THE FORENSIC

OF PI KAPPA DELTA

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It was fitting that the silver anniversary convention of Pi Kappa Delta was presided over by the first national president of the society who had joined as a student and advanced through the ranks to the highest office. Eight national presidents have preceded S. R. Toussaint in office, but all of them had joined after their student days while they were members of the faculty. Sylvester R. Toussaint joined in 1919 during his freshman year at Ripon, Wisconsin Alpha. In 1922 he attended the Fourth National convention at Simpson, Iowa Epsilon. Later he became debate coach at Monmouth, Illinois Zeta. In 1930 he was made one of the national vice-presidents. At Houston he was elected president.

It was a pleasure to see President Toussaint in action during the business sessions. He presided with fairness and dispatch. Business moved. He was always in command of the meeting. He ruled promptly and correctly on all parliamentary questions. But through it all ran a feeling of good will which protected the rights of every member and encouraged the most backward to take part in the discussion.

All could see Mr. Toussaint's work as presiding officer. What the delegates did not see was the real work of organization which had been done before they arrived at Topeka. The Twelfth convention was one of the smoothest running the society has held. Nothing had been left to chance. President Toussaint and the National Council had planned every detail. Much of the success of the convention depends upon having the right men in strategic positions. A great deal of care was given to committee appointments. President Toussaint

surrounded himself with capable men, and deserved and won the loy-

alty of all those who worked with him.

Pi Kappa Delta has made remarkable progress during the past biennium. The society is united and in running order. Every member owes President S. R. Toussaint a debt of gratitude for his wise and unselfish service.

A man usually speaks most effectively when he talks about what he knows best, his own community, his work, his experience. It is significant that the trend in the speech contests at our national conventions has been towards subjects directly connected with student experience. The extempore speakers talked about the future for the woman of today or whether the men of this generation will have to go to war. The orators discussed college and personal questions. Several took up the value of the education they were receiving or their place in the industrial world.

Only in debate do we fail to make it possible for the student to speak in terms of his own knowledge. We still select a debate question about national problems not directly related to the student and the college world. It is not possible for youth to discuss the enforcement of labor awards in terms of things that he has faced and come to grips with. Perhaps it will be possible some day to get a debate

question which deals with life as a college student knows it.

Pi Kappa Delta was signally honored in having Senator Josh Lee come from Washington to speak at the final banquet. He left a busy program in Washington come to Topeka, and had to hurry back to resume his seat in Congress.

Pi Kappa Delta could not have found a more appropriate speaker. The eight hundred college people who composed the audience listened attentively not only because the Senator had a vital message to deliver, but also because he seemed directly related to them. He himself had been a college orator a few years ago and had until recently been teaching public speaking.

Thank you, Senator Lee. We shall remember your statements about government and the direction in which our nation is proceeding. It was a pleasure to listen to you. We feel highly honored to have you accept membership in our society and to wear our key.

Although efforts were made to secure pictures of all the contest winners and newly elected officers, the time between the convention and the date of publication was so short that it was not possible to get pictures of some of those desired. This explains why some are pictured here and others are not.

The sacred concert by the Ottawa University choir was one of the splendid things of a week of great experiences. It opened the convention in an auspicious manner: beautiful music artistically presented.

There has been no student gathering in the United States this year that compares with the Pi Kappa Delta convention in Topeka in the number of students attending and the number of colleges and states represented.

A number of coaches expressed the hope at Topeka that the report of the secretary-treasurer could be placed in the hands of the various college presidents. Since that report is printed in full in this issue of the Forensic, it is suggested that each chapter see to it that a copy is placed in the hands of its college president. Deliver it personally and call attention to any special matters you may want emphasized. I don't know of anything that would acquaint our presidents better with the society and the Topeka convention than this Forensic and a copy of the special Friday, April 22, issue of the Topeka State Journal.

The tenth annual convention of Phi Rho Pi, the junior college honorary forensic society, was held at the University of Oklahoma, April 10-14. Muskogee, Oklahoma, won the men's debate tournament and Coffeyville, Kansas, the women's. J. B. Hubbard, Wichita Falls, Texas, and Betty Lee Evans, Bristol, Virginia, won the oratorical contests. The extempore contests went to Muskogee, Oklahoma, and Eldorado, Kansas. The society amended its constitution to make it possible to award membership in the order of public speaking for students who have not competed in intercollegiate forensics. The applicant must meet certain speech requirements in other than competitive fields.—The Phi Rho Pi Persuader.

The boys from Colby traveled the greatest distance and certainly put Maine on the map. They furnished the only bona fide example of the real Yankee dialect to match with the Southern accent and the western drawl. The Maine potatoes they supplied for the final banquet were a rarity for people west of the Mississippi. Their call on Republican Standard bearer Landon must have been greatly appreciated.

"As a sophomore attending his first Pi Kappa Delta National Convention, I acquired a greater respect and admiration for what the society has promoted through the twenty-five years of its existence. The first delegation of students to arrive were those from the College of the Pacific, California Delta. E. R. Nichols, founder of Pi Kappa Delta, was a close second with his Redlands delegation.

"I am very much in favor of de-emphasizing the competitive angle, in spite of the satisfaction felt at attaining a singular position. I like the idea of ranking the teams superior and excellent."—Ansle Severtson, St. Olaf, Minnesota Beta.

The Associated Collegiate Press recently released a Campus Cartoon, which stated that "Wheaton College (Illinois) bans smoking, dancing, dramatics, cards, drinking, and discourages theatre and movie attendance. Still it is the fastest growing college in America today!" The Illinois Mu chapter of Pi Kappa Delta is located there.

Two hundred students from 36 colleges in 16 states attended the Grand Eastern tournament sponsored April 7-9 by the Strawberry Leaf public activities society of Winthrop, South Carolina Delta. Winners were as follows: Women's debate, Arkansas State Teachers; men's debate, Louisiana State Normal. Best debaters: Jeanette Swartz, University of Pittsburgh; and Frank Grover, Linfield, Oregon Alpha. Grand Eastern extemporaneous speakers: Robert McDaniel, Saint Vincent, Pennsylvania; and Dena Rae Jones, Arkansas State Teachers. Grand Eastern impromptu: J. W. Dixon, Jr., Emory and Henry, Virginia; and Louise Bailey, Furman, South Carolina. Grand Eastern oratory: Mervin Grossman, Erskine, South Carolina; and Louise Bailey, Furman. After dinner champions: Bernard McKenna, University of Pittsburgh; and Ruth Neves, Winthrop.—The Johnsonian.

Missouri Delta of William Jewell had its most successful and ambitious forensic season. Its debate teams were sent into 39 states, Canada, and Mexico, and travelled more than 15,000 miles. Among the schools debated on the 1938 tours were: Harvard, Dartmouth, Bates, University of British Columbia at Vancouver, New York University, George Washington University, Rollins, Redlands, Gonzaga, St. Thomas, Drake, Macalester, University of Southern California, U. C. L. A., Centre, etc., and the state universities of Michigan, Minnesota, Florida, Indiana, Georgia, North Dakota, Montana, Washington, California, Arizona. In all William Jewell participated in more than one hundred debates.

Pittsburg Teachers, Kansas Theta, engaged in 232 debates this year. It had eight debate teams in the field, four for the women and four for the men. Its debaters participated in seven tournaments. Kansas Theta competed in every event at Topeka. The total cost for the forensic season was less than six hundred dollars.

Illinois Beta of Eureka is sponsoring the showing of "The Life of Emil Zola" at a local theatre to raise funds for the initiation banquet and annual speaking contest.—Eureka College Pegasus.

Lee Avery, prominent in debate and public speaking, was elected student body president at Hardin-Simmons, Texas Theta.—The H-SU Brand.

Duan Spade, Heidelberg, Ohio Beta, won second place in the women's state oratorical contest.—The Kilikilik.

Linfield, Oregon Alpha, took one of the most extensive debate trips of the year. Prof. R. D. Mahaffey, the coach, and debaters Robert Boyd, Mark Nickerson, and Frank Grover, left March 26 and debated in California, Arizona, Texas, Louisiana, Alabama, Washington, New York, Illinois, and finished at Topeka April 22.—The Linfield Review.

The California Youth Model Legislature met in San Francisco May 6-8. There were two houses. Representatives were selected from religious, political, racial, social, rural and student groups. The immediate aim of the congress was to bring together youths for the exchange of ideas.—Pacific Weekly.

Illinois Beta is conducting a speech contest on the general subject "What shall we do to increase the enrollment of Eureka College?" It is open to all but members of Pi Kappa Delta. Prizes are awarded the winner.—Eureka College Pegasus.

"Has Puritanism in Kansas been beneficial to the state?" was the subject for a radio debate between Kansas State and Hays State Teachers March 28. The debate was broadcast from K. S. A. C. at Manhattan.—State College Leader.

Over seventy teams representing more than thirty Pacific Coast universities, colleges, and junior colleges, participated in the invitational tournament sponsored by College of the Pacific, California Delta, April 7-9.—Pacific Weekly.

Ethel Mae Moore, Louisiana College, Alpha, won second place among the 26 orators from seven states who competed in the fifth annual speech tournament in Natchitoches, March 18.—The Wildcat.

"How can the United States avoid war?" was the subject for a symposium discussion between women debate teams from the University of Washington and College of the Pacific.—Pacific Weekly.

Wheaton won the Illinois state debate tournament, with Augustana second and DeKalb third. All three are Pi Kappa Delta colleges. Twenty institutions were entered.—The Augustana Observer.

Maryville, Tennessee Alpha, won practically all the firsts in the state tournament, including firsts in men's and women's debate, after dinner speaking, and oratory.—The Highland Echo.

Baylor, Texas Iota, won the sweepstakes in the Savage forensic tournament at Durant, Oklahoma, March 4-5. Ninety-nine teams representing forty institutions in six states participated. The results were: Men's debate, Southeastern Teachers, Oklahoma Theta. Women's debate, Southwestern Teachers, Oklahoma. Junior College, men, Coffeyville, Kansas; women, Baylor. Mixed, Northeastern Teachers, Oklahoma Theta. Men's extempore, Jack Hays, Tulsa. Women's extempore, Mary Helen Neeley, Baylor. Men's poetry reading, Alfredo Vasques, El Paso. Women's poetry reading, Janette Kyger, Phillips University.—The Southeastern.

The Iowa State tournament was held in Des Moines, March 24-6. Alvin Gilbertson, Dubuque, won the men's extempore, with Gertrude McIntosh of Coe first in women's extempore. In oratory Miss McIntosh repeated, while Hershell Abbott of Simpson won the men's contest. Iowa State Teachers won first in both men's and women's debate. Robert Kraft of Drake won the Poetry reading contest, a feature added this year for the first time. Officers for next year are Professors Mendal B. Miller, Morningside; Joseph McConnel, Parsons; and Cunera van Emmerik, Central.

Hastings, Nebraska Delta, won the state tournament March 18, with firsts in women's debate, second in men's, first in women's oratory, and extempore, and men's extempore, and second in men's oratory. Hastings also won the Peace oratorical contest.—The Hastings Collegian.

Debaters from Durant Teachers, Oklahoma Theta, hitch-hiked to Arkadelphia, Arkansas; Abilene, Texas; and Natchitoches, Louisiana. They won first in men's debate at the first tournament, second in Texas, and gained lots of experience on their third trip.—The Southeastern.

Dave Pearson, a member of the South Dakota Delta chapter at State College, was recently elected student body president.—Collegian.

A recent issue of the Alabama School Journal contained an article on "Who's Responsible for Good Speech" by Professor J. H. Henning of Alabama College, debate coach for the Alabama Beta chapter. Prof. Henning stated:

"Out of 523 freshmen tested in the last two years, only seven or eight per cent had satisfactory speech, while 33 or 34 per cent had fairly satisfactory speech; and the majority-58 or 59 per cent-had unsatisfactory speech." These facts were revealed in actual tests made by Mr. Henning. He makes the challenging statement that these girls, with very few exceptions, were graduated from Alabama high schools.

The responsibility of correcting speech faults lies, according to Mr. Henning, in our public school systems. He says the goal might be stated as: "A speech course in every high school in the state of Alabama, taught by a qualified, well-equipped, and properly trained teacher of speech."—The Alabamian.
