

# THE LEGEND STILL LIVES. . . .

Through the years legends have come and gone. Most of the time the average person never got a chance to meet the legend first hand. Contrary to the average person, people living in Ottawa saw a legend at his best. The man's name was Richard (Dick) Peters. Peters coached for 22 years at OU, 19 years of which he was the head coach of the football squad. As a head coach Peters compiled a 129-42-3 won, loss, tie record for a winning percentage of .750, a remarkable accomplishment. While an assistant to Wally Forsberg in 1946, 1947 and 1948 his squads ran up a 20-5-3 record. For the next four years, Peters was to be head coach at OU and compiled a 26-10-0 record finishing first in the conference twice and second twice. In 1953 Peters left OU and went to Southern Methodist University as an assistant coach. Following a four year stint at the Dallas, Texas school Peters came back to the head coaching duties he left, only to suffer two losing seasons in a row, the only two of his head coaching career. In 1957 his squad finished 4-5 overall and 3-4 in conference play for a fifth place finish in the conference, the worst of his career as a head coach. The following season the Braves slipped to 3-5-1 overall while 3-3-1 in conference play, good enough for a third place finish. For the next nine seasons Peters was to be the envy of the coaching world. During that span of time Peters' teams were to compile a record of 74-9-0, winning five conference championships, and finishing second the remaining four times. From 1960-1962 Peters' teams ran off 23 consecutive victories, and two years later the Braves, under Peters' direction, strung 19 consecutive victories together. During the first string the Braves scored 767 points or 35.5 a game and gave up 135 points or 5.9 a game. The second series of wins provided much of the same. The Braves tallied 705 points or 37.1 a game and yielded a mere 110 points or 5.7 a game. While the head football coach at OU, Peters totaled eight conference champions, six second place squads, three third place finishers, a fourth place stand and the fifth place finish in 1957. In addition to being an assistant football coach in 1946, Peters also coached on the track team. Peters went to high school in Valley Falls, Kansas and graduated from Kansas State University in 1946. He received his Master's Degree from Kansas University. Following the 1971 season Peters moved to Kansas State for an assistant coaching job. Peters died in 1972 of a heart attack, but as with many other legends, the name will always live.

Ottawa University honors Dick Peters, and it is because of his commitment to and enthusiasm for young people and their development, that we dedicate this program.

While he was Head Football Coach in 19 seasons at Ottawa, there were 8 championship teams, 6 second place teams, 3 third place teams and a fifth.



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

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

## **FOOTBALL**

With the first winning season since 1972, the 1976 Braves, under the direction of first year coach, Don McLeary, showed possibilities of bringing a successful program back to OU. Coming back from the '76 squad will be two HAAC All-Conference selections, Kim Hendrix, junior wide receiver, and Greg Schultz, a senior linebacker, who hopes to solidify the defense. A good number of lettermen will return to assist the OU cause along with many new recruits from Colorado and Kansas.

Despite the numerous returners the squad will be a young one. Three freshman starters will return. John Sherman, quarterback, hopes to provide the good ground game which will compliment the passing game of last year. The other sophomores that saw a good amount of action as freshmen were Barney Barnett at defensive tackle and Alan Cunningham at tight end.

With all of this youth there will be players to give the leadership necessary to the young squad. Tom Jones, a senior guard and Rusty Wrinkle, a junior tackle, will attempt to provide that leadership on the front line while two junior college transfers will try to strengthen the defensive backfield. Jon Maupin, a junior, and Mark Thorson, a senior, will be called upon to hold off the opposing receivers while Doug Ball, a junior juco transfer, will try to solidify the defensive line corps.

The Braves suffered four major losses, three of those four players from the defensive squad. Scott Grogan, an All-Conference, All-District 10, and honorable mention on the All-American team at linebacker, will be missing from the '77 version of the Braves. Achieving the same honors only at the offensive tackle position was Jack Taylor. Two other All-Conference selections, Lee Schmeer, a defensive back, and Joe Higgs, a defensive tackle, were also lost to graduation.

The Braves opened camp on August 21 in hopes of returning the winning tradition to OU. Ottawa squads have been crowned HAAC champions 10 times while compiling a 333-275-47 won-lost-tie record. In 1972 the Mineral Water Bowl Championship was added to the list of OU successes.

From the looks of early season workouts, the Braves could surprise quite a few people, and hopefully their opponents will be the most surprised of all.

### ABOUT THE COACH

In one season Don McLeary, head football coach at OU, turned a losing program into a winner. But what can you expect from a man whose list of successes is only surpassed by the winning attitude he displays on and off the field.

McLeary, a native of Humboldt, Tenn., who is married with three children, took the reigns of the OU football program in March of 1976 and the Braves quickly went from a sub .500 year to 5-4 and a top finish in the HAC. But his success did not start in 1976. McLeary was tabbed All-West Tennessee in 1964 and 1965, All-State, and All-American in 1965, at Jackson North High School. He then proceeded to the University of Tennessee in Knoxville where he played in three bowl games - the Cotton Bowl, 1969, Gator Bowl, 1969, and Sugar Bowl, 1971 in which he tied the Sugar Bowl record for most touchdowns in one game.

After receiving his B.S. degree majoring in Health and Physical Education in 1970 and an M.S. majoring in Educational Administration in 1973, McLeary began the climb up the college coaching ladder. Following a one year stint at his alma-mater, McLeary accepted the position of assistant coach at Morehead State University in June of 1973. McLeary remained there until his move to OU.

McLeary hopes to improve on last year's turnaround and OU fans can already see even brighter days around the corner. The program is off to a good start. The coach is a winner.

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


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## SOCCER

With the return of six lettermen and a minimum of two 'new' players, the Ottawa University Braves soccer team will have a good shot at bettering the 5-5 record of a year ago. The Braves will hope to improve on a season ending 2-1 victory over the Big Eight's Jayhawks of Kansas University. However more consistent scoring will be needed if the Braves hope to defeat Rockhurst College in the season opener. Rockhurst finished second in the nation in NAIA soccer last year and gave OU their first loss of the season - a 10-0 thrashing. During the 10-game season OU managed 13 goals, a little over a goal a game. OU was shutout four times and held to a single tally three times. Across the field, meanwhile, the opposition racked up 33 goals, 3.3 goals a game, being shutout three times.

Returning to the OU roster will be three, three-year lettermen, Mark McLoughlin, Danny Soman and Uchi Nwanzi. Joining them will be three, two-year lettermen, Jerry Osborne, a senior; Kelvin Reece, a junior and Bill Slade, a senior. Another letterman will be returning following a one-year lay off. Mike Custer, a sophomore, will return to attempt to help the OU offense. A new face in the Braves line-up might be AI Peterson, an AII-State goalie from the New York area. Ron Dear, in his 1st year as coach, hopes to be able to fill the squad with an aggressive type of play. A firm believer in conditioning, Dear has had his players running throughout the summer in hopes that OU will be ready for the Rockhurst Hawks on September 13.


