This Thinksheet is to make available for your use something precious I've used for many years—precious to me both because of its spiritual and literary loft—iness and because written by one with whom I have long felt deep kinship and intimacy, my friend Rabbi Chaim Stern. It's from pp.4f of his GATES OF PRAYER (KTAV/70), "Services for the High Holy Days," crafted to be "meaningful to young people...with a directness of language and freshness of expression."... Except for the first two strophes ("All Reading" quatrains), which are from Christina Rossetti (as noted on p.104), the composition—including the responsory form—is by Rabbi Stern....The God/wind analogy is biblical, in Hebrew & Greek (& Latin).
