THE PROVINCIAL ORGANIZATION PROVES ITSELF

That the provincial organization perfected at the last national convention is meeting a real demand is indicated by the plans for provincial conventions appearing on the following pages. Most of the provinces are planning to hold conventions. It is encouraging to note that those provinces which have held conventions in the past are the ones going ahead most definitely. The provinces which have not had the experience of such a convention are the only ones who are proceeding uncertainly. This is evidence enough that the provincial meetings have proved themselves.

A provincial convention is something that cannot be forced on the chapters by any outside agency. It must come from a demand of the institution involved. If it offers them a means of improving their forensic program and generates more interest, it is worth while. That it does this is indicated by the fact that the institutions most progressive forensically are the ones most enthusiastic about it. All those institutions in which student interest is at a low ebb, would do well to get in contact with these conventions. This is one place where the strong can help the weak without sacrificing any of their strength.

The provincial governors and their associated officers are doing good work in pushing these conventions and the contests which will be associated with them. Every chapter should maintain close contact with the provincial organization and give its officers hearty cooperation.

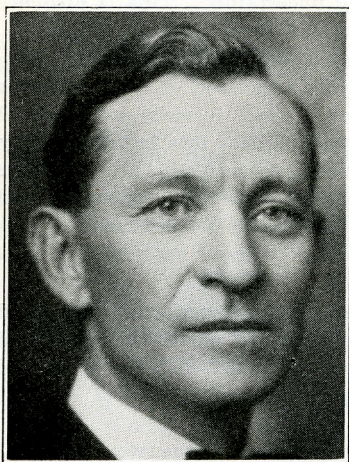

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Kansas Province Will Meet at Ottawa, the Home of the First Chapter

The Kansas Pi Kappa Delta Provincial Convention will be held in Ottawa, Kansas, March 31 and April 1. Contests in debate, oratory, and extemporaneous speaking for both men and women will be held. Each college

will be permitted to enter as many debate teams as it cares to, but no college may enter more than one contestant in the oratorical and extemporaneous contests. In other respects the rules for the contests will be the same as obtained at the National Tournament at Estes Park. Expert judges will be secured for all contests. Single judges will be used for all preliminaries and three judges for the finals. Each school has been assessed seven dollars and fifty cents to provide the money to pay expenses. Fees may also be charged for entering the various events. It is probable that medals will be given to the individuals who are victorious in the events and cups will be given to the schools which they represent.

In addition to the forensic contests the committee is planning for a banquet and one or two sessions at which speakers

of note will address the convention on subjects of interest to the convention. It is hoped we may have at least one of the national officers in attendance as the guest of honor. From present indications every chapter in the province will be well represented in all the contests. The province has invited the colleges of the state who do not have chapters to send contestants to the tournament. Three have already accepted our invitation. The executive committee, which consists of R. H. Ritchie, Ottawa University, local chairman of arrangements; Martin Holcomb, Bethany, secretary of the province; and J. H. Lawrence, College of Emporia, governor of the province, has had one meeting and has arranged a later meeting on January 8 to prepare the

program and make other preparations. The outlook at present for an enthusiastic and profitable convention is excellent.

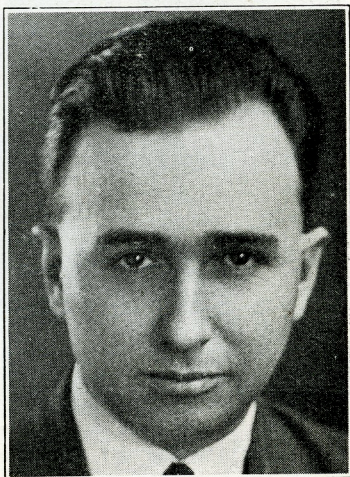
Province Two Will Meet at Home of Second Chapter

This Province was first organized in the early months of 1923. Among those most prominent in the work of organizing the Province may be mentioned Professor Summers, at that time at Park College, and Professors McCluer and Reeves of Westminster College.

The first Province Convention was held in April, 1923, with Westminster College as host. The second Province Convention was held in April, 1925, at Canton, with Culver-Stockton College as host. A very fine convention was enjoyed by all those present and we are all looking forward to a still greater convention next spring. The third biennial convention of the Province of the Missouri will be held at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, March 24, 25, and 26, 1927, with Iowa Wesleyan College as host. At that convention will be held a debate tournament for men, oratorical contest for men, extemporaneous speaking contest for men, oratorical contest for women, extemporaneous speaking contest for women and possibly a debate tournament for state forensic organizations of Kansas,

Missouri, Iowa and Illinois voted to use as the question for men's debate this year "Resolved, That federal legislation embodying the principles of the McNary-Haugen Bill should be enacted." In view of this fact the chapters of this Province voted ten to one with two chapters not voting, to use the above question at the Province Convention instead of the Prohibition Question. The debate tournament for women will be held, if a sufficient number of colleges will pledge themselves to send teams. At the last two conventions such a contest has not been held, due to lack of demand.

Forensic interest seems to me to be more alive in this section of the country than at any time for some years past. A convention was held at Kansas City, November 9 and 10. At that meeting practically all of the senior colleges of the state had representatives, including a few which have had little or no forensic work in recent years. As governor of the province, I wish to express my appreciation to President Westfall for the \$50.00 appropriation recently made for the Province Convention. In the past the only source of funds has been by direct assessment on the chapters. I believe

the provincial organization can do a great deal for the furthering of forensic interest and I am sure we are looking forward to a great time at Mt. Pleasant next March.

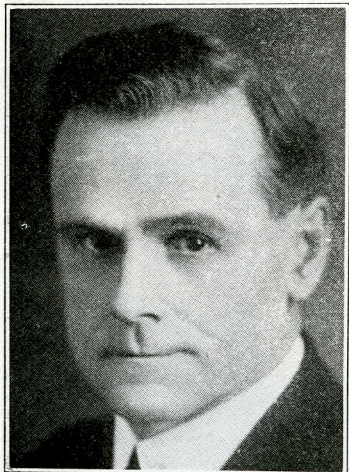

Nebraska-Colorado Province Will Meet at Hastings

The province of the Platte will hold its convention at Hastings College, Nebraska Delta, March 24, 25 and 26. Attendance from all the Nebraska and Colorado chapters is anticipated.

There will be a men's and women's debating tournament. The McNary-Haugen Bill will be the subject for discussion in both. Present day intolerance will be the general subject used by the men, and women's rights the subject for the women's extemporaneous speaking contests. There will also be the oratorical contests.

The province will be financed by the fifty-dollar appropriation from the national council and the registration and entrance fees. Each debate team will

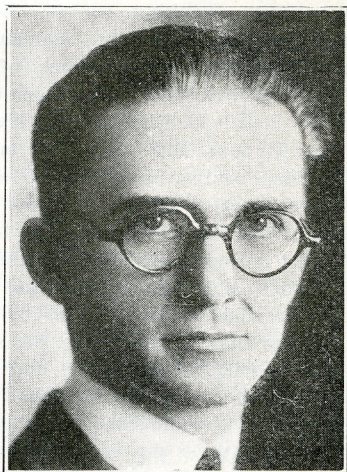
be charged \$5 as an entrance fee, each orator \$3, and each extempore speaker \$2.

Three Former Presidents Will Attend California Convention

The position of the Pacific Province is, perhaps, a peculiar one. All of the chapters, with the exception of that of the College of the Pacific, at Stockton, are associated in the Southern California Forensic Association. Each chapter, with that one exception, meets each other chapter in debate, oratory and extempore contests for both men and women, in the regular annual schedule of the Association. The regular meetings of the Association bring together the Pi Kappa Delta leaders of the province, so that the work of the province is largely merged with that of the association, and a strong provincial organization has not been deemed so essential as in other sections.

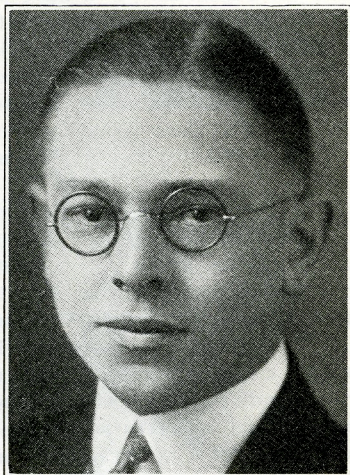
There is a growing feeling among the members of the province, however, that, while our own forensic relations might be carried on quite satisfactorily without an active provincial organization the strength of the national order is coming to depend, to an ever-increasing degree, upon the work of the provinces. So large has become the order, that the national conventions are becoming unwieldy. So great a part of the time of the national conventions must be given over to the various contests, that the important function of stressing and perpetuating the ideals of the order must largely be performed in the smaller provincial conventions—where, in any case, it can be more satisfactorily performed, since a larger portion of the members can be present. It is becoming apparent also, that, in the not distant future, the provincial conventions must assume the duty of choosing a limited number of entrants for the national contests. Realizing these things, the Pacific Province is planning to enlarge its activities and strengthen its organization.

Our convention this year is to be held at Los Angeles, where we shall be the guests of the California Epsilon chapter at the University of California, Southern Branch. The date has been set at April first and second, and efforts are being made to secure the attendance of every member of every chapter.

The convention program will be divided into two parts, the first having to do with the organization and business of the Province, and the second with the provincial contests.

The business sessions will be given over chiefly to an open discussion of four important topics:

1. The Ideals of Pi Kappa Delta, and the work of the individual in their perpetuation.

2. The Provincial organization—what it can do for the member chapters.
3. The Province—what it can do for the National Order.
4. Inter-Provincial relations.

We shall be in a favored position, in discussing these matters, in that the first three National Presidents and the incumbent First Vice-President will be in attendance. I have asked Dr. MacArthur to lead the discussion of the first topic, Prof. Marsh of the second, Prof. Nichols of the third, and Prof. Veatch of the fourth. Student opinion, however, is to be chiefly sought. It is hoped that time may also be available for a discussion of such problems as that of judging, which cannot be sufficiently discussed at the National Conventions. Any valuable conclusions of the Convention on these matters will be forwarded to the National President for the benefit of other provinces.

The second object of the convention will be the holding of contests for both men and women, in debate, oratory and extempore speaking. While the list of entries is not yet complete, it is expected that each chapter will be represented in every event for which it is eligible. The convention will probably provide for perpetual trophies for each event.

Miss Virginia V. Shaw, President of the California Epsilon chapter, will act as convention officer, and, under her able leadership, the material arrangements for the meeting cannot fail to be efficiently managed. The place chosen for the convention is ideal, a large representation is already assured, and much work of permanent value should be accomplished.

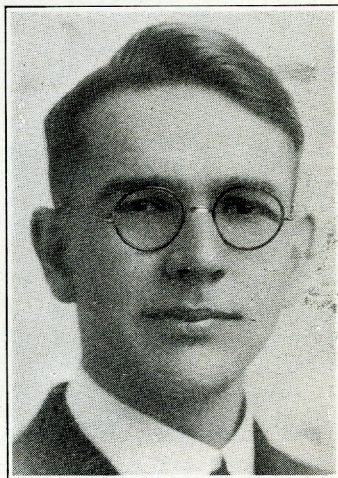

Distinguished Speaker Will Attend the Dakota Convention

The province of the Sioux extends greetings to all the other provinces of Pi Kappa Delta with the hope that this may prove the most successful and profitable year of our history. This is the year for the Regional Conventions. None of us will be able to duplicate the enjoyable times we had at Greeley, Fort Collins and Estes. Still there are some things that we may do at our regional meetings which will be of profit to all who participate. Each province should make a strong effort to hold such a convention this year. The Province of the Sioux was among the first to have a provincial gathering. In 1921 the chapters of the state gathered at the Northern Normal and Industrial School at Aberdeen and held the first meeting. It proved a great success and paved the way for the second meeting two years later at Dakota Wesleyan University. This year we are looking forward to another profitable time together. In order to make it the most profitable to the student representatives I feel that time should be given them to discuss problems of mutual interest. We are trying to allow time for Round Table discussions in which students and coaches may participate. It is also our purpose to have some leader in the field of public speaking and debate with us at that time. An invitation has been sent to Dr. Charles Woolbert to give us an address and to judge during the final debates. We hope he can be present.

The Convention will be held during the second week of April unless there is serious objection. The place has not been determined but the meeting will not go by default because Wesleyan will be glad to entertain the group if no other chapter can find it convenient. The regular events of oratory, extempore speaking and debate will be included in the program. There should be time for a business session and the Round Table discussions as well as the address by our guest. The extemporaneous debate staged with only twenty-four hours of preparation proved an interesting feature of the last meeting. Possibly it can also be included. We want a full program from the banquet hour on Wednesday evening until the final debate Saturday morning.

There are certain problems that will inevitably arise in these regional gatherings which should be discussed. An exchange of ideas may prove

We are six chapters strong: Oklahoma A. and M. at Stillwater, Oklahoma College for Women at Chickasha, North-Western State Teachers College at Alva, Tulsa University at Tulsa, Oklahoma City University at Oklahoma City, and Oklahoma Baptist University at Shawnee. To this number we have added at its own request the chapter at Kansas State Teachers College of Pittsburg, Kansas. These chapters present a province

membership of about fifty. At the convention in the spring we are hoping to perfect a more closely-knit organization so that province headquarters may keep in touch with forensic activities within each chapter. It would seem that too often our chapters throughout the nation remain practically quiescent throughout a larger part of the year, except perhaps during the debating season, or when quickened into life by the approach of a state or national convention. Much may be done by the individual chapter on its own campus to advertise Pi Kappa Delta and the emphasis which it places on oratory and debate in the college program. In this direction we are to direct our efforts.

Our spring convention is to be held in Pittsburg, Kansas, the home of our new chapter, probably the last week in March. Our sister chapters of the Kansas province will be asked to attend and participate in the contests of that meet—debates and oratorical and extempore speaking, all for both men and women.

Certain denominational colleges in our state have found the National Prohibition question somewhat embarrassing to debate as arousing criticism among the school's constituency. Thus it seems necessary to make a change. Plans are under way to use but one debate question for both men and women at the spring meet, probably the McNary-Haugen question.

Professor Pelsma of Pittsburg will be a most energetic and satisfying host to the Oklahoma Province judging by the plans and suggestions in his

letters as to ways in which we may most efficiently carry out a complete program with maximum pleasure and profit and minimum personal and chapter expense.

In closing, may I seize this opportunity of sending my warmest and most fraternal greetings of the season to all the National officers wherever they may be, to all the provinces of our great order and to all the many fine men and women I met last spring up on the Great Divide.

profitable for all the schools concerned. Has anyone found a satisfactory method of judging? To hire expert judges makes the cost of the convention prohibitive. We used the coach judge system last time. It seems that that might be used for the preliminary debates with expert judges for the finals. If anyone has found a better plan, pass the good word along.

Would this suggestion prove acceptable? Might it not be possible to stage some of our debates in nearby high schools? There is a growing interest in debate among the high schools of our state. Such a plan might help to stimulate that interest. There could be an audience decision and an expert decision if desired. Another problem that will become increasingly evident has to do with the entertainment of the delegates. It seems to be considered the proper thing that the entertaining school furnish rooms for the visitors. The idea is a fine one but it will keep many schools from acting as hosts. I would favor the plan used at the National Convention. Let each school stand the expense of its delegates. If this idea becomes prevalent it will make it possible for the smallest school of the province to entertain without serious financial difficulty.

I am sure that we have all welcomed the little volume put out by our organization containing the winning debates. The plan should continue and may prove as valuable as the debates printed in the University Debaters' Annual. May I venture another suggestion. Might it not be worth while to send to our National President some of the papers or addresses given at the Provincial Conventions? He can use them or not at his discretion. They might find a place in the FORENSIC. Possibly in time out of the bushels of chaff there might be salvaged a few grains of wheat which would make possible a similar book from the Provincial meetings.

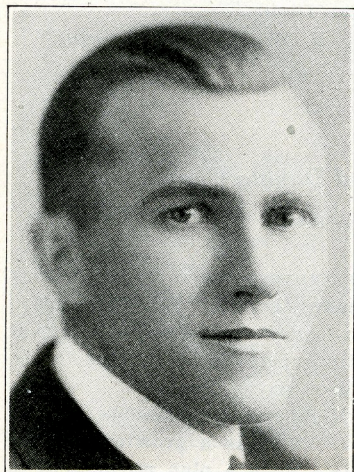

Upper Mississippi to Convene at St. Paul

The Province of the Upper Mississippi has been somewhat slow in completing its organization and formulating its plans.

It is a matter of regret to the chapters in the Province that so capable an executive as Professor Menchhoffer should be lost to them during this important period of organization.

Basing our judgment upon information so far received from the various chapters, it does not seem wise for us to conduct a miniature national convention and tournament this year. The majority of our chapter members already meet in debate and oratory. Moreover, the Minnesota chapters and Iowa chapters are not using the same debate question. This fact alone places something of an obstacle in the way of conducting a debate tournament.

In fact, after considering all of the circumstances, it seems wisest for us to hold a one-day session, terminating in a banquet. This will serve to bring together representatives from all the chapters and thus promote a better understanding among the colleges and universities of the Province.

Our plan at present calls for extemporaneous contests for both men and women.

On account of inequality of distance between the college homes of the various college chapters and the convention point, it seems best to pro-rate the convention expense and the traveling expenses of three delegates from each chapter. This will provide for a faculty representative and a speaker for each of the extemporaneous contests. We hope that a large number of additional delegates will be present from each chapter.

The following, somewhat detailed, statement of our tentative program was drawn up by our Provincial Secretary, Mr. Evan E. Anderson, and myself. If circumstances justify it, we may enlarge this program considerably.

Subjects for extemporaneous contest will be decided by a general referendum and announced February 1, 1927. The divisions of the general subject will be made by the officers of the Province and announced March 1.

The expenses of three representatives from each chapter will be pooled together with other convention expenses. After applying the National Office subvention of fifty dollars to these expenses, the eight chapters will be assessed an amount sufficient to cover the balance. Each chapter shall be assessed an equal amount.

Any chapter may be represented by more than three delegates, but such extra expenses shall be paid by the local chapter.

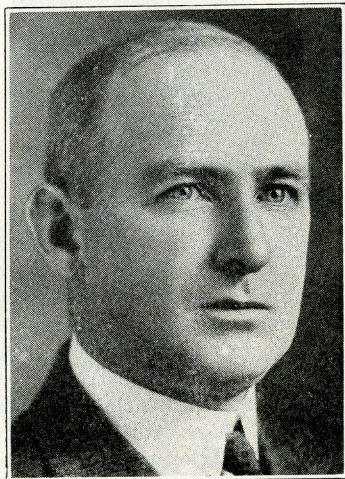

Province of the Lakes Will Assemble at East Lansing

The Province of the Lakes will hold this year a provincial contest at East Lansing, with Michigan State college entertaining the convention. It is planned that a two-day program be arranged during which time there will be competition in debate, oratory and extempore speaking, both for men and for women. It is impossible at this time accurately to forecast the program, as replies to a questionnaire on the matter have been received from only a few chapters. It is hoped, however, that a wide participation will result. It is certain now that all the Michigan chapters will compete, as will all Ohio chapters with the possible exception of Akron, Colby will be represented, while the Connecticut Aggies have not yet determined whether they can meet the financial requirements of both this convention and that of '28.

Michigan State College is located on a beautiful campus two miles from the Michigan State Capital. It is an exquisite and ideal place for the program.

The governor of the province visited



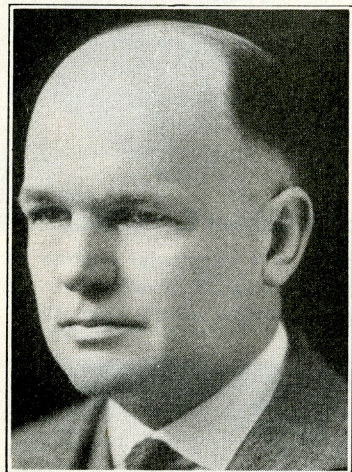

Connecticut Agricultural College last year and so far this year has visited most of the Michigan chapters. He finds that almost without exception they are in a fine vigorous condition and are a credit to Pi Kappa Delta. Further details of the provincial contest will be largely in the hands of Carl Nelson of Olivet, the secretary of the province, in co-operation with the Lansing chapter of Pi Kappa Delta.

Southern Colleges Will Convene in the Blue Ridge Mountains

Province 11, known among its members as the South Atlantic Province of Pi Kappa Delta, includes only five chapters. It is one of the smallest in the national organization, but it holds a strategic position as an entering wedge into the territory of the Old South; and as one of the provinces touching the Atlantic Ocean, it helps to justify the claim that Pi Kappa Delta is, indeed, a national fraternity, extending from coast to coast.

The prospect for immediate growth of the province is not particularly bright because of the fact that two other honorary forensic fraternities originated in the South and established chapters in a large number of the more substantial and more prominent colleges and universities in the region before Pi Kappa Delta entered the field at all. However, one feature of the progress of "The Advancing South" (to allude to the title of a noteworthy book by Professor Mims, of Vanderbilt University, published last spring) is the rapid establishment and growth of many new institutions of higher learning. Some of these will soon be

good fields for Pi Kappa Delta influence and activity. In fact, just as it would have been the height of folly to bet against the development of the West two or three generations ago, so would it be absurd today to predict anything but prosperity and growth for the states of the former Confederacy. Even normal expansion in the South for the next generation will be remarkable expansion, and it is certain that Province 11 of Pi Kappa Delta will share in that upward trend.

The first provincial convention will be held at Spartanburg, South Carolina, on either April 1 and 2, or 8 and 9. Very appropriately, the convention delegates will be the guests of the oldest chapter in the province—South Carolina Alpha, of Wofford College. Spartanburg, located in the extreme northwest corner of the Palmetto state on the line of the Alleghany, or Blue Ridge Mountains, will make an ideal convention city during the early

spring season. It is expected that every member chapter will have several delegates present at the meeting.

The convention activities, in addition to the business session, will consist of an oratorical contest and a province championship debate. Each member chapter will have a speaker in the oratorical contest. As a preliminary to the debate, the two chapters of North Carolina will meet in a single contest some time during the winter, the winner to represent North Carolina. Similarly, the three chapters of South Carolina will hold a triangular contest for the purpose of designating the South Carolina winner. The two winners will meet in the final contest at the convention. The official Pi Kappa Delta question will be debated, and undoubtedly, in view of its nature, reference will be made to that classic utterance of the Governor of North Carolina to the Governor of South Carolina—"It's a long time between drinks!"

It has been arranged that each member chapter shall send to the convention a faculty representative who is capable of judging public speaking contests. These men will be used as the judges of the convention contests. In the oratorical clash each faculty representative will rank all speakers except the one from his home chapter. In the debate the faculty members of the three non-participating chapters will constitute the committee of judges.

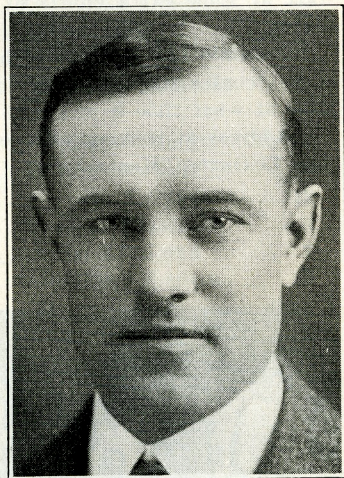

Tennessee-Kentucky Plans Under Way

District Number Thirteen, composed of only seven chapters representing three states, is having some difficulties in making the province convention a reality. There are two chapters in Tennessee and one in Indiana with the remaining four in the heart of Kentucky.

The four chapters in Kentucky have for some years had an association of their own which has amounted to a Kentucky convention of Pi Kappa

Delta. These colleges have each year debated the national question among themselves and have also scheduled debates with other institutions in this and other states.

There was objection to the present question from one of the colleges this year. The faculty felt that it was unwilling to have a team from its institution advocating any change in the Volstead Act. Therefore, the other three colleges consented to a change of subject. The question which will be debated by these colleges in their association debates will be that of the Mellon-Berenger Debt Settlement. This does not mean that all of these colleges will not debate the national question. Transylvania College and perhaps others will put a team in the field on that question. As for the plans of the other colleges in the province I cannot at this time speak.

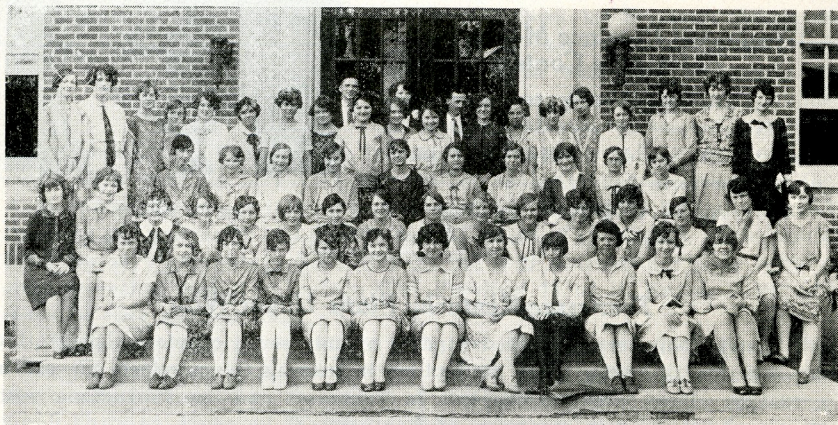
We shall attempt a gathering of the representatives of the province chapters sometime in the spring. If at all feasible we shall have debates and oratorical contests at that time.
