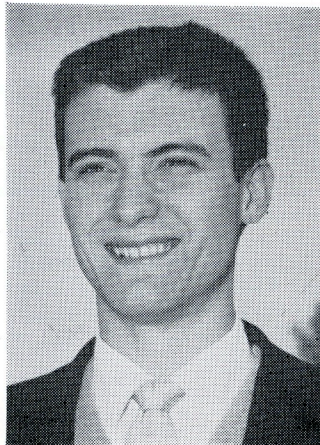

Student Resolutions

One hundred and eighteen students from seventy-seven colleges and universities participated in ten hours of discussion based on the question, How Can the American Educational System Best Meet the Needs of our Society? The following resolutions were adopted at the general assembly which marked the last round of the participation:

RESOLUTION NO. ONE:

WHEREAS, The year 1954 saw more people than ever before in the nation's schools, and

WHEREAS, The estimated enrollment figures released by the Department of Education show 37,706,500 or one/fifth of our population in American classrooms during the current 1954-55 school year, and

WHEREAS, Housing, equipping and teaching American youth will remain the most significant problem for many years to come . . .

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That this 1955 Pi Kappa Delta Convention go on record as approving the establishment of federal appropriations which would be distributed through a national board of collective representatives of the various states to individual state agencies for public schools in direct proportion to their needs and allowing these said appropriations only after all effective means within same states have been utilized.

RESOLUTION NO. TWO:

WHEREAS, 1955 Pi Kappa Delta Convention, through its representatives in discussion, has described the goals of education as given to each individual in our society the opportunity to live in a democracy with adequate education in leadership, civic responsibility, social adjustment, and better use of leisure time . . .

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That a national advisory committee should be established, composed of representative educators and lay leaders to establish minimum essential levels for teachers, curriculum, and facilities in these specific ways:

1. Every teacher is to have a bachelor's degree.
2. Set minimum standards of core curricula in elementary and secondary education.
3. To establish transferable credits.
4. To establish transferable teacher credentials.
5. To promote academic freedom in school systems.
6. To integrate a federal aid program with our school system.
7. To establish higher standards for educational administrators.
8. To establish a uniform age standard for entrance into the public school system.

Ridin' the Provinces

Dear PKD's!

As the clock on the corner bank tolled 3:00 A.M., April 13, we (the three girls from MSCW, Mama, our daughter Betty Jane and I) rolled into Columbus, Mississippi, from Redlands University. Our Chamber of Commerce is somewhat reticent about advertising Mississippi sunshine, but it was really enjoyable to drive at night with the windows down and without a coat. California noontime sunshine at Redlands, however, was as advertised. It was cool at night. The scenery was truly picturesque. The snow-capped mountains, the well planned and tended campus, oranges, grapefruits and lemons, to be had for the picking (except for a law against it), the clear blue skies with cirrus, cumulus, and an occasional cumulo—status—all created a lasting vision of the 1955 National Convention for those attending. We had a wonderful time at Redlands and regret all of you were not there. The Convention was well planned and executed; the food, delicious; the hosts, superb.

We, as did many of the delegates who drove, experienced Mother Nature in the raw; a young cloud burst with hail in Texas, dust and gravel storms (glazed windshield) across New Mexico and Arizona so thick that at times you couldn't see across the road, strong winds, mud showers, cold nights, hot days, desert, sand, buffalo grass, cacti, mesquite, cedars, pines, mountains, rivers (dry and wet). Good roads however and all a part of the experience of seeing America in action.

Some statistics—554 delegates and visitors from 116 chapters from 26 states attended the Convention. All province governors were present and busy helping with the convention except WOFFORD G. GARDNER, Province of the Lakes, CEDRIC L. CRINK and PAUL ROSSER, resolutions; RALPH A. MICKEN, convention evaluation; HARVEY CROMWELL, convention publicity; CHARLES MASTIN, Men's debate; CLARA CHILSON,

oratory; MARION E. HAWKINS, Women's extempe; CUNERA VAN EMMERIK, nominations; EUGENE R. MOULTON, local convention chairman.

GRACE WALSH, Wisconsin State at Eau Claire, was elected governor of the Province of the Upper Mississippi. PAULINE KRIEGER, Macalester College was elected secretary-treasurer.

It was good to see and talk with DR. E. R. NICHOLS, a founder and first National President of PKD, and Mrs. Nichols.

Province night provided a variety of entertainment. The program included songs by JACKIE CROWDER, soloist of the University of Redland's Concert Choir and BARBARA FORD, Southern California star of "Oklahoma," "Kiss me Kate," and "Carousal;" EDDIE GARR, Broadway, motion picture and radio comedian who has headlined vaudeville bills at Carnegie Hall and the London Palladium; and KEN BARY who presented a running song-patter on "The History of Boogie." DR. ROBERT BENJAMIN, San Diego State College, was MC of the program. Swimming, ping pong, square dancing, and badminton occupied the remainder of the evening for most of the delegates.

I appreciate very much the fine cooperation and assistance given me as director of publicity of the Redland's Convention by DICK WEST of the Redlands News Bureau; DICK RIGGINS, student editor of *The Key*; EMIL R. PFISTER, assistance director of publicity; and BOB JACOBS of the Redlands *Sun Telegram*.

It is with a mingled regret and relief that I prepare this last copy of the FORENSIC and end this last "Ridin' The Provinces." While it has been fun, it has also involved considerable work. Before winding-up this issue, I would like to pay tribute to:

MR. W. A. BENSON, SR., and members of the Benson Printing Company for their very fine cooperation and assistance in printing the FORENSIC. It has been a sincere pleasure to have worked with them.

To all of you, my sincere thanks for your considerations, help, and encouragement. Your articles, news, and pictures have kept the "ole mail pouch" full and the FORENSIC the voice of Pi Kappa Delta.
