Through the Years with Katy Jo . . .

- Carrier-current campus radio station became a reality. Equipment was the 1942 project of the class in electronics and broadcasting from Tauy Jones Hall for a limited time was a project in the Speech and Drama Department
- As Station KOU, programs of music, poetry, discussions, and interviews 1943 were broadcast regularly on Thursday evenings.
- KOU enjoyed new accommodations in its present location on the third floor 1946 of TJH where live broadcasts of plays, news, music, debates, and interviews with campus personalities and guests served the campus and parts of the community. Public school classes and other groups also broadcast and audiences were invited to observe through the glass wall.

Radio Engineering and Radio Broadcasting courses were offered.

- Board of Governors and student management were established. 1947
- New call letters KTJO Kansas Tauy Jones Ottawa. KTJO joined the 1948 Intercollegiate Broadcasting System as one of the oldest stations.
- Birthday of Katy Jo marked with a special broadcast and celebration. 1949 In later years the birthday parties took on a variety of forms. The theme of the Alumni Reunion program that year had been "An Evening with Katy Jo" and was broadcast over the station.
- FCC license for KTJO-FM and a FM transmitter. The $\underline{\text{Campus}}$ gave schedules. 1951
- Studioette Console acquired. Monthly program guides were mailed to a 1960 predetermined audience. Each evening and Sunday afternoon were filled.
- The educational programing included airing the lectures for the required 1963 course, Man in Society, in the evening following the class period. This helpful practice was continued for several years.
- Program guides discontinued the transmitter "collapsed from old age" 1966 according to one report. Of course, repairs put it back on the air.
- A week of "Open House" for students and the public, and a banquet to 1967 celebrate the 25th Year of broadcasting.
- Years have come and gone, and the engineering and the programing -- the 1984 sports, music, religious and educational features, and entertainment have continued without insurmountable problems. But, again, this is to be a "year to mark" because either KTJO will have 100-watt power, or it will cease to be.
