

"The Lord said, 'What is that in your hand?'" Exodus 4:2

One of the great and moving stories of the Holy Scriptures is the account of the God of Abraham, Jacob and Issac laying His claim on a simple shepherd whose name was Moses. This is the great story of how God used a man to deliver a captive people. And incidentally, the story was written long before Cecile B. Damille came along. One sees in this scriptural account God's concern for men who lie in bondage and who suffer under oppression. But one also sees how God uses the simple things and unknown lives to accomplish His purpose.

First of all then, I should like to say that God can appear to any of us at the most unexpected times. He came to Moses while he watched the sheep of his father-in-law. Undoubtedly he was meditating about his people and their cry for deliverance. To some of us God comes in the stage exing glory of this world He has made. Think of testimony of Major David G. timous who more than 100,000 feet over the earth recorded:

"As I sat there in the capsule, my thoughts were interrupted by the most startling, most arresting sight I have ever seen and the one impression of my flight I will carry with me longer than any other: sunset through the pristine clarity of the edge of space. It is difficult to communicate its full beauty. Above the distant clouds a thin, reddish, salmon-pink band of atmosphere glowed as the sun edged below the earth's horizon. The salmon glow was crowned by a strip of blue. The color was light and yet intense, as if someone had lifted a veil from an ordinary blue sky to diffuse it. Above, surprisingly, the stars were shinning brightly."

To some of us God makes Himself known in a great love or an abiding friendship.

While to others of us there is a sense of His mearness in tragedy, in death or in great sorrow. But many, many times we know God is near when we become sensitive to

the great needs of our world. One of the great stories of American history is that of a young ungainly and homely lad who felt the sorrow of injustice when he saw slaves being sold like cattle. It was Abraham Lincoln who later was used of God to free the black man. When we meet God, this is the most unique transforming experience of all life. We always take off our shoes for we are on holy ground.

Secondly, all of us should understand God shows His concern and compassion for men who are in great need. The God of the people and of our Christian tradition is a God removed from the suffering of men but is One who weeps over the burdens that men carry because of their folly and wickedness. Surely this is the meaning of the Cross. Not a one of you in this class should be able to go out into the rough and tumble of twentieth century life without feeling the oppression, the upheaval and the revolution of our time. We are surrounded by multitudes who cry for justice and who long for deliverance. To refuse to hear this cry is to be a traitor.

Think of the great needs in bamas relations. Non are longing for peace and yet we prepare for war. Or there is the terrifying problem of the juvanile who has declared war on society. We call him the delimquent. Or there is that vast area of racial hostility which must be resolved in our time.

Furthermore, there is the creat inner need of people who find they are enslaved to themselves by passions and appetites which they cannot control.

So finally we come to the gaestion, "What is that in your hand?" If you have spent four years at Emporia State without becoming aware of the capacities of your own life, then these have been years of failure. Surely, one should have discovered what his abilities are and then have prepared himself to use these abilities to lift our age nearer to God.

In the slums of Japan there is a little man whose name is Toyohiko Kagawa. He's is a man of great ability and sensitivity. This man chose deliberately and voluntarily to work among the prostitutes and outcasts, the thieves and the oppressed of the great industrial areas of Japan. One of his moving and simple poems reads as follows:

"I cannot invent
New things,
Like the airships
Which sail
On silver wings;
But today
A wonderful thought
In the dawn was given,
And the stripes on my robe,
Shining from war,
Were suddenly fair,
Bright with a light
Falling from Heaven—
Gold, and silver, and bronze
Lights from the windows of Heaven.

And the thought
Was this:
That a secret plan
Is hid in my hand;
That my hand is big,
Big,
Because of this plan.

That God,
Who dwells in my hand,
Knows this secret plan
Of the things He will do for the world
Using my hand!"

What is that in your hand?

BETWEEN YOU AND ME



"Cincinnati seems like home. We visited here often when we were in Lawrenceburg, Ind., which is only 25 miles away. Judith was born in Christ's Hospital here and all our sick folks from the church were hospitalized in one of the hospitals here.

I preached this morning (June 15) in my first church at Lawrenceburg which was a very enjoyable occasion. This is the first time in many years that I have not responded to an invitation to preach as arranged by the convention committee. The folks at Lawrenceburg heard that I was here and drafted me to preach.

Attending conventions is really hard work. The auditorium is eight miles from the downtown hotel area. This adds to the

strenuous hours of a convention experience. The headquarters issue has consumed much time and has now been carried over until Monday (June 16). We have rejected New York, Chicago, and Valley Forge. Where we go from here is a good guess. New York was rejected by a two to one vote and Chicago and Valley Forge were lost by lack of a 55% majority vote (the convention adopted 55% as the necessary majority). Democracy is really at work.

Good reports have reached me concerning the Vacation Church School and the beginning of our summer youth program. We are very much in prayer about all these things. This should be our best summer. It will be what we make it.

We are looking forward to our return for next Sunday. Already we are anxious to be back and about our work with you. See you Sunday!



IN APPRECIATION

I feel deeply honored to be asked to write these words in loving memory of Dr. Everett Quinton. The greatest tribute to his life is the way every friend and admirer in this city has been sincerely setting heart and mind and hand to a more serious service of our common Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, as a living memorial and expression of thanks to God for the lasting gift of so gracious a life among us. His was a most gracious life and the true joy of a Christian was in him.

Here I should like to share the words of my associate, Rodney Gist, taken from a radio

talk he made just after he had heard of Everett's rebirth into the spirit:

"All of us ministers of Sioux Falls grew to love and appreciate Dr. Quinton when he was president of he Ministerial Association last year. His spirit certainly went beyond the narrow confines of denominationalism. And he had a mature sense of humor. We all looked forward to the next meeting to see what new bit or humor he would bring to share.

"I recall the last meeting of this year. He had just passed out bouquets to those who had helped carry out the program during the year. Then someone stood up and gave him the praise he so richly deserved. This was too good an opportunity to miss. I stood and said, 'Surely I agree that Dr. Quinton has done a superb job, and as a Methodist, I hope that through all this summer a generous "sprinkling" of good things shall be his:

"Dr Quinton, always equal to an occasion replied, "Thank you, brother Gist, and may you

likewise be "immersed" in all the joys of an abundant life until we meet again.

"This conversation was more than good natured joking about doctrinal differences. It was symbolic of a spiritual oneness that transcends earthly differences, making us one. I shall remember Everett Quinton as a radiant and mature Christian-a true man of God. Though he is dead, yet he lives in so many ways. A bigness of spirit is something that doesn't die when a man dies."
