Three times I begged the Lord to rid me of it, but his answer was: 'My grace is all you need; power comes to its full strength in weakness.' I shall therefore prefer to find my joy and pride in the very things that are my weakness; and then the power of Christ will come and rest upon me. Hence I am well content, for Christ's sake, with weakness, contempt, persecution, hardship, and frustration; for when I am weak, then I am strong.

And then in Minneapolis and I suppose this is why I kind of got off on this, part of the reason, in Minneapolis the ministers coucil did a marvelous thing for Ruth and I kinda They and gave her a painting, a copy of a painting called "Christina World now to some of you this is old stuff, to me its all new this is mar Mr. Wyatt neighbor she has had polio she lives with her brother who is a truck gardener and he gave up fishing to spend more time with his sister Christina the pictures called Christina 's world now people have made more of this than they should actually she is picking berries resting abit, near the family burial ground the ohly way she can move is the she pushes a chair or crawls on all four. Now you ask yourself, what kinds of a man is this?

You see more in the pictures that a girl on the ground and an old weather beated house. You know and to your amazement you discover that he's lived in one place all his life.

He's never been outside the continental U.S.A. And the place where he lives is Chadsford Pennsylvania and it has three hundred fifty souls in the town and the only other place he goes to with his family he has a marvelous family life, he has painted some themendous things of his family, is to the place called Cushing, Maine.

And that is a big town and it is daid there are 479 souls in that town so he moves back and forth he sits in Chadford and listens to the old people talk when there are people who would love to

And some of you like Christopherson and Gorsuch will know what I mean when I say something snaps, hits him and then he must paint and he stays with it. He has incredible integrity and this is the reason many people say Wyeth has caught us. Until the painting is done two orthree a year that is all now . And believe it or not Kennedy ${f t}$ he president, invited Mr. Wyeth to a very very "in" dinner for celebrities early in 1961 just after his inaugu ration and Mr. Wyeth was going to go except that two days before he was to go he started on a painting and he sent his regrets to the President and said, "I'm sorry but I can't come." And amazingly Wyeth saw Mr. Kennedy awhile latter and Mr. Kennedy said you know I'm not angry or upset because you stayed by in and a good thing came , I like what you did. And somehow people all over have tried to drag this man out to do the kind of thing they wanted him to do. And he sits and moves in his world of people and the essence of life and puts on canvas jjust what he see and there is something suggestive about the pictures for example, you see a barn and it's not just a barn you see you remember how it is done, your remember when you xxx used to play in a hay mow and you catch the smell of the fresh hay and you can hear the cattle and if you are sick and see that paiting it becomes a healing reality because it is so suggestive and the amazing thing people who have say and XXXX gotten to know this man a little bit , I'm going to move on to something else so hang on, I think I could stay here for the half hour . There is something about people that if they want to create something they manipulate it See I paint you and arrange you and then I say itsn't that lovely. Like we take pictures and stand like this you know with out But it is said that Mr. Wyeth almost paints on his knees

He waits to catch what is there. And he says when people say leave come on over here, we will pay you a lot of money to paint this he says, I haven't xxxx yet plumbed the depths of what is yet around me so why shouldn't I stay in one place and dig a little deeper . And that's why he knows Christina and T om and the others Now what I've been thinking about is my world. Sometimes mixed up sometimes confused, sometimes closed up, sometimes all cluttered up. And I start to ask myself, what gets into my world. What sounds do I hear? When I see the old amm man on the street, what sounds get through when I see the waitress in the cafe, or someone in a rest home or the banker or the merchant or the college prof or student what gets through? I ask myself is it simple this world or is it cluttered up? What is the great driving force in it? becomes the simple line? The major theme of the symphony is there a symphony? The other morning at Green Lake I got up to go see Ruth at the hospital and it was 6 o'clock and I had gotten in at 4:20 a.m. I crawled in as quietly as I could and while I was dressing there was a knock on the door and I went to the door not thinking, with my shirt and shorts on and when I opened the door there was a woman, Mrs. Harriet Smith, I said excuse me. And she said that's alright I've come for just a minute. Now on Sunday we put Luther's ashes in the ground and it was just a beautiful service in Green Lake. Ronnie Well's gave one of the most moving tributes I've ever heard. And part of his life was in it. She said I saw you come in late this morning I said Harriet whatever were you doing at that time of the morning She said I always get up at that time I said it was 4:20 I get up then to hear the birds. And to pray. It was a casual

What do you take in? The things that bombard us, theat cluttler us, that tear at us, but make this world that I leve in a kind of messed up place. Who lives in this world with your? Have you got any Tom KXXXX Clark's or Christina Olson's? Who really lives in there with you? Does anybody? How big is your world? I've not asking you how far you have traveled anyplace Anybody can go to Moscow and send a card home. How big is that world, that world in which you live? Do you see possibilities? As you look out of your world around you. Cand there be change? Newness, something happening beyond the monotoness and the boring do I see a barn and it's more than 1 barn, do I see a bird and it is more than a bird. What do I hear? What do I touch some body else. What's life world of Roger Fredrikson or Tom Idema like? And when I start to think about this , that's when I get pushed over toward Jesus. Or maybe he pulls me over. You know Jesus never traveled more than 60 or 80 miles from where he lived. And the only words he ever wrote was when he bent to scribble some words in sthe dirt and the wind quickly blew that away. And yet the incredible thing was that the opening up of this world was done by Christ Jesus. Someone has said, T.R. Glover has said, that when you start to hear Jesus tell his stories he is taking the stuff of life around, like Christina Olson, saying like on canvas this is what the kingdom of God is like. this is what you can be if you see, it hear it, and move with it. So he says if you take some leaven and put in a loaf of dough the whole lump will be affected by the leaven. Where do you get that? He saw his mother baking bread. That was his world, but he left that world and let eternity come into it and said that is what the kingdom of God is like.

or he saw his mother trying to patch clothes They were poor people over and over again sewing the patches on and he said I'm going beyond all this we have a new thing going here, I'm going but he k used the analogy, whe used the symbol he left the life he picked up out of his home of his mother trying to put the clothes together Man when I hear this story I think of how my mother used to patch up our clothes or how Ruth has tried to patch up our youngsters things over the years. And he sid the kingdom of God is not like sewing patches on a garment it is the wonder of a whole new world opening up before you. Or he siad if a woman looses a coin and women would wear pieces of coin around her neak on pieces of string or leather or what ever they could find, ten of them with knots between them and when the string would get worn it would break and the coin would go rolling off to a cormer in the dimly lit house and the woman looks, and looks and looks. How many fimes they wondered around in Jesus house to see if they had anything to buy bread with today? And he said when the woman finds the coin she just goes dancing around the neighborhood and says man we found it!! And Jesus said incredibly it's like this when a sinner comes home. So he took the stuff of life in a great sense he went way beyond Plaestine and puts his arms around and said this is what it is like and life can become if you can only see it. That's why I rad the scripture If he who has ears let him hear. Let him hear beyondthe TV show of last night. And that of course, can too have eternity in it. What to do you hear beyond the superficiality of life? We neither have the capacity for great sorrow or great joy. It seems, you know that we get down just bike below the surface soil. and it is hard down there and nothing can break in. So that we do not catch the eternal meaning and the newmances that life is putting at us through the grace of our Lord.

If only we will hear and understand that. Ihave discovered this again and again. In a place I never expected it. Not in a religious conference, in room 300 in a hospital . And when I come home I amd filled with joy and look at people. It's amazing how astrange new tenderness comes to you . It's funny yet not a little boy 2 or 3 years old walks down the street and carried his left warm and all of a sudden you see him and you are overwhelmed the boys the soms of Willis who are seven and nine sitting at the funeral home and suddenly you want the world to be kigger then you let it be. Not geographic traveling not bigness, in a sense we measure everything. But in that magnificent thing Jesus said, The kingdom of heaven is within in you. And when Jesus moves beyond the stone of his home and he starts to talk about nature you get something else another aspect of this world/ You know how we have prostituted, and torn up and goughed at it and said it is ours. Man you stand on the shores of Lake Michigan as we did up at the place called Point Betsy and there is a lighthouse and they say that if Lake Michigan keeps going the way it is , big steamers are goming in with irom ore from over the seas. Liberian liners and all the read they say if it keeps going its going k to be a big, vast, stagnant lake . A putrid thing. XXXX Jesus never operated that way. And in all of his life he swa in a flower and a bird the rythum of life. Saw and caught the meaning of the eternal and leaned on it. Say you can trust it it's God's , my father's , his hand is in it. Don't you understand the rain comes on the just and the unjust. The sunshintes on the good and evil this is what my father is doing . This is a life you can trust. What a world.

The world of Jesus. When you get to people man that's where it really comes through. This world of God trying to break into the world of man trying to form and transfiguring it so that part of me sits and crys and say God have mercy on me. And he hears them everybody else rushes buy, the children the old people . Zachaus you know building a big house and going up on a big hill and somehow pitting a big front of provotox and like so many of us do relious religiously, secularly and evryother way. And then Zachaus somehow sense the yearning cry of the heart . and reaches out to him and says Zachaus just the name mentioned and the lights start going on . Yesterday Monsignor MacEneany and Pastor Ed Novak and I discussed lonliness because a note had been left on the steps of St. Joesph's Catherdal and would you believe I had three calls, two of which were long distance of people saying can hou help me with my loniliness? And you think dear people[of a congregaion] of a big strong congregation like outs and you ask yourself how do we see the others? How do we understand whats the world of people like for us? And you hope and pray that the sensitivity that Paul speaks of when he says" We are aalled to be agents of reconciliation because we broke into a new world the old order passed away and a new thing came." And that's why you can see barns, the sun and the moon, and people and life itself in a new perspective because you are now in the spream of the spirit. You are in the heart of the eternal you move in the meaning of the everlasting. I am doing a new thing. So I started with Andrew Wyeth and his world and I thought about mine. And I asked God to make it clean not in a self centered way but lines that understand the commitment so that if the President calls a man is free to say I have a job started and I can't leave it now.

I've heard a higher calling. Humble enough so that it can stop by an old person or somebody who has lost his way. That will hear a note on steps of St. Joesph's . He who has ears to hear let him hear. In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

He is utterly convinced that he starts with a great primal reality he says it has always been there I do not know what for you has always been there, regardless of who your are, how you feel or where you've been, or whatever wind is blowing on you today to say it has always been there This is like a man who comes to the sea for the first time I use this now as just a very, very poor analogy. Before I was ever born the sea was there . So I am taken to the sea and someone says there it is. It is a reality that it is outside me so I may say it looks gray or it appears this way speak of it, in kind of a awe and wonder, but, the point of it is before I came it was there. Now we have some kind of a mistaken notion that we invent God. even The best of us doubters at this point that I kind of my own thought processes objective brought him into existence we are deeply in need of a XXXXXXXXX authority. The argument for God; s existence is called ontological it is using reason . The fantastic[the fa] cry of my being is to respond to a reality that is already there. So that even without the gospel there is the infimation shadow the light or however you want to put of a reality that is already there. So when John starts to deal with the church he does not start out nit picking with the problems in that way. He starts out by saying, " Reality has been there

starts He xxxxx out by saying the reality has been there" When I say that I must tell you that I say that in faith. But faith has it own way of knowing we somehow have had the wrong idea the reason is the only way of knowing. and we know by reason someting that tells me this is the strange part of being human being that the pulpit is here, or I stretch my hand out and I know it is there. We would become almost like a mad house if there were not by somesense that we know by reason But what we have done to often when reason runs out then well tack on faith and this has been the wrong way to think about faith Because in it's depth faith ix has it's own way of knowing and agust one of the greatest saints the church ever had one of the greatest spokesmen for the first eleven centuries said, " Faith seeks understanding" XXX So what John proclaims we know by reason but in a deeper way we know by faith It has always been there. Now the amazing thing about this is that he said , and this is now deeply personal kheke this is not something just way out there so to speak, but is something that I am reaching out for trying to get a hold of all the time it is immeediate it is near, it is with me- So he says the incredible thing I heard it! I saw it! I looked on it! I handled it! Now we come to the subjective What is true out there Now I discover I bear witness within my self. So that when the simplest person stands up and says it anyway I know it I have handled it , I have tasted it, this becomes a profound personal thrust of reality. In the marvelous thing is that to respond as a christian and to say Yes to what is giben to what is a reality to discover in ones own experience to what is their's squares to what is there. And these too as John says elswwhere bear witness one with the other.

Yesterday in the midst of a very lovely wedding service I met again the Charles Lee's who are with us for worship I had the privilege of marriing these dear people ten years ago. Yesterday I met two of their daughters. And after we had remarked about the lovely wedding they said something wonderful has happened a year and one half ago we became christians . And after we had spoken about it we went to the chapel to thank God Like someone else said this week, I can't keep it in, becuase it's true for me. Now it's just one think to just sort of within oneself try to dream up or conjure up something but its quite another thing to say that which is from everlasting to everlasting this I have seen, and known and touched and handled. And if it is true as it most xxxxxxxxxx assuredly seems to me that John the beloved [wrote] the man that leaned on Jesus breast at the Last Supper, wrote it then you can almost catch the newuances of this the night that Jesus sat and said to them," One of you will betray me " the business at the tomb, the being with Jesus later on when he say"Touch me and see whether I am real or not" all of that. So the minute that he has spoken of the fact that he has touched, tasted and handled this then he says that reality was Christ that I am speaking of. There are three things that come out in this, passage about Christ. One he is from everlasting to everlasting with the father. XXX You see Christian Theology people it is very important that we understand this, has said basically that Jesus os like no other man. Becuse God was in him uniquely. No this becomes a knid of discontinuity I know which we receive by faith but the fact of the matter is there is not a point at which he became God . God was in him. To such an extent that it has been said, By the church ever since it's birth Christ was with the father. And is with the father now. And in Jesus now we see God wrapped in human form.

And what John had know and thisis why he feels God was manifested in himself to Jesus he said he became simple we read that in the passage today In his becoming visible that which everlasting has come into our world was not as some of the Greek thinker held was stepped down in order to get the God you had to clomb up those steps. It was an entry no one has put this in a simple popular ashion better than J. B . Phillips who talks about a visited planet. Man we talk about trips to the moon and we are all in a sense overcomed and wondering about all of this and thankfull that the young men have come home again but when we talk about a planet that has been visited thex reality of God goming to this planet in a unique form out of the everlasting into time becomes the wonder of what Jesus is all about and Jesus has come this way and reveal himself in this way and become visible therefore he has in this action made life available. So he is from everlasting, he has entered our world and in the entereing by his action made life available. Now when John has said this we declare to you and this I share and want to say to you for two reason one is that you may know the common life together . Now this friends is a beautiful phrase we talk about it here many many times here in the church and yet I wonder if we understand what yt it is we have a life in common it is a rich deep thing in our whole christian background. That we have a koininia, a community we belong to each other WW. Belonging is not based let me say it again, on the fact that I find that some one else has only an eighth grade education like me or somebody that has about as much money that I've got so that I feel comfortable with him or so that I can live in him part of twwn so we feel comfortable with each other. You see this becomes the danger of our human grouping today.

The common life of which he speaks is the life that we have found in this life. Which is shared so that Christ is come and broken open the life of God , sharied it with us and entered in to that. We find each other in a koininia that is unbreakable. And we sense something deep in this. That is why when yesterday someone says to me I am a christian or somebody days we have become christions immediately we are brothers and sisters There is a koininia and a common life about this and John is saying I have written this, I am speaking like this to you so that you may know this with the father. The incredible thing folks about this worship today is that we do not just sit here like a servce club and I am a member of the service club we do not sit here simply as a human grouping there is a divine presence and that divine presence if he is real, breaks down the barrier so that we do not feel removed from you. I feel at one with you, I discover tht we belong together in our hurst, and our hopes, and the possibilites of life and the wonder and the glory and joy of And if there is anything that is needed today is is that kind of a community. That reaches out., out of the spirit of love. And shares this kidd of love. and life. But he says more than this I am writing this he says that your joy may be full one of the banner we had hanging on the wall for a while said The giganitc secret of a christian is joy! Joy is not rooted in things yet it grows out of relationships. It is when I know you I find joy. And in a vastly deeper sense it is when I come to know Christ and share in his life the by product of this relationship between us becomes a kind of a joy & that has an authenticity about it. So he says I am saying to you, That Christ has entered out world the one whose been from everlasting to everlasting has shared his life with us in sucha way that I want you to know we can be a community.

live.

We can know common life together, we can be going on the way toward joy being fulfilled. Our coming together today is a celebration! Of all of this. Now he goes to say something else and on this I want to hand perhaps the main theses of today It is the God is light. It is the essense of God to be light How as a human shoose to speak about my maker unless my maker has shosen to reveal himself. So today with John we say we know that God is light because shining in the face of Jesus we have seen that light. And together we are in it. There is that marvelous thing the D.M.Bailey says, That once apon a time when we were a strange and lonely looking out into the darkness and the fire was behind us in the circle but we KNE are all looking away from the fire and then we turn buy some wonder of the spirit and we turn toward the fire we saw the light and we saw each other. This is what has gone on with us as far as God is concerned. We have discovered that he is light. Now this has a tremendous meaning in it. It has revelation, truth and holiness in it it has guidance in it . It has the opening up of darkness light comes there and the way is there to know God is to know that Now he says if we say we are in the ligth with him but walk in darkness then we don not know the light and we are liars. And part of the difficultyfolkswith the chitstian community these days is that it says it knows the light but walks in darkness. Instead of walking by truth we walk by half truths instead of walking in a sense by guidance or holiness we walk by our own strength To say I know the light is to day I want to do the light I want to walk in it. It becomes a kind of ethical, moral and an intellectual kind of light the kind of openess we

To be a christian to put it another way, John put it is to be God-like. To let the light of God be in me.

And if I know this light and I walk in this light then I am being forgiven . It is a beautiful phrase. You notice it says here If we walk in the light then he himself is in the light this is ni the second paragraph then we share together a common life . The last phrase in the paragraph says we are being cleansed from every sin by the blood of Jesus his son. And to be a people who are being cleansed is to live a kind of free life. I have the feeling that really our deepest sickness is more then lonliness and meaninglessness is guilt. Much of our restlessness and our uprootness the conflict comes because we are guilty. Then is it possible that guilt can be taken from me. Do I need to drag the old stuff with me all the time. The wonder of what John says is that if we walk in the light we are on our way to being forgiben. So then he passes on out of this to say the last thing For he says that if we try tp to say that we are sinless we are really saying a lie because this is an impossibility to say that I'm sinless like God, I'm on x my way but not sinless what happens then if I do commit sin this is a guestion the people keep asking all the time. He says in this last paragraph we confess our sins it is just and may be trusted to forgive our sins. And cleanse us from every kind of wrong. So tyhe christian who is not perfect in fact one of the deep rich things that we have found from people like Keith Miller is that we are most together when we know and accept each others weaknesses. do not need to prove to you anything at all you see if I did then I wear myself out all the time trying to be something that I am not.

But if I can come to you guilty with hang ups and all the rest and say to you this is how it is with me and you say to me you know thats the way it is with me and in that light we begin to rejoice because we start to accept God's forgiveness and live in it . Then we really have cause for celebration So you say how many times you that's Peter's question if I do it 7 can I get 7 times and he says to him you just keep coming will you say will that means that I go out and sin to morrow do any ole thing I want to completely irresponsibile because I can get washed clean at night. That is not what he is saying. All this is prefaced by the fact that he can walk in the light on the basis of a man, woman wanting to be in the kgk light to be with god. To be god-like He says will you forgive me. And when he says this grace is already there and forgiveness is already given me. And I know it and I am free again Because this has been taken care of. There's a vast reality here but beyond his vastness is his presense a Lord who has entered our world the world of the time and space One who says you can walk in the light will and if you walk in the light you will know forgiveness and you will want to be forgiven So the chirstian life just the become form the passage we read belonging to a community common life, where forgiveness is an everyday reality. Now is he forgives us then how ought we be with each other There I say to you I forgive you Yes, if, if I know his forgiveness Forgiven people always love much and people who love much always know forgiveness. This is the word of life. Which is declared to us today. In the name of the father, the son and the Holy spirit. Amen

Call to Worship

Ascribe to the Lord, you families of nations, ascribe to the Lord glory and might; ascribe to the Lord the glory due to his name, bring a gift and come into his courts.

Bow down to the Lord in the splendour of holiness,

and dance in his honour, all men on earth.

We not get through all this in fact I am almost certain we will not so next Sunday we will pick up where we left off this Sunday so that we will not get hung up or frustrated about it. The great thing that religion concerns itself about is how to get God and man together. This is why people run through hot coals, sacrifice babies, or try to live by the golden mean or any one of a hundred things. Now what the gospel insists on and John brings it out is that we can only have fellowship with God through Christ, that is full fellowship the way he talksabout it here, through Christ who has come to us. The difference between our religion the christian religion and others is that other regigions you have to go through so many steps to get to god to make you fitting or whrthwhile or else the way won't be open you've got to buy your way in, the christian gospel says the amazing thing about god's grace, and this is the reason that God's greace is talked about so much is that God comes to us, he came to us in Christ. And that life was made manifest. Now when I say picking up chapter one which we took up last week, that I want to walk in the light as he is in the light and God hears me and says yes you come on and walk with me this does not mean I become perfect and anyone who tells you that watch out for. There is nothing worse than religious egotism and it is not apart and partial of the christian gospel. So he says at he end of the chapter one that if we confess when we get into trouble if we confess he is eager and he is more than able to forgive and this is what he'll do. And even the desire forsinning for doing wrong for falling back in the old way is taken away neither is the drag which I do not get out of my fleshly existence which gets me back into the old egotistic ways.

For sin in it's essense is disobedience it is daying instead of my turning my life Godward I am turning it inward on myself and build my world and say this is it. And God is left out and I think I can organize life without God. So I to use one og the great negative words of the scripture, I become disobedient. Now when I allow the life of Christ to come into me this doesn't mean that I become sinless. So what John says at the start of this chapter it begins in the section is when we say your sins can be forgiven this does not mean you can go on sinning willy-nilly, there is a yearning to be like God just a gift of the spirit but the marvelous thing is should we, someone commit a sin in this first paragraph it says this in the second sentence Should anyone commit a sin we have won to plead our cause with the father. /Now there is a great word used for the Holy Spirit and that is advocate. I got so to speak a friend in cours and you say why is that necessary because the nature of God is not to dook on sin and if a man therefore is sinful or how's he has committed wrong is going to get out of it. Unless there is one who says I stand here in Fredriksons behalf. And the marvelousk thing folks is that I can always fount in this new life on his forgiveness. For he is the way for which I find my self coming home again, Now how do I say I know this is true. I know it is true becasue, and the New English bible has a translation of this in the Older translationproficiation which is difficult for us moderns to pick up. This translation in the last sentence says of the paragraph it himself the remedy of the defilement of our sins. Now the amazing thing about greae is it does not say to you now you keep out of trouble old boy and maybe someday if you grit your teeth hard enough you'll just keep trying you'll make it. Because all that does is shove us more deeply into the pit.

Because guilt deepens Amazing thing is that God not only ssays i want to receive(I wan) he steps over on our side and says I am with you. This is the amazing part of the Godhead Another place it says we don't even know twow to pray. But the spirit helps us in our weakness. So that we do know who and how to pray. I sat one night at vespers at Camp Judson and a young gellow from this church stood up in the chair to pray one of the most moving prayers it could not have been prayed by human wisdom and we are foolish when we think up clever enough words thinking God will hear me becasue my prayer is so clever. This is why the man who stood in the corner said, God be merciful to me was heard and the man with all his words said I am not like the guy over here and so forth and was not heard. Sor the prayer that rises out of the interior of life the cry to be restored again the marvel is that God has done in Christ what is necessary so that when I can again avail myself of his great forgiving power. That means that before the service started I could stand out side or be here and say Lord you know how I goof things up and when I am my best self I can pray this way and you take me over and over again and this is that I am asking you to do. And the one whose made remedy for all mu sins not only mine but the whole world. Is the one to whom I go. to the fathr's house again. Now he give us this back he says here is the test. by which way we can make sure that we know him There are test one is to know him and the other is to be in him. Now John wrote the greek world and the greeks have two great ways of knowing one was intellectual and the other was emotional. But if you think straight you will know and if you feel right you'll know . Many of us who assume we are chistians assume kkk that is the way we know God. If you can work you emotions up enough you will know him.

Where as if you read enough books an theology you will kkow if you know enough verses of scripture you will know him Keith Miller has a fantastic satire on this. He called it the Parable of the Ladders, But it isn't that way. We know by obeying That's a new dimension. Now there may be intellect involved in obeying and there is surely emotion envolved in obeying. but you cannot substitute either reason. or emtion for obedience. How do I learn about my own parents all of here have been children and when I was told hy my parents to do this and I did it I would request and a good father never asks his children to do bad things and it was a good request and I did it and my father commended me for it. He said you did well son I learn about the character of my father. Which is putting it very very simply. But what really happens is when I am urged maxxxx nudged, called, told to do this I a man can know what he is supposed to do. In fact that is one of theXXXXX difficulties about the bible is that we know perfectly well what we are supposed to be doing but we don't do it. Now as Tom said the other night, I just want to usew this, and I'm not imbarrassing Tom I hope. Tom said we haw a play night and it turned out to be kni kind of a wild and wooly affair and that was the hight we started out trying to be a family. The reverend, and the counselors and the kids, you kinow were trying to find their own shoes in a pile of shoes and my dear wife Ruth keeps telling me Roger you keep forgetting you 50 years old you know I want to be 15 again. And then you know there is going to be a kind of water business it starts out with cups and the pans and ends up with pails and the counselors are cleaning up the cabins., in good faith. but in the midst of it all of a sudden a young man you've seen him around the church and this is what happened between me and so

many of the kids.

This is the kind of thing that agonizes you in a congregation like this. I want to know every one in this way. All of a sudden one of the young men you've seen around and you think he's just a typical flip kind of a kid says to you I want to say something and you walk away and for two years I have thought about this and this is what Tom said , I have thought about this thing , it's been on my back and I said if that's the case Tom maybe Go'd talking to you. So then he says thats what's happening and you just don't have things for public show this is for the christian community There is a difference between have ing a show and you dont have this take place just between you and one other you have a communal affair. Of the people in the lodge or in the lounge and in a real sense you find your self affirmed in what you say and you say Tom it would be marvelous if our own church could hear something of this, and you do not plan it this way. It speaks for lots of others win who have made or are making lots of decisions. Three of our young people were baptized in a stream on Thursday night so he says it scares me to death but I'll do it. Now when you say I'll do it in obedience km not to Fredrikson but to a higher voice you learn oh God. You learn not about God you learn to know God. And part of our difficulty and the reason we get all cramped yp and choked up inside we seem to get free and is not because hanging banners around the wall or anything is not necessarily what we get is obedience. So that one of the red lines all through the scripture in the face of treffic odds men and women say I do what I've been told to do and this is what I am going to do. Somebody comes in and is going to pull a book off the library shelf and why don't you read Wilfred Grenfeld, he said I quess I will and he pulded it out and one of the kids

working in the camp.

Because Grenfeld's life is a story of obedience from Abraham to Jesus and we learn God we learn not aboout God we learn God and he say s here's the test. To know him by obeying him So I ve asked my self this morning the question, Do we keep his commands? Now the next paragraph moves on into being in God says here is the test and which by the way in the preceeding paragraph it says something about Love is made perfect in obedience in other words that when love braks though is when we are obedient Here is the test by which we can make sure that we are in him whoever claims to be dwelling hin him binds himself to live as Christ as himself lived That is a beautiful phrase. The New English Bible has some beautiful phrases that just kind of light the whole thing up and its like saying here's the answer like he's the remedy of the defilement of our sins and that it says a beautiful thing that he lives as Christ himself flived if anybody starts out on his way like Christ and says what am I supposed to do as a Christian I's say read the four gospels! Man you get only to the fifth chpater in Matthew of Jesus baptizm and his struggle in the wilderness and band he's saying blessed are the poor in spirit £az and you've got to say that you are going to be obedient to that one single binding in Christ you've got to say how poor in spirit am I? And if If I am running arouhd with a kind of arrogant attitude trying to put people downxwhxxxkxmdxmf right there is where I've got to start. mourning, hungrying and thristing after righteousness and place after place you know where it seemeded wrong for us to do something, he did what he see, bind yourself to We sing this hymn once in a while it says I BBind my heart this time to the Galilean side. Yesterday in three lovely weddings we saw a man and a woman and there was deep seriousness in every case. lokk into each other's eyes and say I take you till I die come hell or high water that's how I take you that's binding Beofre God and in the face of these witnesses to be bound to Christ is to learn what it's like to be in God. And as long as I stay on the peripheral on the edge as long as I never get near the fire I will not know what it is to be in God. One of the young men at camp I could just get off on this but I'm going to stay real close to the lesson, I just want to illustrate the kind of young person that doesn't not normally get up and say much of anything now one of the joyful noise makers stood up the last evening I was there at Campfire and said I think John Stone is a pretty good gyy. And it was an affirmation of love that brought him closer to the fire it's a little bit like that ${f x}$ when you draw near to Christ and say things and are things you would never be as long as you stayed back there. Now it's six minutes of 12 let me just say a few words and we will pass these sheets out next week but in this paragraph I have to say this paragraph three will you please look at it again the seonnd sentence Dear friends I give you no new gommand it is an old command which you always had before you the old command is the message I gave you in the beginning and yet it is a new command which I am giwing you New in a sense that christ has made it and true and it is true in your own experience. This is a tremendous thing when I am om God I live in this commandment and what is the commandment The night the Jesus was with his 12 back in the 14 or 15 chapter of John xxxxxx I give you a new commandment that you love one another now it starts way back in the Old Testamen**e** where the people of Isreal are told to love their neighbors but when Jesus comes that gets fulfilled. The old becomes the new its when I bind myself to Christ that I find myself loving that way Strange ins't it that we stand up in the service today and say Pakistan is half a world away will you share something? Somebody at the close of the first service said I want to someting about this and wrote out a check for two hundred dollars. Strange isn't it . Some people call it ridiculous but anyone whose bound to Christ knows both the old and the new commandment which is love your neighbor but also love those who despitefully use you Pray for those who turn against you for in doing that said Jesus you fulfill the whole law and all the commandments I've asked John Stone to lead us in our Pastoral Prayer today he's been like a co-pastor so let us prepare out hearts for
