

INTRODUCING

Latin, mathematics, history, English. All of these hold important places in the curriculum, but according to Prof. Samuel M. Le Page, the greatest of all is history.

Professor Le Page came here in 1925 as head of the department of history. During the two years before this, he held a professorship of history in Iowa Wesleyan college. Professor Le Page is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University. He has a doctor's degree from Boston University and was a graduate student in the University of Berlin in 1913 and 1914. He is an ordained minister in the Methodist Episcopal church and had several pastorates until 1923.

Professor Le Page is on the National contest committee of the League of Nations Non-Partisan Association. This committee directs the prize contests in the league of nations conducted by examinations in the high schools of the country. Such a contest was held in 1926 and another will be held in 1928. He is also on the list of accredited

speakers for the Carnegie Peace Foundation.

As an author Professor Le Page is well known. He wrote a book, the "Relationship Between the Earlier Experiences of St. Augustine and His Later Religious Conception", which was published in 1915. He has also written articles which have been published in religious magazines. At present Professor Le Page is compiling a history of Ottawa University. He expects to complete this during the coming Christmas holidays.

Several new courses of junior-senior work will be taught in this department next year. It is planned to offer courses in the Renaissance and the Reformation, the French Revolution, the History of Latin America, and the Foreign Policy of the United States.

R. J. Kellogg, head of the modern language department, is teaching a class in history this semester and Prof Higgins also has his classes in Greek and Roman Civilization.
