ing financial campaign was introduced. Dr. A. S. Olin chairman of the Comm ttee on Efficiency gave a strong salk, which was well seasoned with "O U Spirit." Senator Stone of the Topeka made a forceful and inspiring speech on the coming campa'gn. "I am not only confident of the pos-

sibility of the success of the campaign for \$400,000 endowment," said Senator Stone "but it is absolutely necessary f Ottawa University is to keep her place in the Educational world." He believes that the Alumni could fire one of the first big guns of the campaign by each one of the five hund-

red pledging \$100 each, twenty dollars a year Both Dr. Olin and Senator Stone have already subscribed \$500 each to the fund and the latter promsed in addition, the financial responsibility of an alumnus, should the suggested plan be adopted. Dr. Price stated that two \$100 subscriptions and already been received.
