MONTANA STATE COLLEGE

MSC debaters have been busily engaged this fall in the activities that debaters are supposed to excel in — namely, researching and debating! This activity has been carried on with a considerable degree of success, according to Debate Coach L. A. Lawrence.

The MSC Squad has competed in five tournaments so far this year and has won 14 major trophies. MSC debaters Laury Eck and Gerry Neely won the debate championship at the Yellowstone Valley Tourney, the Gem State Jamboree, and tied for first with the MSC team of Jim Goetz and Lee Myers in the Treasure State Tourney. Neely won first in Lincoln-Douglas at the Yellowstone Valley, the Heart O' The Continent, and tied for first with teammate Eck in the Treasure State.

The squad looks forward to a busy schedule during the rest of the year. In the near future MSC holds the Founder's Day Oratory Contest at home and then the debaters take to the road for the Desert Tournament in Tucson, Arizona; the West Point Elimination at Forest Grove, Oregon; the Tournament of Champions at McMinnville, Oregon;

the Pi Kap Province which will once again be held on a Montana Dude Ranch, and the Montana State Intercollegiate Tournament in Great Falls, Montana.

LINFIELD COLLEGE

Out of happy Roy D. Mahaffey have effervesced many provocative ideas. The Alpha chapter at Linfield College at McMinnville, Oregon initiated an Alumni Critique Tournament this fall. Eight Linfield alumni who are now high school speech coaches brought their students to participate in three rounds of debate and one round each of individual events which included extemp., oratory, impromptu, and interpretive reading. Members of the speech squad served as critics. This should become an annual event providing additional tournament experience early in the year.

Before the close of the semester the chapter sponsored an intramural extemporaneous and impromptu speaking contest for those students enrolled in the Speech Fundamentals classes. One preliminary and one final round was held in each event. Cash prizes were awarded to the winners.

MIDLAND COLLEGE

Tournament "firsts" have been the specialty for Midland College debaters in early season forensics. On two occasions Midland has fielded the top rated discussant, twice the highest rated extemporaneous speaker and once the top rated original orator. Two first-place debate trophies are the most recent additions to the Nebraska Kappan trophy case.

Diane Buehler and Carol Hessel-flow, currently holding a win record of 87%, are responsible for both debate trophies. Ready to give all novice debate teams a good race are two successful first-year teams from Nebraska Kappa.

WEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Two future British lawyers from England's famed Cambridge University visited the West Texas State University campus December 11 to meet the WTSU team in debate. The match was held in

the Branding Iron Theater and was open to the public with 250 attending.

State Senator Grady Hazelwood was the chairman of the debate between Cambridge members Michael Howard and John K. Toulmin and WTSU's Mary Lemmond and Wynette Johnson.

West Texas State University was one of four Texas Universities chosen to debate by the British duo.

A high school workshop preceded the featured debate, with the workshop highlighted by the discussion on this year's debate question, "Resolved: That Social Security Benefits should be extended to include complete medical care."

According to Gene Lewis, Forensic Director, "The debate was received so warmly and enthusiastically by both students and area residents that we feel that debates of this sort are beneficial to both our university and community."

Debaters for Cambridge University, which annually sends a team on tour of the United States, chose Howard and Toulmin. Both list their intended career as "Barrister."

Both are members of the Cambridge Union Society, College Debating Society and Cambridge University Conservation Association. Howard is a college football veteran, which is rugby to the English. Toulmin is a member of the University Law Society and the Joint Action Group for Understanding Among Races.

A new policy is now in progress in the WT forensic department under the supervision of Dr. Crannell Tolliver, head of the WTSU speech department. This policy is an invitational challenge to all college or Universities in or around this area or perhaps just passing through, to a **public debate**.

OTTERBEIN COLLEGE

The Ohio Epsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta at Otterbein College, Westerville, Ohio, sponsored the annual Otterbein Holiday Debate Tournament on the campus Saturday, December 14, 1963. According to Dr. James Grissinger, Chairman of the Speech Department, the tournament was the largest

in recent years, registering twenty colleges and universities from Kentucky, West Virginia, Michigan, and Ohio. Those colleges represented with one affirmative team and one negative team were: College of Wooster, Akron University, Wayne State University, University of Dayton, Heidelberg College, Capital University, Wittenberg University, Miami University, University of Cincinnati, Bowling Green University, Youngstown University, Western Reserve University, Muskingum College, Georgetown College, Marietta College, Ohio State University, Denison University, Findlay College, Toledo University, and Otterbein College.

The First Place trophy went to the debaters from Marietta College who totaled six wins and no losses. Miami University copped the Second Place trophy with five wins and one loss. Third place was awarded to Muskingum College and fourth place to Capital University. Certificates of merit were also awarded to the best affirmative teams, from Capital University and Ohio State University and the best negative team, from Muskingum College, all accumulating three wins and no losses.

Miss Mary Hall, President of the Ohio Epsilon Chapter, and new Pi Kappa member, Miss Betty Powers, served as Hospitality Chairmen at the Coffee Hour in the morning and the reception in the afternoon. Mrs. Sandra Williams Bennett served as Student Director of the Tournament. Dr. Lynn W. Turner, President of Otterbein College, awarded the trophies and certificates to the winning debaters.

HARDIN-SIMMONS UNIVERSITY

The Texas Theta chapter of Pi Kappa Delta of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene hosted the second annual Abilene Novice Intercollegiate Debate Tournament on November 16, 1963. Twenty-five debate teams, including some sixty students from eight colleges within three hours drive of the college, participated in the Tournament. Schools in attendance were: Texas Tech, McMurry College, San Angelo College, Odessa College, Howard County Junior

College, Abilene Christian College, Midwestern University, and Hardin-Simmons University. All activities of this Tournament were held on a single day. Four preliminary rounds of debate were held during the morning and early afternoon on Saturday; and late in the afternoon, eight teams were selected to go into the elimination rounds. Texas Tech had two teams going into the final rounds; San Angelo College, one; Odessa College, two; Abilene Christian College, one; Hardin-Simmons University, one; and Midwestern University, one. The two Texas Tech teams, consisting of Pat Bailey, Johnette McIlwayne, Ava Robbins, and Kay Haldy closed out the Tournament by winning both rounds of the semi-finals and both team trophies. Tina Van Horn of Odessa College won top speaker trophy in the preliminary rounds.

In that regular collegiate competition in this area is rather rugged, novice contestants, particularly those who have not participated in high school, find the going a bit rough in their early tournaments. Thus, this Tournament was planned for novice participants, seeking to provide a learning opportunity for beginning debaters in a competitive contest. It was planned so that there would be a minimum amount of expense and at a time of the season when beginning debaters could be reasonably expected to be ready for competition. Most of the teams going through this novice tournament have found the going a good bit easier in the regular tournaments as a result of the reasonably happy educational experience with debate in a tournament of novice caliber.

An additional advantage of this sort of tournament provides opportunities for experienced debaters to serve as judges in that this is a regulation of the tournament. Experienced debaters profess and appear to learn a great deal about their own debating by listening to a debate from the judge's viewpoint. This sort of tournament has proved of real value in this area and, by common consent, will be a permanent type of tournament in this area, rotating from

one college to another. The tournament will continue to be held on the third weekend in November, with the exact place to be announced later.

MISSISSIPPI COLLEGE

The Mississippi Epsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta at Mississippi College at Clinton has doubled its membership this year. Ten new members were tapped. These are the people who have qualified for membership this year. The PKD Chapter at Miss. College now has as study room in the fine arts building. This room is used only by PKD members for research and filing of debate materials. Each member is provided a private file and bookshelf.

The sponsors of the Pi Kappa Delta chapter at Mississippi College are professor and Mrs. H. B. Todd, both of the speech faculty. New officers for 1963-64 are president, James Westbrook, vice-president, Skeet Osborne, secretary-treasurer, Miss Judy Smith, reporter, Miss Carol Haley.

MACALESTER COLLEGE

Macalester is a member of the St. Paul-Minneapolis Twin City League. The debate squad under the direction of debate coach Prof., Roger Mosvick numbers forty-four active debaters. Macalester College along with the University of Minnesota, will inaugurate a series of TV debates as part of the NBC regional debate series.

CENTRAL MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY

Central's chapter assisted in running the annual high school top teams debate tournament in December. Nine schools from all geographical areas of Michigan come together to test their strength and compete for certificates.

A large group crowded the home of advisor Dr. Gilbert Rau as chapter President Douglas Sasse initiated sixteen new members into PKD. Speaker for the evening was Mr. Loren Gray, a prominent area lawyer and former Central debater.

In Interpretation, Carolyn Clark, Karen Comstock and Cheryl O'Malley received excellent ratings while Linda Scrimshire rated superior. Sharon Kerrihard rated good in After Dinner Speaking and Cindy Fairburn received a superior rating in Radio Speaking.

Since we have such a good start we are looking forward to a full schedule of participation in future meets.

MARSHALL UNIVERSITY

West Virginia Beta at Marshall is planning an invitational meet for April which will provide opportunities for a fresh approach to the year's well-worn proposition: audience-decision debating before high school audiences; a "What I Believe" truth session in which debaters individually express their personal views on the issues; and an after-dinner session of debate on some variations of the proposition; E.g.: Resolved, that our higher education, guaranteed by the Federal Government or not, is

no opportunity for qualified high school graduates; or: Resolved, that high school should guarantee to the Federal Government that their graduates are qualified for higher education; or: Resolved, that qualified high school graduates should guarantee the Federal Government that their higher education will be an opportunity. The theory is that after X-teen more rounds of grinding those stock issues into chaff, these propositions may look eminently sane and reasonable.

HOPE COLLEGE

The Debate squad and Forensics group have been very busy this fall with some activity every week and starting with the DeKalb Debate Tourney in November. They also attended tourneys at Goshen College, Bradley University, Western Michigan, Chicago Navy Pier. Hope College hosted the State Extempore Contest in early December.
