IN MEET WITH BAKER

O. U. Athletes To Compete at Baldwin Friday Afternoon.

The annual Ottawa University-Baker University dual track and field meet will be held in Baldwin Friday afternoon of this week at 3:30. Since neither school has shown brilliantly this season it is expected the meet will

be closely contested. According to the dope sheet Baker has a slight edge, but Ottawa could easily make up the difference by capturing a liberal number of second and third positions.

Dick Godlove, Ottawa coach, is leaning heavily on the performance of several veterans who have thus far been big point getters this season. Fred Koehler in the high hurdles, Bill Mattis in the lows, Asa Eagles in the javelin throw and a few other veterans have been the mainstays in the point onslaught of the Ottawans. Leonard Fergus, a freshman, has run several nice half miles but has done so by main strength and without much form. Once he learns how to run smoothly he may become one of the best runners in the conference.

Keith Smith, freshman dash man, with an eye to form improvement, has been developing rapidly and may be able to get some points in the dash events Friday. Godlove has hopes this boy will be able to place in the conference meet this season. That would be a feat this year because Kansas Wesleyan and College of Emporia seem to have a corner on speed.

Albert Roberts will probably take the 2-mile race if he runs true to form and Ottawa may get a few points in the mile with Dorbin Gardner, Tom Allan and Oliver Smith plugging the distance. Thus far Allan has done the best in the event.

The field events, excepting the javelin, may find the Braves in a vulnerable position, but they hope to bring in a few second and third places to offset somewhat the advantage of the Bakerites.

WILSON SPEAKER FOR O. U. GRADS

KANSAS CITY BAPTIST PASTOR COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER.

He and Three Others To Receive Honorary Degrees—Degrees To Be Awarded on June 1.

Dr. Robert I. Wilson, pastor of First Baptist church in Kansas City, Mo., will be the speaker at the 72nd anniversary commencement of Ottawa University on the morning of June 1 in First Baptist church. This announcement was made this morning by President Andrew B. Martin of the university. It was also announced that four honorary doctor's degrees will be awarded. Dr. Wilson, the commencement speaker, will be awarded one of these for outstanding work in the ministry. Dr. W. B. Wilson and Prof. R. H. Ritchie, long-time professors at O. U., will be honored for their extensive services to the school. An alumnus, William G. Nelson of Detroit, divisional manager of quality control for the United States Rubber company, will be given recognition for his chemical research in rubber products production.

Rev. Guy Wimmer, an alumnus of the school and pastor of Foster Park Baptist church in Chicago, will be the speaker at the Christian associations service to be held Sunday evening, May 30, at First Baptist church. Following the presidential custom Dr. Martin will deliver the baccalaureate address Sunday morning, May 30, at the same church.

**HISTORIC BAKER BELL
AGAIN BACK IN PLACE**

**Truck and Tackle Needed to
Remove Big Landmark**

Ottawa U. Students 'Swiped' It for
A Prank; Several Men Required
to 'Carry' Big Gift Back.

Baldwin, Kan., May 15.—Two
Ottawa University students sup-
posedly managed the removal of
the "Old Ten o'Clock" Baker Uni-
versity bell here, Sunday night,
April 4. But it required a truck,
several men, a tall tripod, and
the mechanical advantage of a
system of pulleys to put the 650-
pound historic landmark back in
place.

The mention of the old bell
brings to Baker alumni many
floods of memories. For years, it
occupied its place in the belfry of
old Science hall. The reverbera-
tions endangered the building, con-
sequently, it was transferred to a
tower not far from its former
resting place. In that tower it
became the town and college cur-
few. It tolled the death of prom-
inent citizens, called together
mass meetings, notified the popu-
lace of another oratorical, foren-
sic, or athletics victory, and in
fact, would even spread the glad
tidings of the successful comple-
tion of an endowment campaign
or the securing of a substantial
gift. But it was not because of
the above that it secured its name.
The Ten o'Clock bell was just
that it reminded students and fac-
ulty alike that they should be in
their respective rooms before the
tolling ceased. The Ten o'Clock
bell and the Coed Walks (12-inch
planks about 18 inches apart) fig-
ured in many disasters for hur-
rying students in the darkness of
the night. Upon hearing the bell,
the student who stayed with his
best date a few minutes late,
hustled to reach his room before
the last toll. If he failed to ma-
nipulate the distance in the re-
quired time, he sometimes had an
explanation to make to his land-
lady or to either of the deans.

The bell is again in place, but
it is minus a clapper, hence, the
incoming freshman class may
have the assignment of furnishing
the missing instrument.
