Mrs. Victs ia a native of French Switzerland, and was born in the town of Vevey, which is located near the beautiful lake Geneva. She received her education partly in her native town and partly at Geneva.

After having finished her education at the two places, she went to Northern Germany to further fit herself for teaching which profession she had chosen as her life work. After remaining here for four and one-half years studying the German language, she went to England, spending one vs. if the extra acquire the language.

On returning home she occupied the chair of language in Belletive college, a school for young men Belletive was founded in 1836 by a great pedagogue Sillig by name, and a Saxon by birth. To this school young men from all the countries of Europe came, as it ranks very high as a linguistic chool.

Her first position held in this country was in a young ladies' seminary located near Hartford, Conn., which position she held for five years. Her course naturally led her to the Empire state and east her lot for three years in Youkers beautifully situated on the Hudson river not far from the historic home of Washington Irving.

At this time the western fever was riging in the east and Mrs Victs at once fell a victim to it allowing her self to be taken to Duluth Minn not a great while be fore the World's Fair. She visited Chicago during the fair and while there gave private instruction for one year

In 1893 a former pupil invited Mrs. Viets to accompany her to Europe, which invitation was accepted. Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, she visited and spent, the winter in Berlin, and the next spring went to the sunny. Italian land again. The party set sail from Genoa to return to America. Having relatives in New Jersey, some time was spent at their beautiful country home.

She again took up the work of teaching, this time at Gambier, Ohio, where she remained until the spring of '95. This same year she was united in marriage to Mr. Viets. Since her marriage she has been taking private lessons and giving private instruction, until the call came to visit Kansas and supply the place of our beloved instructor. Miss F. C. Norris, who is now traveling in Europe.
