph.D. from Michigan State at the present time.

Along with Mr. Cook, we have two new graduate assistants. Roger Mortimer coached debate at a local high school for several years. John Cragan, a name and face well known on the circuit, debated for Northern Illinois University.

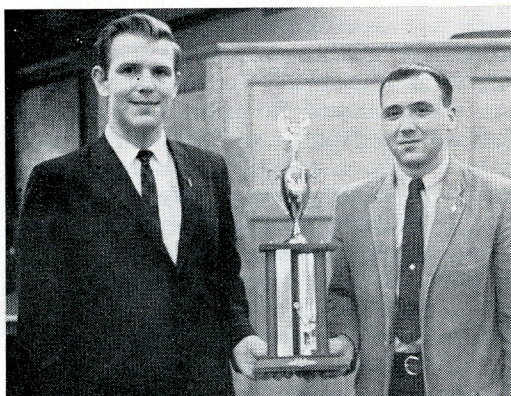
The squad made it to twenty-one tournaments, starting in early October. Teams made the eliminations at Rockhurst, Air Force, Illinois State, Kansas State (Pittsburg) and Nebraska. The novices placed third at Missouri State. At West Point Regional, Steve Osman and Russ Usnick placed fourth with a 6-2 record. Two weeks later the same team was top ranked at Pi Kap Province. Don Shields took second in Men's Extemp at the same tourney. At present, the entire squad is busy getting Osman and Usnick ready for West Point.

Along with the activity on the debate circuit, Missouri Pi chapter found time to sponsor a high school Speech and Drama Festival. This is the sixth year the Speech department and our chapter have sponsored the festival. Included in the events are one-act plays, public

speaking, extemp, duet acting, radio speaking, and drama reading. Points are given and certificates are awarded for superior and excellent performances. A sweepstakes trophy is awarded to the school with the highest point total.

At a recent meeting Russ Usnick, Marshall Miller, Lenore Gordon, Jim Hicks, David Smith and Roger Mortimer were initiated into Pi Kap. Don and Kathy Shields were initiated at Province.

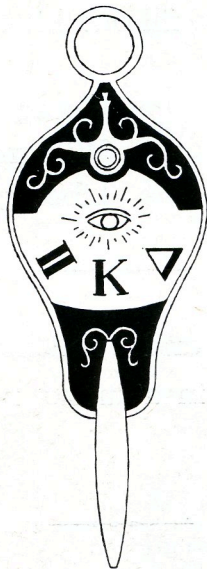
