#### **OLD DOMINION UNIVERSITY, VIRGINIA**

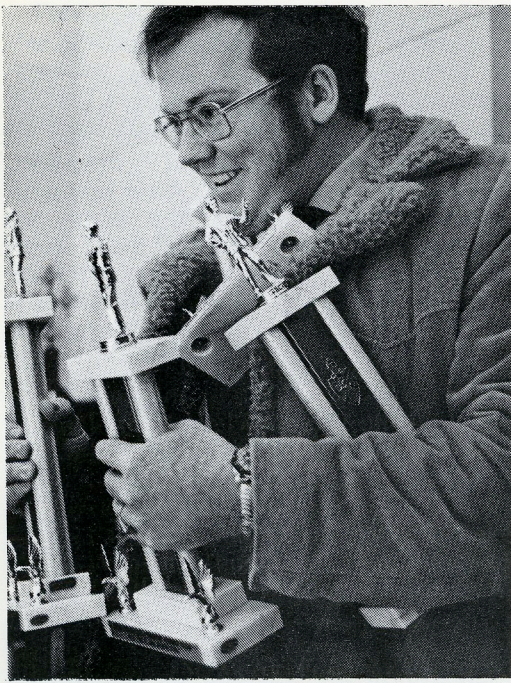

Thereafter, the speakers were trying to invalidate the other team's arguments. I think that it would be more fair if in the first round they just presented their basic facts, and then in the second round they could try to tear apart the other team's arguments while trying to add a valid note to their own arguments."

"P.S. My debate was a half hour late, so I worked overtime. Please keep this in mind when you grade this paper."

Humorous, yes; but also significant, as Miss Callahan points out, of the fact that untrained listeners do not necessarily learn much from hearing a debate.
