HEAD OF KANSAS COLLEGE
PROFESSORS.

\$400,000 Campaign Boosted at O. U.
Banquet at Topeka—Senator Stone,
Dr. Olin, and Others Made Snappy
Speeches—Prof. Hardy Spoke at
Association—Many O. U. Alumni
There.

Ottawa University again received recognition at Topeka yesterday when President S. E. Price was reelected head of the college section of Kansas State Teachers' Association. The association has a membership of 6,000 pedagogues. Dr. Price's reelection is evidence that he is considered to be one of the best executives of the Kansas educators. He gave a paper at the association meeting.

Prof. C. O. Hardy, head of the History Department of Ottawa University figured prominently in the meeting of the Kansas History teachers, which was held in Memorial Hall at Topeka yesterday afternoon. Prof. Hardy gave a strong discussion on the problem of the amount and choice of material to be used in teaching history in Kansas high schools.

What turned out to be a forerunner and a step in "preparedness" for the big \$400,000 campaign for Ottawa, which is to be launched in the spring, took place at Topeka yesterday afternoon when about forty O. U. Alumni and friends, attending the Kansas State Teachers Association, banqueted in the First Baptist church of that city.

Dr. S. E. Price served as toastmaster. Following the banquet the coming financial campaign was introduced. Dr. A. S. Olin, chairman of the Committee on Efficiency gave a strong talk, which was well seasoned with the "O. U. Spirit." Senator Stone of Topeka made a forceful and inspiring speech on the coming campaign.

"I am not only confident of the possibility of the success of the campaign for \$400,000 endowment," said Senator Stone "but it is absolutely necessary if Ottawa University is to keep her place in the Educational world." He believes that the Alumni could fire one of the first big guns of the campaign by each one of the five hundred pledging \$100 each, twenty dollars a year. Both Dr. Olin and Senator Stone have already subscribed \$500 each to the fund and the latter promised in addition, the financial responsibility of an alumnus, should the sug-

gested plan be adopted. Dr. Price stated that two \$100 subscriptions had already been received.

Short speeches were also made by Prof R. A. Schwegler of Kansas University, Bessie McCune of Wichita, and Ernest Snideler of Leavenworth.
