U., will be at the conscrivatory on Saturdays and already has his time practically filled.

This is a modern composition and is a much heavier and more difficult production than was the fall cantata. The soloists will probably be picked mostly from the students at the conservatory The 17-piece orchestra, composed of college students and citizens of Ottawa, which aided in the fall production, and which added so much to the effect of the rendition, will be used for the spring production. The orchestra is to be a permanent organization from now on, under the direction of Prof. Utt. It will be known as the Ottawa Orchestra, and meets every Wednesday night for rehearsal.
