

2. All judges are to be available to judge up to nine rounds, regardless of the size of their entry. Judges may indicate their willingness to judge additional rounds at the rate of \$7/round.

3. Alumni contestants cover 6 slots of judging for a school or are hired at \$7.00/round by the Tournament Director.

Awards:

1. Gold plaques will be award to individual and team winners of superior ratings (top 10%). Silver plaques will be awarded to individual and team winners of excellent ratings (next 20%).

2. Sweepstakes points will be awarded to each chapter participating according to the following formula:

Team Debate:	Superior	10 points	L-D & IE's:	Superior	5 points
	Excellent	8 points		Excellent	4 points
	Good	6 points		Good	3 points
	Particip.	2 points		Particip.	1 point

Each school may earn a maximum of one participation point in each individual event or two participation points in each debate division if they earn no ratings in that division. More than one entry from a school may earn superior, excellent or good ratings.

DEBATE GENERAL RULES

Divisions and Entries:

1. Open, Junior and Novice CEDA; Open L-D; Open NDT.

2. Any student may enter open division. A student in their first year of college competition or freshman and sophomores may enter junior division. Only students with less than two semesters of college or high school debate may enter the novice division.

3. A school may enter any number of debate entries, subject to meeting their judging requirements.

4. Sweepstakes points will be counted for the best five teams/units from each school entered.

Matching and Other Logistics:

1. Every team/entry will debate six preliminary rounds with an equal number of debates on each side of the resolution. Standard CEDA elimination round standards will be used to determine elimination round contestants.
2. Teams/entries will not debate teams/entries from their province during the pre-matched rounds. Teams/entries will not be judged by judges from their province during preliminary rounds or elimination rounds. Guest or hired judges from the Province of Missouri may judge teams from that Province if the judge does not have a current school affiliation.
3. **CEDA:** These divisions will use the 2nd Semester topic. Time limits will be 8-3-5 with 8 minutes prep time.
4. **NDT:** This division will use the current national topic. Time limits will be 10-3-5 with 10 minutes prep time.
5. **L-D:** This division will debate the topic: **RESOLVED: THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SHOULD MAKE SIGNIFICANT CHANGES TO THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION PROCESS.** Time limits: 6-3-9-3-5-6-4, with 3 minutes prep time.

INDIVIDUAL EVENTS GENERAL RULES

Divisions and Entries:

1. Each chapter may enter any number of contestants in any event subject to meeting their judging commitments.
2. Contestants may enter one event in Pattern A and two events in Patterns B and C. The tournament will not make special arrangements for double-entered contestants.
3. Contestants may not use the same presentation in more than one event. All speeches (manuscripts or outlines) in all prepared events must be made available to the tournament committee upon request. All speeches must not have been presented in competition prior to the current school year.

Rounds and Logistics:

1. There will be three rounds in each event. Each contestant must participate in all rounds to receive a final rating. Individual events will be computer-matched

using a random schematic. Contestants will be posted by their school code and their last name.

CONFLICT PATTERNS

Pattern A: Extemp, Duo, Informative

Pattern B: Prose, Impromptu, Persuasive

Pattern C: Poetry, Drama, STE, Communication Analysis

3. There will be two judges in each section in each round. Judges will provide time signals to contestants in extemp and impromptu. Judges will not reveal rankings or decisions to the contestant.

4. INFORMATIVE SPEAKING. An original, factual speech by the student on a realistic subject to fulfill the general aim to inform the audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time is 10 minutes including introduction.

5. EXTEMPORANEOUS SPEAKING. Contestants will be given three topics in the general area of current events, choose one, and have 30 minutes to prepare a speech that is the original work of the student. Maximum time is 7 minutes. Limited notes are permitted.

6. DUO INTERPRETATION. A cutting from a humorous or serious play involving the portrayal of two or more characters presented by two individuals. This material may drawn from stage, screen or radio. This is not an acting event. Thus, no costumes, props, lighting, etc. are to be used. Presentation is from the manuscript and the focus should be off-stage and not to each other. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

7. PROSE INTERPRETATION. A selection or selections of prose material of literary merit which may be drawn from more than one source. Play cuttings are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time is 10 minutes including introductions.

8. IMPROMPTU SPEAKING. Topics will be proverbs. Speakers will be given a topic sheet with two topics, and then have 7 minutes to prepare and deliver a speech with at least 4 minutes spent speaking. Limited notes are permitted. Speakers must wait outside of the room prior to speaking.

9. PERSUASIVE SPEAKING. An original speech to inspire, reinforce or change beliefs, attitudes, values or actions of an audience. Audio-visual aids may or may not be used. Multiple sources should be used and cited in the development

of the speech. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time is 10 minutes.

10. POETRY INTERPRETATION. A selection or selections of poetry of literary merit which may be drawn from more than one source. Play cuttings are prohibited. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

11. DRAMATIC INTERPRETATION. A cutting which represents one or more characters from a play or plays of literary merit. This material may be drawn from stage, screen or radio. Use of manuscript is required. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes including introduction.

12. SPEECH TO ENTERTAIN. An original humorous speech designed to exhibit sound speech composition, thematic coherence, direct communicative public speaking skills, and good taste. The speech should not resemble a night club act, an impersonation, or a comic dialogue. Audio-visual aids are optional. Minimal notes are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

13. COMMUNICATION ANALYSIS. An original speech designed to offer an explanation and/or evaluation of a communication event such as a speech, speaker, movement, poem, poster, film, campaign, etc., through the use of rhetorical principles. Audio-visual aids are optional. Manuscripts are permitted. Maximum time limit is 10 minutes.

ALUMNI SPEAKING EVENTS GENERAL RULES

Entries:

1. Each chapter may enter up to five contestants in the alumni speaking events competitions. Directors of Forensics, Speech Department faculty, and graduate assistants coaching forensics events are not eligible for alumni competition. Each alumni contestant may enter one of the events offered.
2. Contestants must have been undergraduate members of Pi Kappa Delta in order to participate in the Alumni division.

Rules and Logistics:

1. All speeches must not have been delivered in competition prior to the 1988-89 school year. Manuscripts or outlines of speeches in prepared events must be available to the tournament committee upon request.
2. All alumni contestants will be asked to serve as judges during time slots in

which they are not competing at the rate of \$7/round.

3. There will be three rounds of competition in each event. A contestant must participate in all rounds to receive a final rating.

4. The Alumni interpretation event will correspond in the schedule with Group A events; the Alumni Persuasive speaking event will correspond with Group B events; The Alumni L-D Debate event will correspond with Group C events.

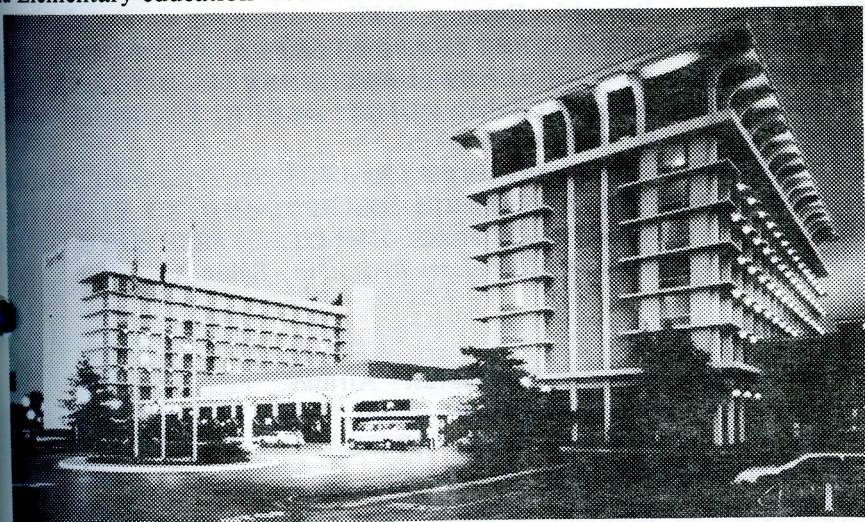
5. Judging for all alumni events will be done by two judges drawn from Chapter voting delegates. Voting delegates will not judge in patterns they are competing in.

6. Awards will follow the standard PKD formula. Alumni competition will not count toward team sweepstakes.

7. **ORAL INTERPRETATION.** A 10 minute prose, poetry or drama presentation from one or more sources. Manuscript is required.

8. **PERSUASIVE SPEAKING.** A 10 minute speech designed to change or reinforce attitudes, beliefs, or actions. A maximum of 100 quoted words permitted. Manuscripts and audio-visual aids are optional.

9. **LINCOLN-DOUGLAS DEBATE.** Time limits: 6-3-9-3-5-6-4 with 3 minutes prep time. Topic: "Resolved: that significant changes in American Secondary and Elementary education would be desirable."

8. A brief note on tournament entry fees. The National Council decided that the National Convention must operate as a break-even proposition. Your entry fees cover: trophies; convention awards; the banquet; publication of the KEY; debate and individual events ballots, fixed convention costs; and the cost of the Hall of Fame ceremonies. All of these costs have been carefully considered in arriving at the appropriate cost figures. We continue to believe that the Pi Kappa Delta National Convention provides a lot of the benefit in exchange for the cost.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

These changes will be presented at a business meeting in St. Louis for membership approval.

Proposal 1.

ARTICLE IV, 400 Present Wording:

Eligibility to active membership in this fraternity shall be determined as follows. The candidate shall be a regular collegiate student in good standing, or a graduate of an institution of college rank, and shall have represented his or her college in speech activities as provided for in Paragraph 505, or shall be a faculty member in charge of instruction in one or more of the activities recognized by the Order of Individual Speaking or the Order of Debate or a coach of one of the recognized forensic activities in a recognized college.

Proposed: "Eligibility to active membership in this fraternity shall be determined as follows: **The candidate shall be a regular collegiate student officially registered in good standing with a minimum of 2.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale, or a graduate . . .**

Proposal 2.

Present Wording: III, 353: "The elective officers shall be chosen as follows: at one of the first business sessions of the National Convention, the three general council members of the Order of Instruction shall be placed on a preferential ballot and submitted to a vote of the Convention. The highest ranking candidate shall be deemed elected President-Elect."

Proposed: Delete section or paragraph #353 and replace with the following:

The President-Elect shall be chosen as follows:

1. The nominees for the office of President-Elect shall be three council members, excluding any member who notifies the President of Pi Kappa Delta in writing of the person's desire to be excluded from nomination.
2. The election shall be by mail ballot of all active Pi Kappa Delta Chapters and shall be by majority vote of chapters voting.
3. The election process shall be completed thirty (30) days prior to the national convention unless the National Council shall extend the date.

NOTE: The Council and the Committee felt that the December 1987 balloting by mail on a proposed change in the procedure for electing the President-Elect showed interest justifying consideration of the above by the assembly in 1989.

Proposal 3.

Proposed: VII, 703: add:

“Individuals and institutions may subscribe to a journal only membership paying the annual fee to the National Secretary-Treasurer’s office. The subscription rate shall be established by the National Council.”

Proposal 4.

Present Wording:

505:51 For the Order of Individual Speaking the candidate shall have participated in individual speaking for at least three college years, shall be eligible for the Degree of Special Distinction, and shall have an academic standing in the upper thirty-five percent of the candidate’s class.

505:52 For the Order of Debate the candidate shall have participated in debate for at least three years, shall be eligible for the Degree of Special Distinction, and shall have an academic standing in the upper thirty-five percent of the candidate’s class.

Proposed:

505:51 For the Order of Individual Speaking the candidate shall have participated in individual speaking for at least three college years, shall be eligible for the Degree of Special Distinction, **and shall have an academic grade point average of 3.25 (based on a 4.0 standard).**

505:52 For the Order of Debate the candidate shall have participated in debate for at least three years, shall be eligible for the Degree of Special Distinction, **and shall have an academic grade point average of 3.25 (based on a 4.0 standard).**

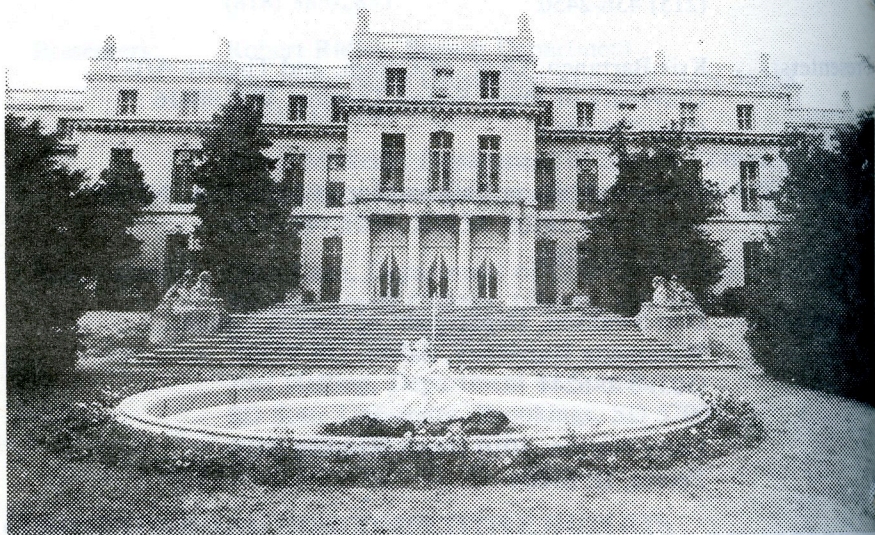

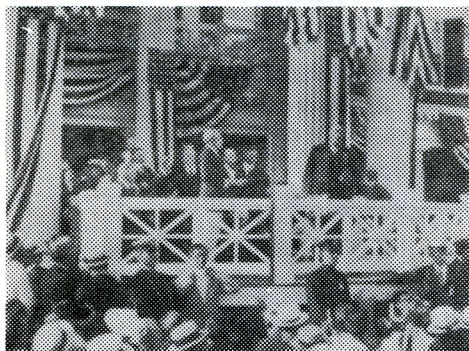

THE HISTORY OF PI KAPPA DELTA: 1913-1987

Compiled by Dr. Larry Norton, Professor Emeritus, Bradley University

This is a record of Pi Kappa Delta's seventy-five years of service to American forensics from its founding in 1913 through the Diamond Jubilee convention in March 1987. Part I reports the general history as recorded by the Pi Kappa Delta historians. Part II describes the organization on the national, provincial and local levels with separate chapters on publications and alumni. Part III covers the tournament with its contests, subjects and awards. Part IV gives an account of the convention - its business, student participation, professional programs, and special features.
