

Statement by the Composer

I wrote the music. This is only an opera of shadows. To make these shadows come to life you must first add the directing genius of Steven Biddle who, little by little, gave the singers depth, dimension and insight into their roles. Of course, you must first have the singers; those rare people gifted by God (and hard work) to lift verbal communication to the ultimate height of song. Place all of this in a setting by Joe Hutchinson whose talents as a sculptor are so in evidence in the wonderful use of space in the sets and you finally have a flesh and blood opera. One cannot forget also the dozens of people who made and collected costumes (thank you, Lona) and props (thank you, Teri) and performed those endless and varied tasks necessary for production. Most of us are destined to dream alone. I've been fortunate enough to be surrounded by those who were not only capable of dreaming with me but by those who were able to add new dimensions and insights to those dreams. We hope the result will be an evening of insight and pleasure for you in this not so perfect world.

Synopsis

Act I, scene one: A New England Village. A dance is concluding. Ethan Frome outside waits to escort home Mattie Silver, his wife's niece. Mattie, who has been living with Ethan and Zenobia (Zeena) for some time now, tells Ethan that she feels unwanted in the Frome household. Ethan assures her that she will always be welcome to stay with them.

Scene two: Frome farmhouse. Mattie and Ethan arrive home. They are greeted by Zeena, who tells them of her declining health and her plans to visit a new doctor in Bettsbridge. As the act closes, the three principals renew their themes: Zeena worries about her health, Mattie about her discomfort with Zeena, and Ethan assures himself that Mattie's stay in the household is permanent.

--Intermission--

Act II, scene one: Frome farmhouse, early evening. Zeena has gone to Bettsbridge. During supper, the cat breaks a very special glass dish belonging to Zeena, and Ethan promises Mattie to have it repaired before his wife returns. Ethan's speculation that Mattie will soon be marrying prompts her to wonder whether Zeena has something against her and wishes her gone.

Scene two: Ethan returns to repair the dish, but Mattie tells him that Zeena is already back. Zeena enters and informs Ethan that, on the doctor's advice, she has already hired a girl to do the housework--which means that Mattie must leave. Ethan just has the chance to tell Mattie of this, when Zeena reenters with the broken dish. She accuses Mattie: "You've taken from me the one thing I cared for most of all."

Scene three: The next morning in the Frome kitchen. Ethan is writing a letter to Zeena to say good-bye, but destroys it. Mattie enters. She tells Ethan of her plan to find work in a store. As Ethan speaks against this plan, Jotham Powel enters. He has been sent for by Zeena to take Mattie's trunk to the station.

--Intermission--

Act III, scene one: In the village, the church choir is practicing. Children play on their way home from school. Couples prepare for sleigh rides. Mattie and Ethan enter. They cannot face being separated and decide to die together: They ride a sled down a steep hill into a large elm tree.

Scene two, Postlude. The Frome farmhouse one year later. The suicide has failed: Ethan is lame and Mattie must be cared for by Zeena.
