

DEBATE

1. Each Pi Kappa Delta chapter may enter two teams (men, women, or mixed) in the Standard Division of debate. Each chapter may enter one team in the Championship Cross Examination division, if they qualify.

2. SUBSTITUTIONS: There may be free substitution of debators from round to round in the Standard division providing the names of those to be used are included in the entry lists. No substitutions will be allowed in the Cross Examination division.

3. QUESTION: The proposition for debate shall be, Resolved: That the Executive Control of United States Foreign Policy Should Be Significantly Curtailed.

4. SPEECHES IN STANDARD DIVISION: Each debater shall have two speeches, one of ten minutes and one of five. The affirmative shall introduce the constructive and the negative shall introduce the refutation speeches.

5. SIDES: Each college must debate both sides of the question, having an equal number of affirmative and negative debates.

6. ROUNDS: All teams will take part in eight rounds of debate, the pairings of which are to be arranged by the contest committee and posted from round to round.

7. DECISIONS: Decisions will be rendered by single judges, who may comment on the debate but who should not announce their decisions to the debaters.

8. RANKINGS: Both team ratings and decisions will be taken into account in determining awards. All teams winning all or seven of the eight rounds shall be declared "Superior" teams regardless of their proficiency ratings. All teams with a rating of from 4.5 to 5.0 shall also be declared "Superior" teams provided they have won at least four debates. All teams winning six of the eight rounds shall be declared "Excellent" teams regardless of their pro-

ficiency ratings. All teams with a rating of from 4.0 to 4.49 shall also be declared "Excellent" teams even though they may have won fewer than six debates. All teams winning five of the eight rounds shall be declared "Good" teams regardless of their proficiency ratings. All teams with a rating of from 3.5 to 3.99 shall also be declared "Good" teams even though they may have won fewer than five debates.

9. DRAWING: Every fourth team will be seeded on the basis of performance earlier in the year. Under this plan, every team will meet only two seeded teams during the course of the eight rounds. Ratings of various colleges shall be determined by the Debate Committee with the assistance of the Province Governors and qualified Pi Kappa Delta members in the respective areas.

10. CHAMPIONSHIP CROSS EXAMINATION DIVISION: Each Pi Kappa Delta chapter may enter one team providing this team has won 60 percent of all tournament debates during the 1968-69 season, with a minimum of ten debates. All teams will take part in 8 rounds of debate. During the 7th round, hidden quarterfinals will be held; during the 8th round hidden semifinals will take place. The final round will be held at a time that all interested parties may observe. Five judges will be used for the final round.

The following order of speaking will be used in the Championship Debates.

First affirmative constructive	8 min.

911. Experimental Extension Division

DISCUSSION

1. **SUBJECT:** How can we deal with the problems of civil disorders in the United States?

2. **PROCEDURE:** There will be four rounds. Each of the four rounds shall have a maximum time limit of one and one-half hours.

Round I. Definition and delineation stage. (What is the nature, extent, and significance of the problem? What terms of the discussion question need defining?)

Round II. Problem — analysis stage. ((What are the probable causes of the problem? By what criteria should probable solutions be measured?))

Round III. Solutions stage. (What possible solutions are there? What is the best solution for the problem? Use criteria for evaluating and eliminating solutions.)

Round IV. Solutions stage. (Continue evaluation of solutions.)

3. **Discussion leader.** A discussion leader shall be appointed by the Discussion Contest Committee for each section of Round I. At the conclusion of Rounds I, II, and III, the members of each section shall elect one of their members to serve as the discussion leader for the following round.

4. **Participants.** Each Pi Kappa Delta chapter may enter two students in discussion.

5. **Judging.** A faculty observer will sit with each section. It shall be his function to check attendance, serve as a guide in procedure, and evaluate the participants. The faculty observer shall evaluate each participant on his knowledge of the discussion question, his use of critical thinking, and his cooperation with other members of the group. Also, all sections shall be observed by a panel of five traveling judges. Each of the five traveling judges will spend a minimum of fifteen minutes with each section. It shall be the function of the traveling judges to compare and evaluate the quality of work being done by the sections they visit. Each member will receive the average evaluation awarded by the traveling judges for his section. At the conclusion of Round IV, each participant will complete an evaluation for each member of his section. Each participant's final score will consist of the sum of the evaluations awarded him by the faculty observers (66-2/3 percent), the evaluation awarded his section by the traveling judges (16-2/3 percent), and the average of evaluations given by the members of his section (16-2/3 percent). Faculty observers will use a different rating scale for evaluating discussion leaders and discussion participants.

6. **Ranking.** The discussion participants ranking in the upper 10 percent will be rated "Superior"; those in the next 20 percent will be rated "Excellent"; those in the next 30 percent will be rated "Good." Students must participate in each of the four rounds to be eligible for a final rating.

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Pi Kappa Delta Constitutional Revision Proposals

(TO BE ACTED UPON AT THE CONVENTION)

The following six amendments are in response to action taken by the 1967 National Convention as reported on page 7 of the May 1967 FORENSIC. Neither the National Council nor the Constitution Revision Committee favor their acceptance.

Amendment 1.

Strike the present wording of Article V, Division C, Section 4 (first paragraph) and substitute the following:

"The National Council shall be composed of the National President, the Vice-President, the National Secretary-treasurer, the Editor of *The Forensic* (ex-officio), the Historian (ex-officio), two student representatives, and the Province Governors. Past-Presidents of the fraternity shall be honorary non-voting members of the National Council."

Amendment 2.

Article V, Division C, Section 2, starting line 4:

strike last five words of first sentence and the first six words of the next sentence."

(This eliminates reference to five general council members)

Amendment 3.

Article V, Division C, Section 2, starting line 15:

strike the words: "The Vice-President and three general council members" and substitute "the nominating committee's slate of four members of the National Council."

Amendment 4.

Article V, Division C, Section 2:

strike line 24 through part of 50 relating to election of general council members.

Amendment 5.

Article V, Division C, Section 4, add a new subsection (a) and re-letter the other subsections:

The Province Governors shall serve on the National Council for a period of two years starting the first of June following the first national convention after his selection as Province Governor."

Amendment 6.

Article V, Division C, Section 4, insert a new subsection between the present subsections (b) and (c) and reletter:

The expenses of each Province Governor's attendance at National Council meetings during his term of office on the Council shall be equally shared by the national organization and the respective Province."

(The following proposal is presented by the Constitution Revision Committee to clarify part of the 1967 Constitution. It does not constitute a change in procedure or policy.)

Amendment 7.

Article 4, Division C, Paragraph 1, substitute the following for subsection (a):

"Order of Competitive Individual Speaking: the candidate shall have represented his college at a recognized intercollegiate contest in an event recognized and approved by the National Convention, or have given a speech before a non-classroom audience on five or more occasions."
