of the need for breadth and encouraging depth of analysis. Because affirmative areas are more manageable, such resolutions should also reduce reliance on deceptive tactics and encourage direct clash. They should, but I do not argue they will. Unless affirmatives are expected to fully embrace the resolution, the result will be a compacting of current practices. That would ease the research burden, but would do nothing to minimize deception. By themselves narrowed resolutions will not make questionable tactics or shoddy interpretation of theory disappear. That will only happen when judges do not reward such behavior. Since judges cannot agree on what constitutes such behavior, it is unlikely they will agree to prohibit such excesses What narrowed resolutions will do is eliminate breadth as an excuse and allow more people to conduct original research, prepare their own arguments, and develop their own analysis.

Narrowed policy propositions do not represent a threat to N.D.T. debate. They certainly do not negate theory exploration. For example, one can envision an alternative justifications affirmative providing a need for a guaranteed annual income to ameliorate the effects of poverty, a comparative advantage in the area of economic cycles, and a goals-criteria justification for providing cash through the federal government. The difference from current practice is that all three areas would be nec-

essary to justify the resolution, which the affirmative would be expected to embrace fully. The somewhat more predictable affirmative allows the negative to more readily prepare a defense of the present system and to develop more realistic and better documented disadvantages and counterplans. As a result of the narrowed breadth of argument, evidence demands become more qualitative than quantitative, and direct clash is a realistic expectation. The results of the 1982-83 C.I.D.D. balloting may well suggest the narrowed resolution is an idea whose time has come. Again.

Secretary-Treasurer



ANTHONY B. SCHROEDER


Forensic Editor


LARRY NORTON

The Liberty college was consistently ranked in the top five at invitational tournaments. Students were repeatedly awarded special recognition as "top speakers."

Senior Linda Hopkins won the first-place "top speaker" award at the CEDA National Tournament. She and teammate Steve Petry were thetop-ranked team at the National Tournament after eight preliminary rounds of competition.

Miss Hopkins also won first place in the State Oratorical Contest.

Jewell's squad won the secondplace overall sweepstakes award at the Missouri Association of Forensic Activities State Tournament. They also were awarded an "excellent" rating at the Pi Kappa Delta National Tournament.

Recently, William Jewell has been recognized by the Speech Communication Association as being one of the top 20 forensics schools in the United States.

Jewell's forensics students represent the college by speaking at various Rotary, Optimist, Lions and Toastmaster Club meetings. They spoke to 26 of these groups during the past year.

Penny Swisher, coach of the Jewell squad, recently was elected national president of Pi Kappa Delta, the national honorary forensic fraternity. She is the youngest person and only the second woman ever to hold that office.
