

# Fans Urge New Bleachers For **Football Games**

Several Ways Are Suggested to Provide Better Seating

Followers of the Ottawa University and Ottawa high school football teams have been inquiring recently about the possibility of erecting new permanent stands at Cook field to replace the pres-ent wooden stands. It has been suggested by several sources that the school board and university officials go together in sponsoring a WPA project for the erection of stands similar to the structure at

#### NO WPA PROJECT

Members of the schoolboard pointed out that, while the board would be receptive to such an idea, it would be impossible, as while thes the university is a private institu-tion and cannot sponsor a WPA project. One member of the board project. One member of the board said he believed permanent stands of some sort were badly needed at Cook field, but did not see how they could be obtained. He said even if the school poard would sponsor a WPA project alone, approval of such a project could not be obtained, as the field is located on private property. Neither the university nor the school board is able financially to undertake such a project without aid of some sort. It is estimated by Washburn-Stookey, local architects, that such a project which would seat about 1,000 persons would cost \$20,000.

#### FOREST PARK STADIUM?

Some have suggested that a civic stadium be built in Forest Park replacing the present grandstand, with the city, school board and university participating. It was also-pointed out that the city might sponsor such a project with WPA aid alone, as there has al-ready been much agitation for the city to replace the present old fair buildings with a new com-bined grandstand and exposition building.

#### 5-YEAR PLAN IDEA

Some grid fans have suggested Some grid fans have suggested that the university set up a "five-year plan" for construction of stands, using student labor as much as possible during the summer months and working on it as funds were available. Another party suggested that the high school and college schedule one game each a season during the 5-year program, from which net proceeds would go into the building fund.

#### OLD STANDS WORN OUT

Coach Dick Godlove of the university said he favored a project to build new stands at the field if to build new stands at the field if some means of financing it could be found. Godlove pointed out that the present wooden stands are about rotted out and will have to be replaced soon anyway, and if it is possible to work out a plan for construction of stone, brick or concrete stands it would be all the better.

Those who have been discussed.

Those who have been discussing the proposition have in mind ing the proposition have in mind stands along only the west side of the field, made of brick, stone or concrete which would seat a thousand or so persons, with a high enough slope that the fans could see over the heads of those in front. If the stands were built high enough it would be possible to put dressing rooms refresh to put dressing rooms, refresh-ment stands, rest rooms and recreational rooms under the stands.

## **Braves Defeat Swedes at Finish**

### O. U. Alone at Top of Conference

Lindsborg, Kas. (Special)—Ottawa University Braves bombarded the Bethany goal line for aled the Bethany goal line for almost four quarters, but so steadfast was the stalwart Bethany defense that not until midway of the fourth quarter could the Braves break through to score a touchdown and later win 7 to 2. The victory put the Braves in possession of first place in the Kan-

sas conference.

The game was filled with drama from the outset. No score developed until late when the big crowd which braved the chilly night had about given up. Then the Ottawans smashed through for the score. Even then the game was not over, for the Swedes came back with a daring attack via the air. They carried the ball down to the 15-yard line where they lost it air. They carried the ball down to the 15-yard line where they lost it on downs. A 15-yard penalty put the ball on the Ottawa 1-yard line. Quarterback Lyman Morgan elected to take a safety rather than kick out and give the Swedes a chance to pound away at the goal for a touchdown. The strategy, pulled with only 3½ minutes left in the game, was successful, for the Swedes never again were close enough to score.

The Swedes, penalties and fumbles kept the Ottawans away from the goal line, but on the play of the last quarter Ramsey returned a Bethany punt to the Swedes' 44-yard line and set up the scoring scene. Three times the hard driving Ottawa accomined the ball off tackle, once times the hard driving Ottawa ace carried the ball off tackle, once for 23 yards down to the 16-yard line. He took it to the 12 on the next play and then Fullback Walter Reames came through with five yards on two plays. Ramsey made it first down on the 4. Reames picked up two yards in smash plays. Then Ramsey went over for the touchdown, smashing through the middle of the Bethany line for the counter. George Von Arb's place-kick was good.

The game had its thrills and comedy. Shortly after the Ottawa touchdown, an Ottawa punt off

It was from that point, the Ottawa 36, that the Twedes went down to the 15. No game this season has been packed with as many thrills as was the battle which gave the Braves the battle which gave the Braves undisputed possession of first place. Bethany fans got the first results to cheer about. A 15-yard Ottawa penalty in the first minute of play put the Braves back on their heels. Thus far, the Presbies have had an off-and-on season; so the outcome probably depends on just how well the Emporia team is clicking.

The Braves came back with a good many bruises but no serious injuries from the rough-and-tumble game which they won Friday night, 7 to 2. The Octawa line deserves much of the credit for that victory. The Swedes lost more yardage than they gained trying to puncture the forward wall. They gained 34 and lost 45. Big Leonard Hofstra, playing his top game of the season, led the way for the linemen. Time after time the Lindsborg offense folded before it even got under way as the Ottawa line smashed in.

That toughness on the part of the Swedes plus a good many fumbles and penalties at the goal line kept the Braves out of the promised logical for three quarters. The Ottawa touchdown came as a result of hard driving on the part of Jack Ramsey and Walter Reames. It took that pair three tries to move the ball over from the 4-yard line.

That safety for the Swedes brought back memories of the Southwestern game played here in 1936. Ottawa was leading 3 to 0 with only a few seconds left in she game. It was fourth down for the Braves with the ball on the one or two-yard line. If they took a safety they could win the game, 3 to 2. But they chose to kick and the ball slithered off the toe of the punter and went out of bounds on about the 10-yard line. There

They passed a neat flip over center for the touchdown which gave them a 7 to 3 triumph. A similar situation existed at Bethany last Friday. 
